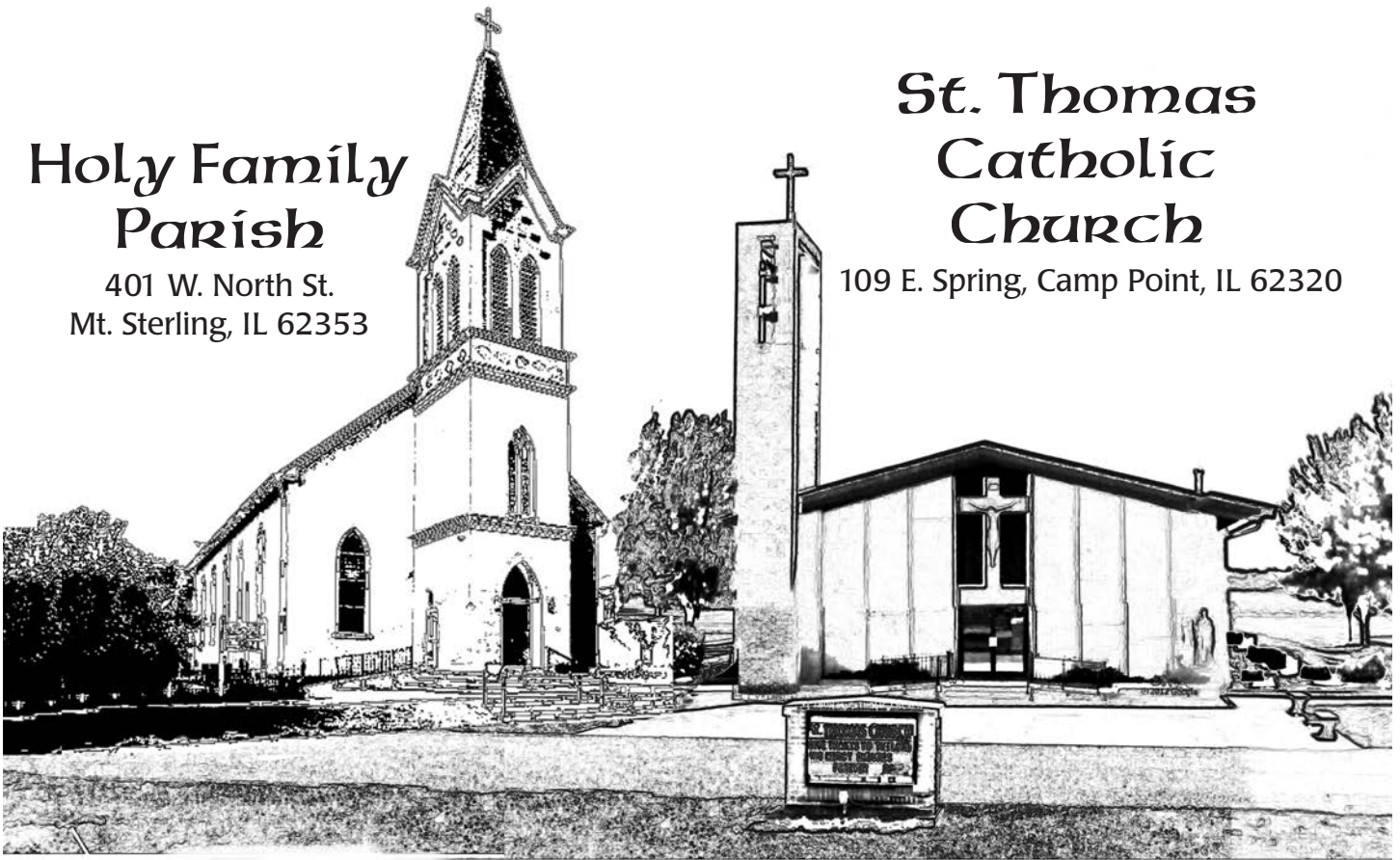

From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our readings remind us that the Lord desires to heal us of everything that causes separation or broken relationships.

God created us so that we might know Him, love Him, and serve Him in this life in order that we might live happily with Him in Heaven for all eternity. God wants to be in relationship with us. We are made for love and the Divine Love is pure, unconditional, and freely given.

