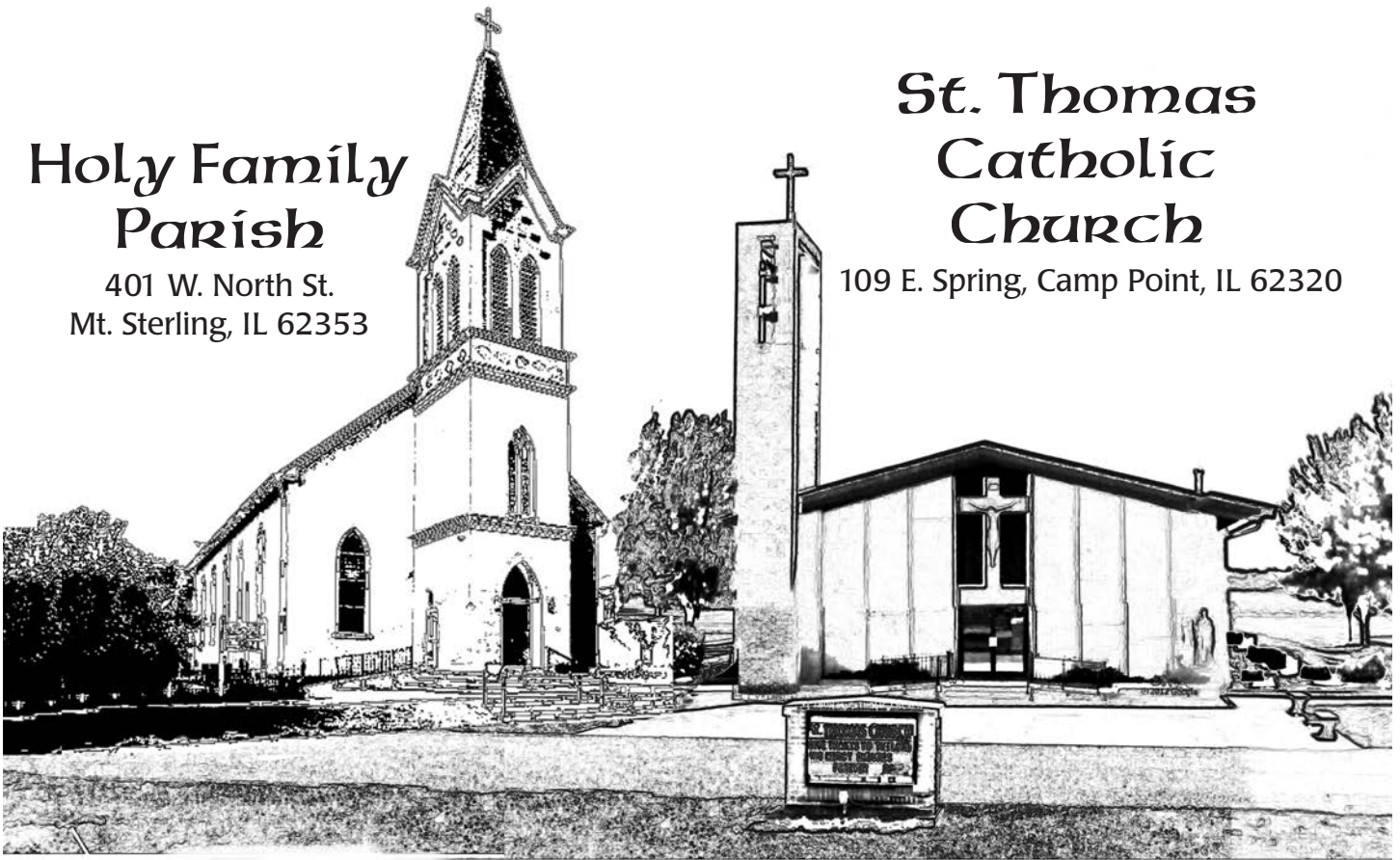

From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Fifth Sunday of Lent and we are now just a week away from the start of Holy Week. For many of us, the Lenten season has probably seemed to be going rather quickly. We may even be planning our Easter celebrations already. And while it's good for us to look forward to our celebration of the Paschal Mystery and the joy of Easter, we're also reminded that we remain in the season of Lent, we remain on our Lenten journey to the Paschal Mystery. We're reminded that we still have work to do, today, this week. And that work can't be neglected.

I'm reminded of an e-mail I received from our Vocation Director a couple of months before my Ordination to the Priesthood. The message was concerning the upcoming ordination and details surrounding it. He ended the message

saying that “This is an exciting time, to be sure. Keep the gas pedal down on your formation. Finishing strong is a sign of your love for the people to whom you will be serving. To be a priest is to make a total gift of self, and doing that now in formation is a good gauge of your ability and willingness to do so when you’re ordained!”

This strikes me as being reflective of our own Lenten journey, each one of us. While the Vocation Director was specifically speaking of my formation for priesthood, we can each apply that to our own lives in some way, but in particular to our growth in the Spiritual Life and our need to journey with others to bring them to Christ.

