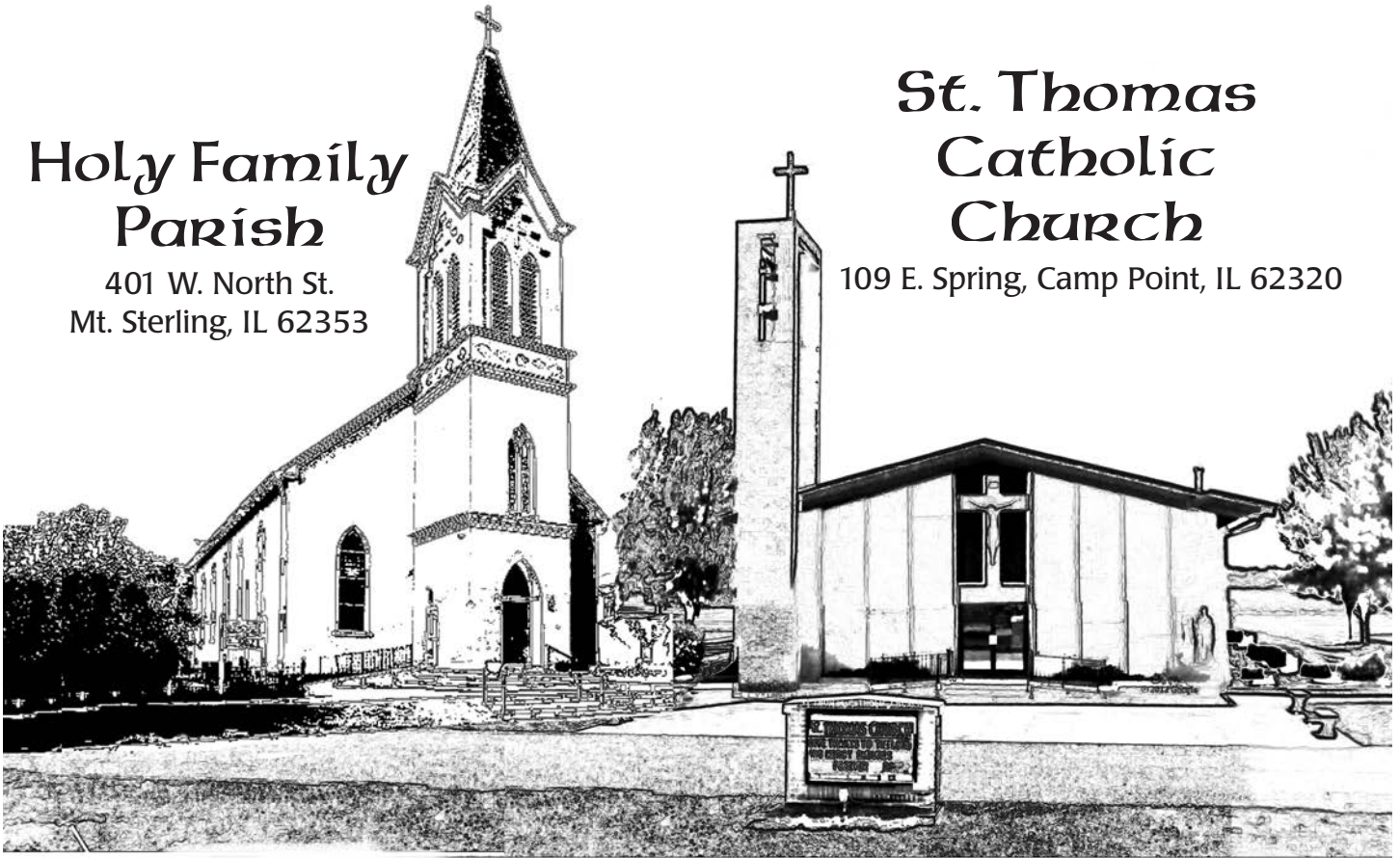

From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Third Sunday of Lent. I sound like a broken record but it's hard to believe...I don't know where the time goes. It's important to continue to ask ourselves how this Lenten Season is going. If we find that we haven't really entered into those spiritual disciplines that we are called to, then begin this very day. If we've already become lax in them, renew your commitment to them this very moment. The Lord is calling

you to greatness, the Lord is calling you to holiness.

