# From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our readings today really describe our everyday lives at times and what we as Christians are called to. If we take a look at our First Reading from the Book of Job, it's anything but uplifting as Job describes his life as drudgery and misery. I think it's safe to say that each one of us can relate to Job...either ourselves personally (now or sometime in the past) or certainly with others that we know. How often have we heard someone or even ourselves talk about the drudgery of life or work, how difficult or burdensome things are. And how often is that coupled with some statement of how busy we are?

And if you study the Book of Job in greater detail, you discover Job's growing frustration when his friends and those who know him are convinced that all of Job's hardships and heartache must surely be a result of something that Job did although he (and the reader) knows that it isn't.

So it is with us as well. Our lives will almost certainly at times bring us sorrow, pain, struggles, discontentment and so forth and not necessarily because of anything we've done. Yet we know the Lord sustains the lowly and heals the brokenhearted as we hear in the Psalm for today and this gives us hope and encouragement to move forward and persevere.

As we look at today's Gospel from St. Mark and St. Paul's Letter in our Second Reading, we find a couple of things. First, in the Gospel, Jesus reaches out to Simon's mother-in-law, grasping her hand, and the woman is healed of her illness. This is wonderful indeed but what's more important for us to take away from this is what happens next...it says, "the fever left her and she waited on them." Yes, she waited on them. She was healed by the Lord and what did she do?...she waited on Him and those who were gathered there with Him. She didn't say... "Oh, I think I'll take a rest now" or, "Wow, that was great, I'm sure glad my son-in-law knows this guy!" No, she had encountered the Lord

and was healed by Him and then immediately resumed what she was called to do, she resumed her work.

So too, the Lord knows our struggles, our hardships, our discontentment and He stretches His hand out to us as well and when we allow for that encounter with Christ to touch and to heal us, we too are called to resume what we've been called to do, in our work and in our faith.

And what else do we find that Jesus does in the Gospel? Yes, many are brought to Him and He heals many. But more importantly for us is again what happens next. It says simply that Jesus "went off to a deserted place, where He prayed." Yes, He prayed. He didn't say "Oh, I've done a lot lately, that's enough for now," and He didn't say, "Does anyone even appreciate what I do around here." No, after a long and busy day prior, Jesus goes off to pray. He had given so much of Himself and needed to be in touch with the Father, the source of His energy, the source of our energy, to restore wholeness and peace. And what happens? Jesus comes away energized and ready to serve. We're told that He goes to nearby villages to preach and drive out demons because, He says, "for this purpose, I have come." Jesus too resumes His work after His time in prayer.

So too, each of us needs to turn to God in prayer, each and every day, even in, or perhaps especially in the midst of our busyness, our daily activities, our struggles and discontentment. We all need to find rest that refreshes and renews us so that we too can come away energized and ready to serve. And this rest is found not in some kind of escapist activity (activity that seeks to provide distraction from an unpleasant reality) or dissipating activity (activity that disappears or squanders our gifts). No, this rest is found only in the Lord.

Finally, St. Paul in our Second Reading today speaks of not just his desire to preach the Gospel but his obligation to do

so. We too share in that obligation (and hopefully in that desire). Everyone is seeking Christ. Some are more willing and disposed to it while others may not be quite conscious of it. Still, we are called to bring others to Christ and we do that through both our words and actions and our witness to the Fullness of Truth.

As we reflect on the healing and saving power of God we are reminded of the response to the Psalm today..."Praise the Lord, who heals the brokenhearted." Let us remain mindful of all those who we hear about in today's Gospel, those who were ill and were brought to Jesus, and the whole town who was gathered at the door. And let us gather together all of our struggles and weaknesses, bringing them to the Lord and asking Him to heal us through the Sacred Mysteries and His redeeming grace.

And now just a few notes:

-Bids are being accepted for the mowing and trimming of our Catholic Cemetery in Mt. Sterling for the upcoming season. It is wonderful to have our Catholic Cemetery available to us.

