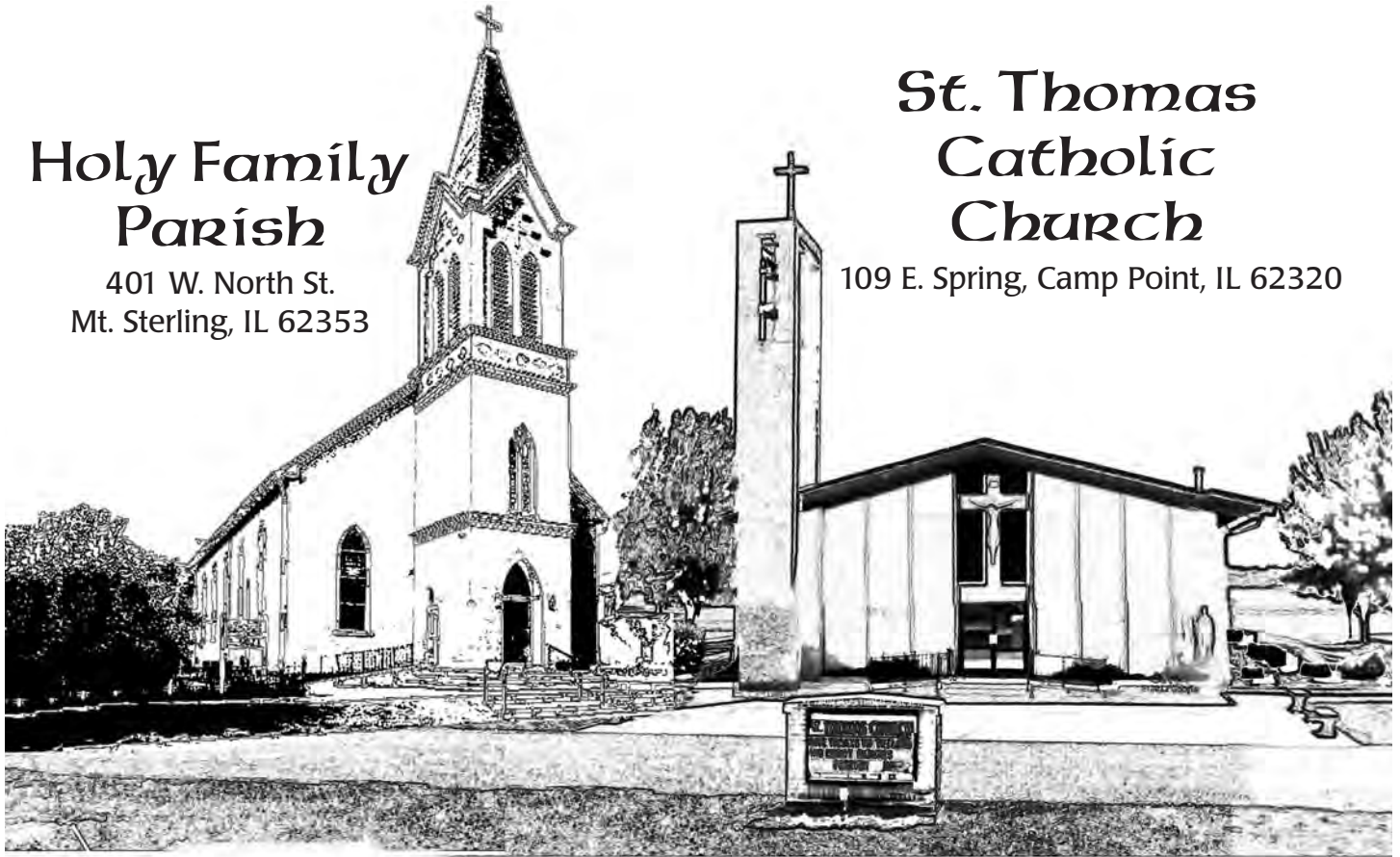

## From the Pastor's Desk

When we get used to something or comfortable with something or we've been around something for a while or have been doing something for a long time, we can tend to take some of those things or parts of those things for granted. And we can begin to fail in recognizing its value or significance. This can be with people, with things, with attitudes, whatever it might be.

