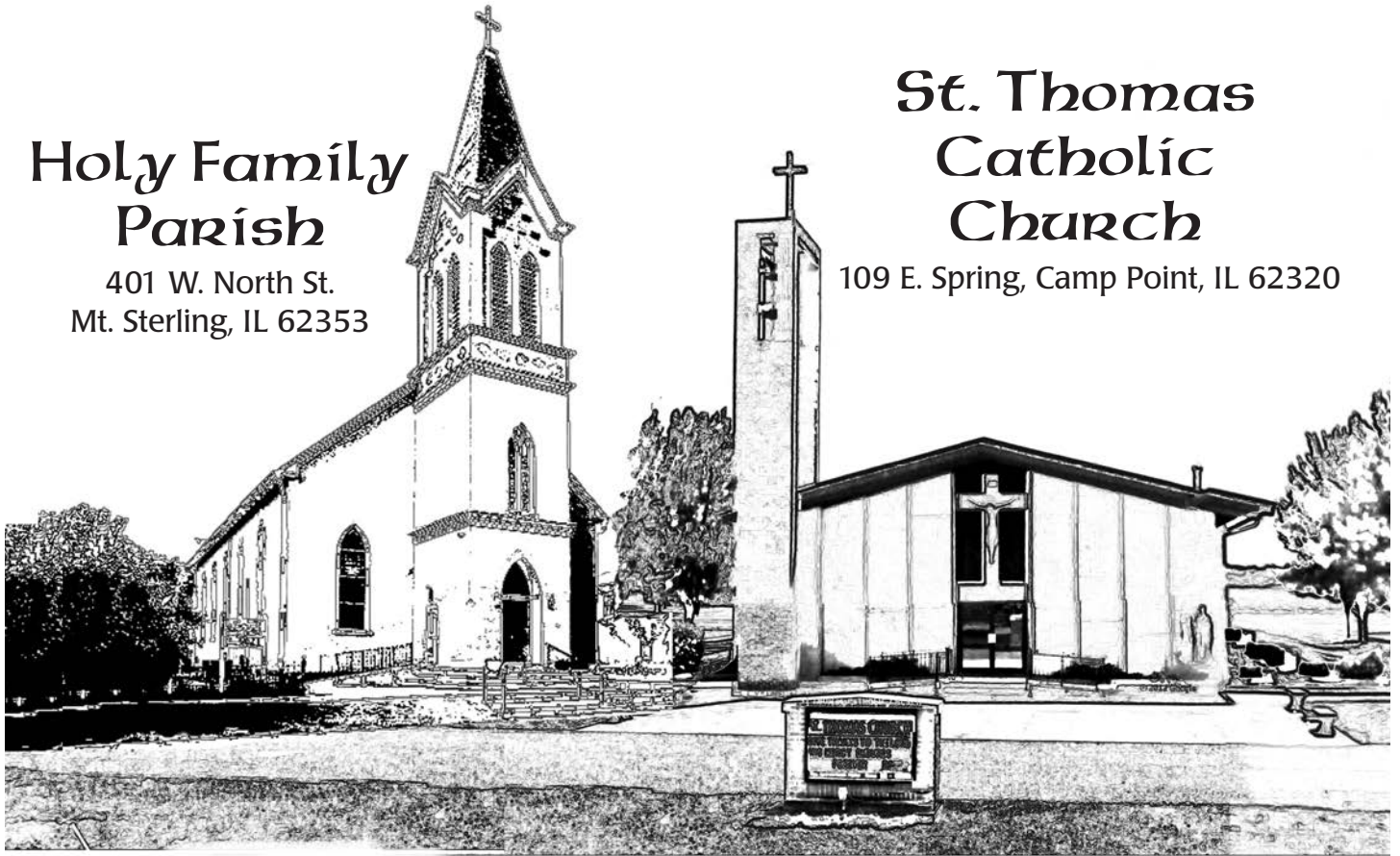

From the Pastor's Desk

“Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know his father and mother?” These are the words that we find the people in today's Gospel murmuring. In those rhetorical statements, they are saying something more like, “who does Jesus think He is, anyway, saying the things He does? He's nothing more than a common man, a carpenter's son. He's nobody.”

Today the Church celebrates the Nineteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time. We too can find ourselves asking or being asked “who is Jesus.” And as Christians, we should be able to answer that question. If we can't, we need to take time to reflect on really who Jesus is. To come to know Jesus and to draw closer to Him is always a response on our part, a response to God's invitation. You see, the murmuring people in today's Gospel are given the invitation to know and draw closer to Christ. But they are not responding.

Honestly, we can do that ourselves sometimes. We may not like to think it, but we can be just like the murmuring folks in today's Gospel. Jesus comes in various ways and through all kinds of people in our lives, inviting us to love and to serve Him. Yet, we can miss that invitation time and again and fail to respond to it when we look down upon others, scorn others, ridicule others, engage in gossip, fail to listen, or dismiss others as being a “nobody.” When we do those things, we reject God's invitation to us

to draw closer to Him. We also reject God's invitation to us when we fail to respond to what He is calling us to do in our lives (our vocation, our work in the Church, our support of the Church and Her mission, the passing on of the faith, whatever it might be).