Still, in spite of the perfection of God's design, we are broken by sin. And even though we are made for relationship, many things separate us and also work to limit the love for which we were created.

In our first reading from the Book of Leviticus, we are reminded that physical circumstances, including illness, can separate us from one another. Consider the effects of the recent pandemic which are many. One, of course, is fear. Another is the separation from one another. We recognize, or hopefully we recognize, that this is detrimental to our

humanity. There are other forms of physical separation as well. For example, a job that takes a loved one far away, emotional wounds that call for physical distance, and death itself.

Spiritual separation is also very much a reality although sadly, many folks do not even recognize it. Like physical separation, spiritual separation also wounds us. The ugliness of sin is real, and we can be held captive by it, becoming slaves to it all while denying it. Sin infects and hurts those around us including those sins that we try to convince ourselves hurt no one or affect only us or are done in secret. The damage of sin is infectious.

The Lord enters into this brokenness of ours with His mercy. We hear the leper in today's Gospel cry out to Jesus, "If you wish, You can make me clean." Hopefully the leper's faith can lead us to confidence in Jesus also. Jesus, who the Gospel today says is moved with pity, draws near to us and reaches out to us because He wants to heal every separation, whatever it is...physical, emotional, spiritual. He wills to make us clean as we see so clearly in the Gospel. Are we both confident in the Lord's healing and open to receiving it?

Perhaps each of us can reflect on what wounds we can bring to Christ this very day...the broken relationship, the separation, or the sin in need of His healing presence. The Lord draws near to us and reaches out to us so that we might be healed. May we always recognize that healing presence of Christ.

Our Responsorial Psalm for today points to that healing presence of Christ and reminds us that it is in and through the Lord that we are filled with joy... "I turn to You, O Lord, in time of trouble, and you fill me with the joy of salvation." There is no greater joy than what the Psalm exclaims, the joy of God's gift of salvation.

Finally, our Second Reading for today is a short but powerful piece from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians. St. Paul reminds us that whatever we do, to do everything for the glory of God. Again, this is a powerful and challenging statement that I encourage all of us to reflect on in our lives. It sounds easy enough and we may even try to fool ourselves into thinking we are living up to it. So often though, even the seemingly good works that

are done are done so for recognition, or for praise from another, or for some personal benefit, or to make oneself "feel good." Good acts are good, but the intention can sometimes be very self-centered, giving little to no glory to God at all. May everything we do, as St. Paul reminds us, be done for the glory of God...not our own glory but for the glory of God alone. Believe me, this is much harder for most of us than it sounds.

In times of trouble, may we know God's healing presence and be filled with the joy of salvation. And in this, may all we do be done solely for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. That is a great challenge for us to undertake but of course with God's grace and our openness to it, we can accomplish all things according to His Will.

And now just a few notes:

-While we are entering into the Sixth Week in Ordinary Time today, on Wednesday we will celebrate Ash Wednesday and the start of the Lenten Season. Lent runs from Ash Wednesday until the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday (April 1 this year) which then begins the Sacred Pascal Triduum. Easter Sunday this year is April 4. The Easter Season comes to a close on Pentecost Sunday (May 23 this year). On the following day, we will resume Ordinary Time.

-As I noted in last week's bulletin, Masses for Ash Wednesday will be as follows: 7:00 a.m. at Holy Family, 8:30 a.m. at Holy Family (with part of the school present), 9:30 a.m. at Holy Family (with part of the school present), 12:00 Noon at St. Thomas, 5:30 p.m. at Holy Family, and 7:30 p.m. at St. Thomas. I do hope that you will try to join us for one of these Liturgies.

Also, as I noted in last week's bulletin, concerning the imposition of ashes for this year, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments has provided the following modification to the rite of the imposition of ashes during liturgies on Ash Wednesday for this year:

The Priest will bless the ashes and sprinkle them with holy water as usual. Then he will address all those present and, only once, will say one of the two formulae found in the Roman Missal. Then, those present will come forward and the priest will sprinkle ashes on

the head of each person without saying anything.

The sprinkling of the ashes on the head is the most obvious difference from what we have become accustomed to. It is important to note, however, that the practice of imposing ashes on the forehead in the Sign of the Cross is not a universal practice; in fact, it is an uncommon one. In most of the world, and for most of the Church's history, ashes are imposed by sprinkling on the crown of the head, in keeping with the practice as we find it in the Old Testament.

