Genesis 22:1-2,9a,10-13,15-18;
 Romans 8:31b-34; Mark 9:2-10

It's irony and paradox: Our greatest triumphs often follow our worst setbacks; conversely, our glories in this life are sometimes clouded by unbearable crosses.

Our first reading shows this irony: God had chosen Abraham as his special person; he promised him a homeland. He had given him a son in his and Sarah's old age. Now, apparently, God wanted Abraham to sacrifice his son Isaac! Abraham did not understand, yet he trusted that, somehow, God would bring everything out all right.

Our second reading contains that beautiful statement that if God is for us, nothing can be against us. God did not spare his own Son. He allowed him to be delivered up just for our salvation! What an irony! God spared Abraham's son, but not his own! God loves us with an everlasting love.

The Gospel of the Second Sunday of Lent is always the story of the Transfiguration of our Lord. Mark's Gospel has some very down-to-earth images. He says that Jesus' clothes were whiter than any bleach could make them! Peter, overwhelmed at the scene, says how good it is to be there.

His remark about three booths (or tents) may be a reference to the Jewish festival of Succoth, the most joyful of Jewish days, when booths were erected from which all kinds of presents and sweets came.

Or it may be a reference of reverence, alluding to tabernacles to house the patriarchs and the Son of God. The irony is that the scene concludes with Jesus' statement about his own death. The Transfiguration was intended to strengthen the apostles for the ordeal of the cross.

We are transfigured into the image of Christ by our baptism. We don't see this image, but we must have faith that he is with us and in us. In his strength, we must carry our cross, confident of victory.

Second Sunday of Lent, February 28, 2021

Dear Parishioners,


This weekend we gather to celebrate the 2nd Sunday in our season of baptismal renewal, namely, the season of Lent. As I was thinking about our Gospel for this weekend, if there were any experiences that the apostles enjoyed for which I would be envious it would be the experience of the Transfiguration of Jesus. As this Gospel tells us, there were three apostles who were privileged to enjoy this vision of Jesus, namely, Peter, James, and John. And in the words of Mark, he states, “Jesus was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them.” If I had been in the shoes of these apostles, my response would have been “WOW!” Can you imagine witnessing this glimpse of Jesus’ divinity shining through His humanity. And then to have Moses and Elijah appear on the scene, those two strong figures from the Old Testament tradition conversing with Jesus. As Mark tells us, “The apostles hardly knew what to say.” And then the ultimate Epiphany which states, “A cloud came and a voice said, ‘This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him.’” Once again, this one experience was a memory that they cherished as it would be the strength that they needed to experience another event, namely, Jesus’ suffering and His death on the cross. In the future, they would look upon this experience to sustain them as they suffered the loss of their friend, mentor, and rabbi. And only after this final experience would they finally begin to understand who Jesus truly was and is.

As I said, this experience was an event that we all could use sometime in our lives. With tragedies in life endured by us, we need to have some point of reference which helps us place things in the right perspective, an event that somehow is able to transform us to endure the sufferings of life. And the transfiguration for me is one of those events for which we can draw hope and realize that Jesus has conquered sin and death and there is nothing else to fear. Once again, we need to be reminded, “This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him.” And when we do listen, we too become transfigured in our own lives and need not fear anything, for Jesus has overcome all of our fears and anxieties. Listen to Him and we will find that new and transfigured life.

Once again, just a reminder that we are doing our best to get parishioners back into the celebration of the Eucharist. I know that some still have a fear of returning on the weekends, so we have given you an option to celebrate a Mass on weekday evenings at 6:30 p.m. This Mass gives people an opportunity to celebrate the Eucharist without worrying about social distancing. People are able to sit quite far apart from each other and still celebrate the Eucharist. So come and see and celebrate with us. Also, before these weekday Masses, we are having the celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) from 5:45-6:15 each weekday night. Make this sacrament a part of your baptismal renewal.

Next Tuesday and Wednesday, March 2-3, we will be celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation for all of our students of St. Peter School from 2nd grade to 8th grade. I ask the parish to pray for our young people as they are given the experience of celebrating God’s forgiveness and mercy.

Cemetery Clean-Up

Calvary, St. Boniface and St Peter's cemeteries 2021 clean-up will be held March 15-19. You must have everything off the graves by Sunday, March 14, as clean-up will start early on March 15.

You may leave the shepherds' hooks, but clean-up is a good time to take them home and repaint them. Also if they are rusting you don't want the stone damaged due to the rust dripping on the stone.

Please mark your flowers with the name on the stone and your contact number so if they come off there is a better chance of having them returned to the right spot. Markings should be weather proof if possible.

Lenten Regulations

The season of Lent began this year on Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021 and ends just prior to the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, April 1, 2021, when the Paschal Triduum begins. Lent is the principal penitential season in the Church year. All the Christian faithful are urged to develop and maintain a voluntary program of self-denial (in addition to the Lenten regulations which follow), serious prayer and the performing of deeds of charity and mercy, including the giving of alms.

LENTEEN REGULATIONS – Please share with your parishioners the following Lenten regulations:

1. **ABSTINENCE** – Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
2. **FAST** – Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed.

3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

May this holy season be a time of spiritual renewal for each of us!