When people become complacent or comfortable with what they have, they can begin to assume ownership and claim rights to things they possess instead of having gratitude over things that are offered. Many people, including many of us from time to time, miss the opportunity to receive a gift because they refuse to see it as a gift. And that's what has happened in today's Gospel. The people there saw Jesus only as a carpenter's son and couldn't believe or accept the invitation that Jesus was something more.

But Jesus answers that question of who He is in today's Gospel. He says “I AM the Bread of Life.” First, Jesus identifies Himself with God by saying “I AM.” This is the very name for God. And then Jesus says “I am the living bread that came down from heaven.” Certainly, there is a strong connection to the Holy Eucharist here. But it's not just about the Holy Eucharist. And don't get me wrong or hear what I am not saying. Indeed, the Eucharist IS the source and summit of the Christian life. And we are called to celebrate and share in the Holy Eucharist, that which sustains us and gives us life. But when Jesus says He is the living bread come down from heaven, it involves His whole way of life. His teaching, His attitude, His relationship with the Father and with others, and everything that the Gospel tells us about Jesus. This wholeness of Jesus is the wholeness that we strive for and is the real food and nourishment for our daily living. Not to know and strive to follow Christ's example is to be starved of essential nourishment for living a full life.

Now if we find ourselves saying yes, but what do we do when we find the pressures of daily life overwhelming us. What can we do when we just feel like giving up, when we find ourselves asking if it's all worth it. Well our first reading today from the First Book

of Kings is a great example for us. Elijah was spiritually exhausted. He felt like giving up. But Elijah never abandoned God. Rather, he prayed and was open to God's Will. So too, our remedy to that feeling of being overwhelmed at times in our daily struggles of life, is to pray and to be open to God's Will. Like Elijah, we will be fed, given food for the journey and strengthened by that food. And that food is fulfilled in today's Gospel. That food is Jesus, the Bread of Life, the Living Bread come down from Heaven. We need only accept Jesus' invitation.

And finally, St. Paul in our second reading today, reminds us that we are sealed with the Holy Spirit and that our response to God's invitation to follow Him and deepen our relationship with Him calls us to become what we receive. We are challenged to confront sin, evil, and selfishness and to be instruments of peace and justice. We are to be a sign of Christ in the world, authentic witnesses to Christ's message. And so we work to rid ourselves of bitterness and anger and abusive or insulting criticism and instead show kindness, and compassion, and forgiveness to everyone we meet so that we and others may be drawn closer to Christ and spread His Kingdom here on earth so that one day, by partaking in the Bread of Life, we may all share Eternal Life with the Father in Heaven.

And so, as we continue to live out our Christian lives, let us reflect on that question of who Jesus is and how our lives reflect that to others, asking the Lord to help rid ourselves of anything that prevents us from being imitators of Christ. Let us remain open to the Will of God, making Him the primary food and nourishment of our lives so that we might taste and see and experience how good the Lord is.

And now just a few notes:

-LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, August 9 - Optional memorial of St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, Virgin and Martyr. St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross was born Edith Stein in Breslau,

Germany (now Wroclaw, Poland) in 1891 to Jewish parents. She studied Philosophy under Husserl. Inspired by the writings of St. Teresa of Avila, she was baptized on January 1, 1922. She taught in various schools for ten years until she was forced to resign because of anti-Semitism. In 1893 she entered the Discalced Carmelite Convent in Cologne where she received the name Teresa Benedicta of the Cross. At the end of 1939 she moved to the convent in Echt, Holland on account of the Nazi persecution of the Jews but in 1942, during the German occupation of Holland, she was arrested, transported to Poland, and killed on August 9 at the Nazi concentration camp at Auschwitz. She was declared co-patroness of Europe by Pope St. John Paul II. St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, Pray for us!

-Tuesday, August 10 - Feast of St. Lawrence, Deacon and Martyr. St. Lawrence is said to have cared for the temporal welfare of the Roman Church. He was martyred in 258, four days after four other deacons and Pope Sixtus II were killed. It is said that he was burned alive on a gridiron. After Saints Peter and Paul, St. Lawrence is venerated as patron of Rome. He is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I). St. Lawrence, Pray for us!

-Wednesday, August 11 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Clare, Virgin. St. Clare of Assisi was a disciple of St. Francis and founded the Poor Clares. She was known to have lived an austere life, rich in the practice of charity and loving care. She died in 1253. St. Clare, Pray for us!

-Thursday, August 12 - Optional Memorial of St. Jane Frances de Chantal, Religious. St. Jane Frances de Chantal was a wife and mother of six children, two of whom died at birth. As a widow, with St. Francis de Sales, her Spiritual Director, she founded the order Visitation Nuns and established some eighty-five monasteries before her death on December 13, 1641. St. Jane Frances de Chantal, Pray for us!

