


Sunday's Mass Readings

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time – 24 January 2021

Jonah 3:1-5, 10. Psalm 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9. 1 Corinthians 7:29-31. Mark 1:14-20.

Proclaiming the Gospel of God. Jesus is very busy in the beginning of Mark's gospel – proclaiming, teaching, healing. And calling others to come and follow. The responses of Simon and Andrew, of James and John were immediate: stopping what they were doing, leaving it all behind without hesitation – they followed him. Stay tuned to this whole liturgical year to see where that leads.

- **What of the good news of God is Jesus proclaiming to me today?**
- **How am I hesitating in giving Jesus Christ my immediate attention and response?**
- **What am I leaving behind, stopping doing in order to follow Jesus in more faithful ways?**

From our Pastor's Desk

Father Alfred Tumwesigye

Praised be Jesus Christ. This weekend we celebrate the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, and it is the weekend we concluded the week of Prayer for Christian Unity (18 – 25 January). We have also begun the *9 Days for Life* Novena for the protection of human life (Thursday, January 21 – Friday, January 29, 2021) to help build a culture of life.

In the Gospel this weekend, Jesus tells us that **“this is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel.”** (Mark 1:15). This is the message that calls for the necessary immediacy of our personal response, to Jesus’s invitation: **“Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.”** (Mark 1:17).

As Christians we are called to live, pray and work for reconciliation and unity within the Church, our human family and all of creation. As we mark the end of the 54th Week of Prayer for Christian Unity on Monday, 25 January, the Christians in this country have a moral obligation also to pray for reconciliation, healing and unity not only within the Church but also within this beautiful country. We have to ask God for peace, reconciliation, unity and healing as the newly elected leaders take up their responsibilities. Jesus prayed for His own, **“that they may all be one”** (Jn 17:21), indeed may all be one.

While it is a big challenge, like those disciples who left their nets on the ground, and began a new life with Jesus, let us also turn around, leaving anything that does not sow unity and love, to follow our Lord and Master Jesus. We have to be a generation of Christians, who believe and witness a love that unites. Like Jonah, Simon, Andrew, and then James and John, all we need is our immediate response, for as St. Paul’s First Letter to the Corinthians tells us: **“the time is running out.”** (1 Corinthians 7:29-31).

While we continue to pray for Christian Unity, in fulfillment of Jesus’ Last Supper prayer **“that they all may be one”** (cf. John 17:21), let us join together at the Sunday evening Holy Hour with vespers to jointly pray for visible Christian unity and move closer towards the year’s theme **“Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit,”** (inspired by John 15: 5-9). Our spiritual goal is to be able to overcome our prejudices and conflicts so that we see everyone as a brother or sister to be loved always.

Together through prayer we can overcome both the internal and external hardship so that unity, peace and healing may prevail over conflicts. I am reminded of St. Francis’ prayer that *‘Where there is discord, may we bring harmony. Where there is error, may we bring truth. Where there is doubt, may we bring faith. And where there is despair, may we bring hope’*.

New life is what we have been given by the Lord! Let our closeness to him bear fruits, and the hour has come for us to choose. So, let us choose unity, healing, love, goodness, truth, wisdom and life. May Jesus be our guide, lead us to himself always, from whom love always overflows.

Faith Formation & Discipleship

Next Sunday marks the opening of Catholic Schools Week, a week in which we celebrate Catholic education in America. I’m deeply grateful for the upbringing that my wife Suzanne and I had in Catholic grade schools, and we’re doubly grateful to be able to be sending our four boys to Catholic grade and high schools as well. All of us whose lives have been positively impacted by Catholic education owe a huge debt of gratitude to all of those who invest so heavily in its success – our parents and grandparents, the teachers and staffs, the clergy and religious, all the members of our parishes, Knights of Columbus Councils, and many, many more. This is a great week to prayerfully reflect on our gratitude for our Catholic schools, so that we can enter even more fully into the joyful celebration of them next week.

Celebrate Catholic Schools Week (the winter celebration – now paired with a fall-season ‘Discover Catholic Schools Week’) always anchors itself in the week after the Feast of St. Thomas Aquinas. Why? He is the patron of Catholic Schools, schools in general, colleges, students, and professors.

In the mid-1200s, Thomas Aquinas was thinking deeply about faith through the lenses of philosophy and theology. His writings on theology formed the basis of Catholic thinking for centuries. The *Summa Theologiae*, his penultimate work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. He stopped work on it after a vision while he was celebrating Mass on December 6, 1273. When asked why, he replied, “I cannot go on... All that I have written seems to me like so much straw compared to what I have seen and what has been revealed to me.” Although he is seen as one of the most brilliant theological minds of all time, his humility before the awesome reality of Jesus in the Eucharist and whatever it was that God revealed to him caused him to abandon his work.

I momentarily almost “abandoned the work” of my diaconate formation a few years ago when, for one of our first classes (Philosophy), we had about 400 pages of St. Thomas Aquinas to read before class, along with about 600 pages of everyone from Plato to Aristotle to Augustine. Night after night I would leave Suzanne and the boys, go out for a coffee, and keep reading. It was *tough* reading, too! Prayer, patience, and a growing sense of humility carried me through that task, and in hindsight I’m grateful for the enlightenment of further understanding those fathers in our faith and reasoning.

A reflection on St. Thomas Aquinas, from Franciscan Media: “We can look to Thomas Aquinas as a towering example of Catholicism in the sense of broadness, universality, and inclusiveness. We should be determined anew to exercise the divine gift of reason in us, our power to know, learn, and understand. At the same time, we should thank God for the gift of his revelation, especially in Jesus Christ.”

St. Thomas Aquinas, pray for us!