Take, for example, water or electricity. We use both every day, probably, for most of us, without even thinking about it. We have become accustomed to going to the faucet and getting water or flipping a switch and having light. In fact, we've come to expect it. Or, how about someone we live with or work with every day. How often do we find ourselves bothered or frustrated with something they do rather than recognizing and appreciating the

gifts and value they bring into our lives. Or the attitudes either we have or experience from others. Sure, we all have difficult days, but an attitude is extremely influential on us and others around us. If our usual demeanor is off, folks will recognize that. They will know something is different with us. But an attitude, positive or negative, is one of those things we get comfortable with, comfortable in the sense that we don't even recognize it sometimes.

Today the Church celebrates the 23rd Sunday of Ordinary Time and the Scripture readings for today are a perfect example of this for us as well. In fact, those of us brought up in the faith are especially prone to becoming complacent at times with our faith. We have learned our faith and we hear the priest preaching to us every Sunday. We know what we're doing. We have heard these same Scripture passages before. We know that God loves. We know that Jesus works miracles...I mean, that's what we heard in the Gospel today, right? We know the Golden Rule...treat everybody good. And we know that some old people from a long time ago tried to tell people how to live and tell them about God, just like that guy in the first reading today. There is really nothing I don't know already. Like I said, that Gospel we just heard is just about Jesus doing another miracle.

Not when, not if, but when this kind of complacent thinking begins creeping into our daily lives, we need to be honest and courageous enough to admit it to ourselves and we need to deliberately seek a closer relationship with Christ so as to grow in our spiritual life and our holiness.

Yes, our Gospel does speak of Jesus' miracle when he cured the deaf man. But the Gospel, along with our other readings, teach us so much more. And they are indeed relevant to each one of us today, just as much so as they were in centuries past. Having gotten "used to" the Sacred Scriptures" doesn't make them irrelevant to us. We may fail to recognize their

significance and value but that is not the fault of Scripture nor an indication of an advancement in the spiritual life. It is certainly an indication of complacency and possibly even self-centeredness or self-glorification.

So, how are today's readings we heard significant to us? Well, in our Gospel, Jesus does more than just cure. Yes, He does that, but He also gives hope. And the grateful reaction of the man is to proclaim God's mercy. So too, we recognize what we see as shortcomings in ourselves. We can let these "shortcomings" discourage us and allow us to fall into despair OR we can let these shortcomings challenge us to grow and to lead us to greater faith as we listen to and understand what the Lord is calling us to.

What we need to come to realize is that we sometimes look but don't see or we sometimes hear but don't listen. And then we need to ask ourselves, what is it that is getting in the way of me hearing and seeing? And we need to honestly ask ourselves that each and every day in order to grow more fully in our spiritual life. Otherwise, we risk complacency, blindness, and deafness; and we fail to recognize, much less be grateful for, God's love and mercy, and the many gifts He has bestowed upon us and continues to do so, especially in those around us and whom we encounter each and every day. And without being able to recognize this and being grateful for all of this, we are also unable to proclaim God's mercy to others.

And, just as Jesus gives hope, so too we are called to give hope. Our first reading calls us to do just that. Through our baptism, we are each called to be a prophet. And a prophet's job, yes, is to proclaim God's word, but also to comfort the afflicted and to afflict the comfortable. In times of desperation, the words of hope can cure and restore as we heard fulfilled in the Gospel. And so, we might ask ourselves how we can work to pass on the Good News of Sacred Scripture and its message of hope to others and how those

words can also draw others out of complacency and blindness and deafness.

To examine our own lives to see if and how we've heard the message, we might take a look at the second reading from St. James and ask ourselves how we encounter different kinds of people. The Lord comes to save all, even those who are shunned. If we're honest with ourselves, we know there have been times we've acted toward others just as St. James describes. We might seriously reflect on what our attitude is toward wealth and poverty, who we regard as rich and who we regard as enriching, and what kind of wealth it is that we are in pursuit of. Our TRUE and HONEST answer to these questions will help to reveal how much we've really heard the Word of God.

