Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

OCTOBER 4, 2020

Isaiah 5:1-7; Philippians 4:6-9;
Matthew 21:33-43

The context of today's Gospel is after Jesus' entry into Jerusalem in the last days of his life. People greeted him enthusiastically on Palm Sunday; but then they found out that he was going to be a humble Messiah – not the one they expected.

Jesus cleansed the Temple, overturning the tables of the buyers and sellers; thus he alienated them – and the high priest who controlled them. Last week, he told the parable of the two sons; obviously the elders and scribes realized that he was talking about them. Today he tells the parable of the vineyard. This is a variation on the vineyard parable in the first reading.

The vineyard is Israel. God had invested a lot in his people; he expected that they would bear good fruit. Instead, the vineyard produced "wild" grapes. (A better translation would be: "rotten, stinking grapes.")

There are several plays-on-words in the original language: "Judgment" is *Mizpah* in Hebrew; "Violence" is *Mizpat*. "Justice" is *Zadiqqah*; "Outcry" is *Za'aqqah*. The variation of the parable in the Gospel makes it vivid: They killed the messengers and finally the Son who was heir.

The Gospel parable says that the kingdom of God will be taken from the Jews and given to a people who will yield a rich harvest. We might ask ourselves if we yield this rich harvest. Are we so zealous for the faith that we live it and try to share it with others? What will God say about our quietism and indifference to life issues? To evangelism? To missionary efforts? To promiscuity and violence?

In the second reading, we are told not to worry, to be a people of peace. Sad to say, some take this to mean that they can be indifferent. Let us pray that we shall show our faith in our public life.

The anxiety is still part of our lives and we just pray that this, too, will pass without much harm done to us physically, spiritually, and emotionally. Not too much more can we say except that all of this ends soon with the discovery of a vaccine that will prevent it.

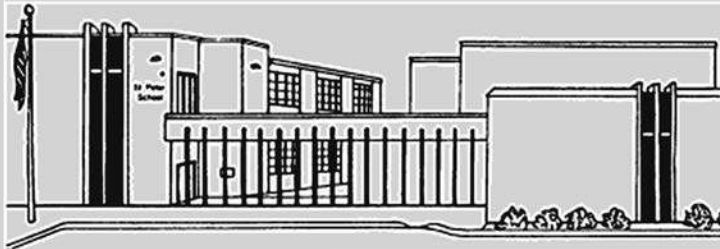
Although we celebrate the 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time this Sunday, we also recognize and celebrate the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the founder of the Franciscan Order. Francis heard the words of Jesus while praying one day in the Church of San Damiano. The voice he heard said, “Francis, go repair my Church.” Francis first thought the message was about church buildings. He soon realized he was to repair the spiritual fabric of the Church. And he would do this by becoming more like our Lord, even in his poverty. And that he did. By his humility, simplicity, and poverty, he became the man most like our Lord. Needless to say, we need his help and pray even more today than in his day. St. Francis of Assisi, pray for us. In remembering this feast, we also remember all those Franciscan priests and brothers who taught at Quincy College and University, who served our community as pastors and parochial vicars of St. Francis Solanus Catholic Church and School, and who still serve our community in retirement at Holy Cross Friary. Most people who live in Quincy were touched by these friars in many differing ways and to each of them we wish them a Happy Feast Day. To all those Franciscans who have died, we pray that they join their founder in the joys and happiness of heaven.

The month of October is the month of the Rosary. In light of the “Did You Know” series, I thought I would share a little something about the Rosary. As a devotion, it was called the Psalter of Mary, because all fifteen mysteries, with their 150 Aves (Hail Mary’s) correspond to the number of the psalms (150). However, since the Luminous mysteries were added, another 5 mysteries and another 50 Aves, I’m not sure that we can say that it is still the Psalter of Mary. But whatever the case, it is a Catholic devotion that still is relevant to every day and age. Combine the Rosary with a prayer for Respect for Life, this is a prayer that I would encourage you to pray. I know growing up my family was a frequent pray-ers of this Rosary. In fact my maternal grandparents had purchased three large statues of Our Lady of Fatima and these used to be called the traveling Mary as they would be in differing homes for people to use as they prayed the Rosary. In fact, I remember the statues being front and center in various parades in Springfield called the “Blue Army Pilgrimage.” Just a little remembering from my past.

This week, our freshmen from QND will be on a retreat day. Since COVID-19, their class had to be broken in half so that half will be on Monday and the other half on Tuesday. I bring this to your attention and ask that you pray for them.

Birthright Virtual Trivia Night

Birthright of Quincy's largest annual fundraiser, taking place Saturday, November 7, is receiving a makeover this year due to current restrictions on large gatherings.

For years, Birthright Trivia Night has packed over 500 fun-loving supporters together inside Quincy University's Health and Fitness Center to enjoy a Trivia contest and silent auction of more than 200 locally donated items. Money raised by the annual event represents half the funds needed to support Birthright's clients for the entire year.

For the first time in its 11-year history, this year's Birthright Trivia Night will be taking place virtually. "If we want to be able to continue helping the women and girls we serve, we have to find a way to forge ahead with our largest fundraiser, and we need our supporters' help this year more than ever" Birthright President Patty Adam said. Teams will gather at a location of their choice, or even virtually if they prefer, and follow along with the evening's events on Zoom while entering Trivia answers on a separate mobile app provided. Because of the virtual platform, there will be more multiple choice questions than years past, and answer scores will be weighted on response time.

In another first, this year's event will not include a silent auction. Adam said it didn't feel right to ask Birthright's small business supporters to donate items this year considering how many are currently struggling as a result of the pandemic. For businesses and individuals who still want to support the event but not necessarily play Trivia, event and round sponsorships are available and will be critical to funding Birthright's mission.

For a donation of \$125, Trivia teams of up to 8 players can register online at birthrightquincyil.org, or contact Birthright at (217) 224-1277 for a registration form or more information. The registration deadline is Friday, November 6 at 8:00 p.m., and teams who complete their registration by October 23 have a chance to win their entry fee back.

Birthright of Quincy is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization founded in Quincy in 1973 to help pregnant women overcome the challenges of unplanned pregnancy. Birthright of Quincy is non-political, non-denominational, 100% volunteer, and operates 100% through donations from the community.