With some nicer weather recently, I wonder how many of you have started your “spring cleaning?” Maybe you haven’t started that just yet, but I bet many of you have done it in the past...or at least we call it “spring cleaning.” We start getting rid of all that stuff that has piled up or built up over the year...or however long it’s been.

And how many of you hurry up and start cleaning the house real good as soon as you know company’s coming? And if you’re in a hurry, how full have you stuffed the closets to get things out of sight? Go ahead, admit it, I know most of you have done it. Or, how many times has a car pulled into the driveway unexpectedly and you jump up and say, oh my goodness, who’s that...that’s so and so. Don’t let them in...the house is a mess!

It’s a pretty natural thing to do and I’d venture a bet that most of us can relate to it. I did it at the seminary...I’d hear that our Vocation Director or the Bishop was coming up for a visit and I’d make sure my room was “extra tidy.” One of our Diocesan priests came up for a visit once and I laughed to myself when he said before he arrived, “Don’t worry about cleaning your room” and of course I immediately tidied up the room. In the rectory too, if I know someone is coming to visit, I don’t like things to be out of place.

Well, we can compare that to what is happening in the Gospel today and what the Gospel is calling us to do. Jesus goes into the Temple area and finds it overrun with corruption and selfishness. And what does He do but drive out this corruption and selfishness. Furious about what He had done, the Jewish leaders asked Jesus for a sign to condone what He had done. And Jesus gives them a most baffling response...“Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up.” Baffling because everyone knew that the building of the Temple had been going on for years and it was as if they wanted to say to Jesus, “Yeah right, are you kidding?!” But we’re fortunate to know, and it’s even explained in the Gospel, that Jesus was talking about the Temple of His Body and His death and Resurrection from the dead after three days.

We too, each one of us, can be described as a Temple of the Holy Spirit and this Temple needs to be cleansed as well. Cleansed of what? Anything that might separate us from God, those selfish or self-centered actions. And don’t be fooled, these selfish ways can come disguised in many different ways...pride, laziness, gluttony, envy, greed. They can sneak in and destroy the whole temple. And if we think we don’t or can’t fall into it, well, we’re wrong. Benedict XVI said that “being incapable of acknowledging guilt is the most dangerous form of spiritually arrested development one can imagine because this in particular makes people incapable of improvement.” That’s pretty straightforward and serious. We’ve gotta be on guard against apathy, that lack of interest or concern, so that it does not invade our conscience. Otherwise, we run the risk of the very thing Benedict XVI described.

And this cleansing of the Temple is to promote faith in God. And this faith is not a convenience but rather a commitment. It’s not something we fit into our lives when we can, it’s what our life is centered around, everything about our life. And faith runs deeper than just signs, something that both the Gospel and the reading from St. Paul bring out. Signs can support faith, but they cannot ground it because faith based upon visible signs looks only for the next convenient sign. Eventually though we have to come to trust in the Lord...full and complete trust, conforming our will to God’s Will.

And how does our cleansing begin? First, by looking honestly to our interior self and naming those ways that we separate our self from God, those ways that are selfish and self-centered. This season of Lent is a perfect time set aside to do just that with the intent of continuing that inward looking so that we remain vigilant and can readily acknowledge when we’ve been wrong. Then, we make frequent use of the Sacraments, especially the Sacrament of Reconciliation where we admit what we’ve done wrong, seek God’s forgiveness, and then resolve to change our ways...RESOLVE TO CHANGE OUR WAYS... that’s an important piece of Reconciliation that we can never forget about but all too often we do! And finally, our prayer life is important and we need to deliberately put effort into our prayer life. The best way to

improve in your prayer life is to simply commit to taking the time, each and every day, to pray. Make that commitment and hold yourself to it. In addition to prayer, the other Spiritual Disciplines of Lent, fasting and almsgiving, also help to bring about this cleansing.

And so, may we resolve to acknowledge and drive out from the temple, from our very being, all that might separate us from Christ. We want our homes to be perfect for our guests and we go to great lengths to make it happen. How much more important is it that the temple is made perfect for Christ!

And now a few notes:

-SCRUTINIES - I should point out that there is an option this Sunday to use the readings from Year A (we are currently in Year B). Indeed, those who attend the 5:30 p.m. Saturday evening Vigil Mass at Holy Family will hear the readings for Year A (and so, the above reflection does not coincide with what you will hear...I'd encourage you to take a look at both sets of readings). The other Masses will use the readings from Year B.