-Mark your calendar for the St. Mary School Fish Fry on Friday, February 19 from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. This year's Fish Fry will be drive-thru only.

-St. Thomas is also planning a Fish Fry for Friday, February 26 from 4:30-7:00 p.m. Serving will be drive-thru only at the Parish Hall. I look forward to seeing you there.

-This seems like a strange thing to include in our bulletin but it is important. I remind you about the upcoming

requirement of dialing the full 10-digit phone number (area code plus phone number). We are in a grace period for now but at the end of February, the dialing of the 10 digits will be required for all calls to be completed. Please keep that in mind.

-It is hard to believe that we will soon be entering the Liturgical Season of Lent in the Church. February 17 this year is Ash Wednesday, marking the start of Lent. I will be offering the following Masses on Ash Wednesday: 7:00 a.m. at Holy Family, 8:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. at Holy Family (both of these Masses will include part of the school), 12:00 Noon at St. Thomas, 5:30 p.m. at Holy Family, 7:30 p.m. at St. Thomas.

Concerning the imposition of ashes for this year, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments has provided the following modification to the rite of the imposition of ashes during liturgies on Ash Wednesday for this year:

The Priest will bless the ashes and sprinkle them with holy water as usual. Then he will address all those present and, only once, will say one of the two formulae found in the Roman Missal. Then, those present will come forward and the priest will sprinkle ashes on the head of each person without saying anything.

The sprinkling of the ashes on the head is the most obvious difference from what we have become accustomed to. It is important to note, however, that the practice of imposing ashes on the forehead in the Sign of the Cross is not a universal practice; in fact, it is an uncommon one. In most of the world, and for most of the Church's history, ashes are imposed by sprinkling on the crown of the head, in keeping with the practice as we find it in the Old Testament.

-I want to make sure that we are all aware that Pope Francis announced a "Year of St. Joseph" on Tuesday, December 8, 2020 in honor of the 150th anniversary of Pope Pius IX's proclamation in 1870 of St. Joseph as "Patron of the Universal Church." Here now and in the next few weeks, I hope to share some additional information regarding this. Fr. Wade Menezes of the Fathers of Mercy offers some great information regarding the Year of St. Joseph. I will be sharing some of what Fr. Wade has written with you here and in upcoming bulletins.

The Decree states that Pope Francis established a "Year of St. Joseph" so that "every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will." The Decree adds that the Pope has granted special Indulgences to mark the year. I will speak more about the Indulgences in future bulletins.

In addition to the Decree, Pope Francis also issued an Apostolic Letter on December 8, 2020 dedicated to the Foster Father of Jesus Christ. The Pope explained in the Letter, titled Patris Corde ("With a father's heart") that he wanted to share some "personal reflections" on the holy and just Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Holy Father said, "My desire to do so increased during these months of the pandemic," noting that many people had made hidden sacrifices during the crisis in order to protect others (just as St. Joseph did with the Holy Family). "Each of us can discover in St. Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed – a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support, and a guide in times of trouble," he wrote. "St. Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation."

In his Apostolic Letter, Patris Corde ("With a father's heart") Pope Francis reflected on the fatherly qualities of St. Joseph, describing him as beloved, tender, loving, obedient, accepting, and "creatively courageous." He also underlined that St. Joseph was a "working father."

There is more in the letter from Pope Francis that I look forward to sharing with you as well as the information concerning the Plenary Indulgences for the Year of St. Joseph.

The Pope concluded his new Apostolic Letter by urging Catholics to pray to St. Joseph for "the grace of graces: our conversion." He ended the text with this prayer and I offer it to you now as I conclude: "Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To you God entrusted His only Son; in you Mary placed her trust; with you Christ became man. Blessed Joseph, to us too, show yourself a father and guide us in the path of life. Obtain for us grace, mercy and courage, and defend us from every evil. Amen."