And so, as we continue to live out our Christian lives in the hope of the glory of Eternal Life with the Father in Heaven through our holiness here on earth, let us pray for the gift of hearing; to hear the voice of God calling to us in everything that will happen today and in the days to follow. And let us pray for the gift of speech, to be filled with the liberating experience of knowing Jesus that we simply cannot keep from sharing that experience and gratefulness with all those around us.

And now just a few notes:

#### LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Wednesday, September 8 - Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This day we celebrate the birth of Mary, the Mother of God. What a beautiful celebration. It coincides, of course, with the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception that we celebrate every year on December 8. We look to Mary as the perfect example for us of how to live a perfect Christian life, how to always say yes to God, and how to endure the sufferings of this life. Mary is not only a great example for us but also a powerful intercessor. Devotion to our Blessed Mother is so very powerful and I

personally have a devotion to Mary. Mary, Mother of God, Pray for us!

- Thursday, September 9 - Obligatory Memorial in the United States of St. Peter Claver, Priest. A Catalonian Jesuit who served the Columbian Mission in Cartagena. St. Peter Claver devoted himself to caring for African slaves, baptizing some 300,000, and calling himself "the slave of the slaves forever." He died on September 8, 1654. St. Peter Claver, Pray for us!

- POPE'S INTENTION - The Holy Father's intention for September is an environmentally stable lifestyle. We pray that we will all make courageous choices for a simple and environmentally sustainable lifestyle, rejoicing in our young people who are resolutely committed to this. As a personal note, many in our parishes here at St. Thomas and Holy Family have embraced the sustainability of our land and environment for years and continue to do so through their conservation efforts of soil and water and through the simplicity of life that is embraced.

- LABOR DAY - Monday, September 6, is Labor Day. This, of course, is not a Liturgical Celebration but we do recognize the great gift and value of work and workers throughout the world. May St. Joseph, patron of workers, guide and protect each and every person in the work they do.

- SEPTEMBER 11 - Saturday, September 11, marks the anniversary of the tragic events of September 11, 2001. We pray for an end to terrorism in the world and we pray for those who lost their lives on that day. We also honor all firefighters, police officers, and emergency medical technicians who serve our local community.

- K OF C MEETING - The Mt. Sterling Knights of Columbus meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 7, at 7:00 p.m. at the Council Hall. I encourage all of our members to attend if you are able.



- NEW APOSTOLATE - We are bringing the Seven Sisters Apostolate to St. Thomas and Holy Family. We are initially looking for seven women from the parishes to commit to praying one hour each week for the pastor. Claudia Coggeshall is spearheading this for us. Please contact her or me if you are interested and to get more details. After the Seven Sister Apostolate is formed, then there is an opportunity to form a men's group as well. I look forward to our participation in this Apostolate.

- DCCW CONVENTION - The 92nd Annual Springfield Diocesan Council of Catholic Women is scheduled for Wednesday, September 29, 2021, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at Hamilton's South Ballroom in Jacksonville. Guest speaker is Coleen Kelly Mast. This is open to all women in the Diocese, and I encourage you to consider attending. The Quincy Deanery DCCW is also "re-establishing" itself, and I encourage all women of the parishes to learn more about it and become involved in it. You will be seeing more information going forward. In the meantime, you can contact Claudia Coggeshall or me for more information.

- RELICS - As I wrote in last week's bulletin, I have an opportunity to possibly host first class relics of St. Padre Pio at one or both of the parishes for a day. This is really a great opportunity. There is a cost involved in hosting the relics, primarily for security and protection of the relics. If you are interested in financially helping us bring the relics to one or both of the parishes for veneration, please let me know. It would be a most wonderful opportunity for all of us to be able to host these relics and I look forward to making it a reality.

- PRAYERS - I once again encourage all of us to keep in our daily prayers the many needs of our parishes and our parishioners, our communities, our Church, and the world, those needs known and unknown to us. Our prayers

of intercession are both necessary and powerful.