Why is that, Father? Well, I'm glad you asked. On this Third Sunday of Lent, we celebrate the First Scrutinies and the readings for Year A are used for this (we will celebrate the First Scrutinies at the 5:30 p.m. Mass at Holy Family).

What am I talking about? Well, I'm glad you asked. The Scrutinies are for the Elect, those who will be Baptized at the Easter Vigil, and are celebrated at a Sunday Mass (or at the Saturday Vigil Mass). The Scrutinies are beautiful rituals given to us by the Church to help those who are journeying toward Baptism and entry into the Church that their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ may be deepened. The Scrutinies are Rites of the Church for self-searching and repentance and have above all, a spiritual purpose. The Scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the Elect; to bring out, then strengthen, all that is upright, strong, and good. The Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the Elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

There are 3 Scrutinies that occur on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent. Following the First Scrutiny, the Elect are presented with the Creed. Following the Third Scrutiny, the Elect are presented with the Lord's Prayer (the Our Father).

We have a number of folks who will be Baptized and more who will come into full communion with the Church at the Easter Vigil. I ask you to continue to keep all of these folks in your prayers.

-LENTEN REGULATIONS - 1. ABSTINENCE - Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. 2. FAST - Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed. 3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

-ADDITIONAL MASSES DURING LENT - Wednesday evenings, 5:30 p.m. at Holy Family. Thursday evenings, 5:30 p.m. at St. Thomas.

-ADDITIONAL CONFESSION TIMES - I will be offering the Sacrament of Reconciliation before each of the additional evening Masses during Lent...Wednesday evenings, 4:45-5:15 p.m. at Holy Family and Thursday evenings, 4:45-5:15 p.m. at St. Thomas. I will also offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation on Sundays during Lent before the start of the Stations of the Cross. I will try to be in the Reconciliation Room by 12:45 p.m. until 1:15 p.m.

-STATIONS OF THE CROSS - Wednesday evenings after the 5:30 p.m. Mass at Holy Family. Friday evenings, 7:00 p.m. at St. Thomas. Sunday afternoons at 1:30 p.m., alternating parishes (Sunday, March 7 will be at St. Thomas, Sunday, March 14 will be at Holy Family).

-40 DAYS FOR LIFE - St. Thomas has the 40 Days for Life Calendar in the Back of Church. Please sign-up for one or more days to pray for life during Lent.

-RICE BOWLS - Are in the back of each church. Please consider taking one and using it as part of the Lenten Season and your own Lenten practices.

-FISH FRIES - A reminder that Fish Fries will be held each Friday evening during March at St. Thomas for Catholic Heart Work Camp.

-PRIEST MEETING - The priests of the Diocese will be meeting Tuesday and Wednesday, March 9 and 10. Please keep us all in your prayers. Because of these meetings, there will be no 7:00 a.m. Mass on Wednesday, March 10. However, Deacon Mike will do a Communion Service at 7:00 a.m. A reminder that there will be Mass at 5:30 p.m. at Holy Family that evening.

-DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME - Don't forget, Daylight Savings Time begins next week, Sunday, March 14. Remember to set your clocks up.

-SPIRITUAL REFLECTION - During this Season of Lent, I share with you this excerpt of Spiritual Reading from the Dolorous Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ by Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich. May our time spent reflecting on it help to cleanse us and aid us in our growth in holiness as we enter more deeply into the Paschal Mystery. "Jesus trembled and shuddered as He stood before the pillar, and took off His garments as quickly as He could, but His hands were

bloody and swollen. The only return He made when His brutal executioners struck and abused Him was to pray for them in the most touching manner: He turned His face once toward His Mother, who was standing overcome with grief; this look quite unnerved her: she fainted, and would have fallen, had not the holy women who were there supported her. Jesus put His arms around the pillar, and when His hands were thus raised, the archers fastened them to the iron ring which was at the top of the pillar; they then dragged His arms to such a height that His feet, which were tightly bound to the base of the pillar, scarcely touched the ground. Thus was the Holy of Holies violently stretched, without a particle of clothing, on a pillar used for the punishment of criminals; and then did two furious ruffians who were thirsting for His blood begin in the most barbarous manner to scourge His sacred body from head to foot."