-Lent is the principal penitential season in the Church year. All the Christian faithful are urged to develop and maintain a voluntary program of self-denial (in addition to the Lenten regulations which follow), serious prayer, and the performing of deeds of charity and mercy, including the giving of alms.

-LENTEN REGULATIONS - 1. ABSTINENCE - Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. 2. FAST - Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed. 3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

-I encourage each and every one of us to embark on some additional prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during the Season of Lent. As I understand, an evening Mass has been offered in the past on Wednesday evenings at Holy Family during Lent at 5:30 p.m. followed by Stations of the Cross led by various groups or individuals. I will continue that this year as well.

St. Thomas has traditionally had Stations of the Cross on Friday evenings during Lent led by individuals. We will do that this year as well.

In addition, I will also be adding a Thursday evening Mass during Lent at St. Thomas at 5:30 p.m. I will begin that this week, February 18. I will also be adding Stations of the Cross on

Sunday afternoons during Lent. I think I will alternate parishes each week for the Sunday Stations of the Cross. Stations of the Cross on Sunday, February 21 will be at St. Thomas at 1:30 p.m. I will also be offering additional Confession times each week at each parish during Lent. I will include those times in next week's bulletin.

-St. Mary School Fish Fry is this coming Friday, February 19 from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. This year's Fish Fry will be drive through only. Plan to come by and pick up a great meal.

-St. Thomas is also planning a Fish Fry for Friday, February 26 from 4:30-7:00 p.m. Serving will be drive through only at the Parish Hall. I look forward to seeing you there.

-A reminder that bids are being accepted for the mowing and trimming of our Catholic Cemetery in Mt. Sterling for the upcoming season. If you or someone you know is interested in submitting a bid or finding out more about it, I'd ask you to contact Jim Henrick. If you need Jim's contact information, just give the Parish Office a call (217) 773-3233.

-Again, thank you to those of you who have already made a contribution toward the Catholic Times subscription. If you have not already made your contribution, I'd ask you to do so. We have received our billing for this, and your contribution helps to offset this billing. Every Catholic household should be receiving the Catholic Times. If you are not receiving it, please let us know so that we can look into it.

-We have recently received an update on each parish's Season of Stewardship (formally Annual Catholic Services Appeal or ACSA). Thank you to those of you who have already contributed to this appeal. I'd like to share the updated figures with you.

For St. Thomas, the goal is \$12,863. As of February 2, 2021, the actual amount pledged and/or paid is \$8,575. The remaining amount due is \$4,663.

For Holy Family, the goal is \$41,074. As of February 2, 2021, the actual amount pledged and/or paid is \$9,050. The remaining amount due is \$32,599.

At the end of the campaign, any remaining amount due will be billed to the parish. I ask

you to prayerfully consider what you may be able to contribute to the campaign. Since the assessed amount is based on total contributions to the parish, I ask that you consider the possibility of contributing a minimum amount equal to 10% of your yearly total parish contributions. For myself personally, I will be contributing an amount that is approximately 23% of my total contributions to the parishes. Please know that your contribution is greatly appreciated, and no amount is too small to consider giving. If you no longer have the envelope for this appeal, you may give your contribution directly to me and I will submit it for you. Please make sure that any contribution toward the campaign is clearly marked for the campaign.

-As I talked about in last week's bulletin, I remind all of us that Pope Francis has declared this year as a Year of St. Joseph. I continue now, just briefly, more of what the Holy Father writes concerning this. More to come in future bulletins.

The Pope referred to St. Joseph as "a father in the shadows" and stated that, "In his relationship to Jesus, Joseph was the earthly shadow of the Heavenly Father: he watched over Him and protected Him, never leaving Him to go His own way,"

Pope Francis also said that the contemporary world requires examples of true fatherhood: "Our world today needs fathers. It has no use for tyrants who would domineer others as a means of compensating for their own needs," he wrote. "It rejects those who confuse authority with authoritarianism, service with servility, discussion with oppression, charity with a welfare mentality, (and) power with destruction."

As we continue this Year of St. Joseph, we ask for his intercession in all our needs. St. Joseph, Terror of Demons, Pray for us.