Over the past few weeks, there seems to have been a lot of intrigue in the readings, especially the Gospels. Just last week, we heard the comparison of the Son of Man being raised up like the serpent in the desert. The week prior, we heard Jesus telling the Jewish officials how he would raise the destroyed Temple in just three days although everyone knew the building of the Temple had been going on for years. And the week prior to that, we heard the story of the Transfiguration and how Jesus told the disciples who were with Him not to tell anyone about it until the Son of Man had risen from the dead. In today’s Gospel, we have folks asking to see Jesus and when He hears this, what does He do but go off talking about a grain of wheat, being troubled, and glorifying God. A lot of intrigue.

Imagine for a moment those who initially heard all of this and think about what they must have thought. And think too about the Cross. For so many, death on the Cross seemed like the ultimate shame. And sadly, for many still today, the Cross has no significance. We as Christians are fortunate to have our faith and to know that the Cross points to life, it points to our salvation. We have some understanding of what is going on in all of this but again, imagine those who first heard this...imagine those who hear it today, those who look upon the Cross and don’t understand.

And so, as we remain focused on our earthly journey, I’d like to break today’s

Gospel into three parts and offer us something to reflect on today and this week. First is the request of some to “see” Jesus. Now surely these people had heard of Jesus and they were coming to see if this was someone they could indeed follow. Seeing Jesus is to enter totally into His way of thinking, to begin to understand why He had to suffer, die, and rise from the dead. And so, I ask each of us: Have we seen Jesus? Who is it that intersects our life that wants to see Jesus and how do we respond to those folks? How do we show them Christ and how do we show them that we can and do follow Him?

Second, Jesus speaks of self-giving when He speaks of the grain of wheat. We might ask ourselves: What are my priorities? What am I selfishly clinging to? How can I more fully give my life so that I and others may enjoy Eternal Life with the Father? We are reminded that many people quietly give their lives each and every day.

Third, Jesus speaks of God’s Glory. Jesus glorifies God by obeying the Will of the Father. Obeying the Will of the Father is to serve God AND others in love and humility. And so we might ask ourselves: What is keeping me from conforming my will to God’s Will? Is my service to God and to others done out of pure love and humility...or are there self-serving notions directing my work?

Finally, we know, from hearing Christ’s own words in today’s Gospel, that Jesus was troubled but accepts the Will of the Father for our salvation. Today’s Gospel beautifully affirms that God’s love does not save anyone from suffering on earth or from physical death. But, we are assured that the faithful enjoy the presence of God now and in the life to come. May this be a guiding principle for our Christian lives.

This is an exciting time, to be sure. Keep the gas pedal down on your Lenten journey. Finishing strong is a sign of your love and your humility. To be a Christian is to make a total gift of self, and doing that now during Lent is a good gauge of your ability and willingness to do so throughout your entire Christian life and to be an example for others to follow, ultimately giving glory to

God and enjoying Eternal Life with the Father. May the Lord continue to strengthen each one of us on this Lenten journey.

And now just a few notes:

-As we now enter into the Fifth Week of Lent and given the reflection above, I want to again encourage you to ask yourself each day how your Lent is going. Be honest with yourself. If it's going well, great, thank God for a good Lent thus far and ask Him to help you be sustained in your Lenten disciplines and grow in your spiritual life. If it seems you have let your Lenten disciplines fall short, then renew yourself this very day. Ask God for His help and be open to it. It does little to seek God's help but remain closed to what He offers us. And what He offers is overflowing grace and goodness. May we always be truly open to it.

-THIRD SCRUTINIES - This weekend we celebrate the Third and final Scrutiny for those who will be receiving all three Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil. I spoke more about the Scrutinies in previous bulletins. Immediately after the Third Scrutiny this week, the Elect will be presented with a copy of the Lord's Prayer. We continue to look forward to when they and the other Candidates will come into full Communion with the Church at the Easter Vigil. Please keep the Elect and all those coming into the Church in your prayers.

As was the case last week, this week we have the option of using the readings from Year A or Year B. At the Mass with the Third Scrutiny we use the readings from Year A. For the other Masses, we use the readings from Year B. Again, I spoke more about that in previous bulletins. My reflection above on the Scriptures for today uses the readings for Year B.

-SOLEMNITY OF THE ANNUNCIATION - This Thursday, March 25, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord. This is a significant celebration in the Church and thus has been raised to a Solemnity, the highest celebration in the Church. This is one of just a few Solemnities celebrated during the solemn season of Lent. Masses that day will be at 7:00 a.m. at Holy Family and 5:30 p.m. at

St. Thomas. I encourage each of you to join us for Mass for this Solemnity.