-Friday, August 13 - Optional memorial of Saints Pontian, Pope and Martyr, and Hippolytus, Priest and Martyr. St. Hippolytus was a stern rigorist.

He and Pontian were both exiled to Sardinia where they would eventually reconcile. St. Pontian was Martyred in 235 and St. Hippolytus was martyred in 235 or 236. St. Hippolytus is credited as being the source of Eucharist Prayer II. Saints Pontian and Hippolytus, Pray for us!

-Saturday, August 14 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Maximilian Kolbe, Priest and Martyr. Maximilian Kolbe was born in Poland and was a Conventual Franciscan Priest (O.F.M.Conv.). He founded the Militia of Mary Immaculate, missioned in Japan, and offered his life in exchange for the father of a family at Auschwitz in 1941. He was killed by lethal injection. St. Maximilian Kolbe, Pray for us!

-SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION - The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is August 15. This year, that falls on a Sunday (next Sunday). This Solemnity is a Holy Day of Obligation. The celebration of this Solemnity takes precedence over the Twentieth Sunday of Ordinary Time. Thus, at both the 5:30 p.m. Vigil Mass on Saturday, August 14 and at the Masses on Sunday, August 15, we will be celebrating the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Since the Holy Day falls on a Sunday, participation in the Vigil Mass on Saturday evening or a Mass on Sunday fulfills the obligation for Sunday and the Holy Day. Ordinary Time continues despite this and so on Sunday, August 22, we will be celebrating the Twenty-First Sunday of Ordinary Time.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary celebrates Mary being assumed into Heaven, body and soul. It is one of the Marian Doctrines of the Church. What a splendid celebration!

-FUNERAL - Just to clarify and to remind you, the Funeral Mass for Don Tooley is scheduled for Friday, August 20 at 10:30 a.m. at St. Thomas. There is no visitation prior to the Funeral Mass and burial will be private. Everyone is welcome to attend the Funeral Mass. Although Don died on July 15, this date was chosen for the celebration of the Funeral Mass for Don.

Please keep Don and all those who have died in your prayers.

-START OF SCHOOL - The first day of School at St. Mary's is coming right up, August 18. We look forward to having the kids back with us.

-FRIDAY MASSES - School Masses will resume on Friday, August 20. These Masses are at 8:30 a.m. **With the start of this school year, Mass every Friday at Holy Family will be at 8:30 a.m. regardless of school being in session. This will continue into the school breaks and next summer. There will be no 7:00 a.m. Mass on Fridays beginning August 20.** This should help to eliminate any confusion over Mass times when school is not in session.

-PSR - PSR/Bosco Kids at Holy Family will begin on Wednesday, September 15. Registration will be the week prior, Wednesday, September 8. Please be on the look-out for more information. Contact Ann O'Sullivan with any questions. We may still need one more PSR/Bosco Kids teacher. Please let Ann or myself know if you are interested in helping.

-RCIA - Are you or someone you know interested in joining the Catholic Church? Our next RCIA will begin on Wednesday, September 22. Please contact Ann O'Sullivan or myself for more information.

-RECONCILIATION - I am going to be changing the times for the Sacrament of Reconciliation at Holy Family. Currently, Reconciliation is scheduled for Saturdays from 4:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. I will begin hearing confessions at 4:30 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. or until we are finished up until the start of the evening Mass. This is such an important Sacrament for all of us and so I will begin looking at offering another time during the week for the Sacrament at both parishes. The bulletin cover will be updated for these changes but those updates can sometimes take a few weeks.

-ICE CREAM SOCIAL - St. Thomas' Ice Cream Social is next week, Wednesday, August 18 from 4:30 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. at the parish hall. Advance orders for gallons of homemade ice cream to take home can be

-FINANCIAL REPORTS - Just a reminder, we are working on preparing the end-of-fiscal-year reports and I hope to make the end-of-year financial report available to you for each parish sometime in mid to late August. At that time, I will also provide the budget for the current fiscal year.

-CAPITAL CAMPAIGN - To date, there has been just over \$400,000 contributed for the much-needed projects on the Church at Holy Family. Though we have not seen any work begun, things continue to move forward. We need to make sure we have adequate cash on hand to begin projects that must be completed simultaneously. The roof and bell tower are of greatest priority right now and must be completed together. We should have enough cash to not just begin but to complete these two portions but even so, we have to wait for the availability of the contractors as well. There are other needs that need to be addressed as soon as possible also. This is a very large project that is taking a great deal of planning and will be going on for some time. I will be meeting with a representative from Renaissance Roofing this week to discuss some issues. Following that, I am hoping to get us on their schedule for the roof and bell

tower. Thank you for your continued support.

Thank you for your continued prayers and support for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. You remain in my daily prayers. May each of us grow in virtue and holiness each day in all that we do. May you have a most blessed week.