-BARN-2-BARN CLASSIC - It's almost here, the much anticipated Barn-2-Barn Classic, this Saturday, March 27. Registration from 11:00 a.m. - Noon at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. You may register online at the Brown County Deer Classic website (www.bcdeerclassic.com) or by contacting Aaron Akins by e-mail (aakins@dotfoods.com) or by phone (217-322-7099). Cost is only \$120 for a 4-person team which includes 9 holes of golf plus an evening meal sponsored by B&N Trucking served at Ridge View Winery. This should be a fun event for everyone, so be sure and get registered if you haven't already and extend an invitation to others to join in the fun as well. I'm looking forward to a great day! The Barn-2-Barn Classic helps support St. Mary School.

-FISH FRIES - There are a couple of Fish Fries coming up. These will be some of the last for the Lenten season. Mt. Sterling Council Knights of Columbus Fish Fry is Friday, March 26 at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. Serving will be from 5:00-7:00 p.m., dine in or carry-out. St. Thomas Fish Fry for Catholic Heart Work Camp is also Friday, March 26. This will be drive through only, served from 5:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m.

-ADDITIONAL MASSES DURING LENT - Wednesday evenings, 5:30 p.m. at Holy Family. Thursday evenings, 5:30 p.m. at St. Thomas.

-ADDITIONAL CONFESSION TIMES - I will be offering the Sacrament of Reconciliation before each of the additional evening Masses during Lent...Wednesday evenings, 4:45-5:15 p.m. at Holy Family and Thursday evenings, 4:45-5:15 p.m. at St. Thomas. I will also offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation on Sundays during Lent before the start of the Stations of the Cross. I will try to be in the Reconciliation Room by 12:45 p.m. until 1:15 p.m.

-STATIONS OF THE CROSS - Wednesday evenings after the 5:30 p.m. Mass at Holy Family. Friday evenings, 7:00 p.m. at St. Thomas. Sunday afternoons at 1:30 p.m.,

alternating parishes (Sunday, March 21 will be at St. Thomas, Sunday, March 28 will be at Holy Family).

-LENTEN REGULATIONS -

1. ABSTINENCE - Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
2. FAST - Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed.
3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

-HOLY WEEK - Next Sunday is Palm or Passion Sunday and marks the beginning of Holy Week. Palms will be blessed and distributed at each Mass. I encourage you to consider now how you will enter into Holy Week this year. The Mass and Service schedule for both parishes is below.

-TRIDUUM AND EASTER SCHEDULE -

Holy Thursday: 5:00 p.m. at St. Thomas; 7:00 p.m. at Holy Family (both parishes will have Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament after Mass). Good Friday: Stations of the Cross at St. Thomas, 11:00 a.m.; at Holy Family, 3:00 p.m. Services at 5:00 p.m. at St. Thomas and 7:00 p.m. at Holy Family. Holy Saturday: Easter Vigil beginning at 8:00 p.m. at Holy Family. Easter Sunday: 6:30 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Masses at Holy Family; 10:00 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. Masses at St. Thomas.

-HOLY THURSDAY - I need to have at least 2 people (or 2 couples) sign up to be present with the Blessed Sacrament after the Masses at both parishes. Of course, anyone is both welcome and encouraged to spend some time in prayer that evening in front of the Blessed Sacrament but since I will be having Mass at both parishes, it will be necessary to make sure there is someone always present with the Blessed Sacrament as I cannot be at both places the entire time. I will put a sign-up sheet in the back of each Church. For St. Thomas, I will likely need

folks starting at 6:00 p.m. through 11:00 p.m. At Holy Family, I will need folks from 8:00 p.m. through Midnight. Again, I encourage everyone to spend some time that evening in prayer with the Blessed Sacrament but am asking that I have at least 2 people at all times who can sign up for an hour and commit to being present. If you miss the sign-up sheet, just give me a call at the rectory (217)-773-3233.

-As I've already mentioned, I have eliminated the sign-ups for Masses. I will continue to evaluate this and make changes as necessary. Along the same lines, I have eliminated the live stream of the Masses. I will be evaluating some other options that I might consider doing in the future. I'll keep you posted.

-While I do not have the space to speak more on this in today's bulletin, I find it necessary to remind all of us of what the Lord tells us in the Gospels. As He gives us the Church and the fullness of Truth in it, and as He gives authority to Peter and his successors, the Lord says "And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." I offer this as an encouragement to each of us as our world seems to be filled with so much darkness or at least that is how some try to make it appear. But this promise from the Lord Himself is a powerful one and hopefully brings you great encouragement in living out your faith.

Additionally, there seems to be so much hostility to the Truth of Christ proclaimed and the Church Herself. Some try to define what they think the Church should be. The Church, my friends, is a gift from God to us. It is the Lord who gave us the Church and the fullness of Truth. Man cannot change Truth to satisfy oneself and the Church "cannot bless sin." We are challenged to live the Truth and witness to the Truth. Frankly, it doesn't matter what the critics of Christ or His Church or His Truth think or "feel." Truth and Love is not a feeling but the way to our salvation, the greatest good we have and hope for.

Thank you all for your prayers and support for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church.

Please know of my continued daily prayers for you as well. May you have a most blessed week.
