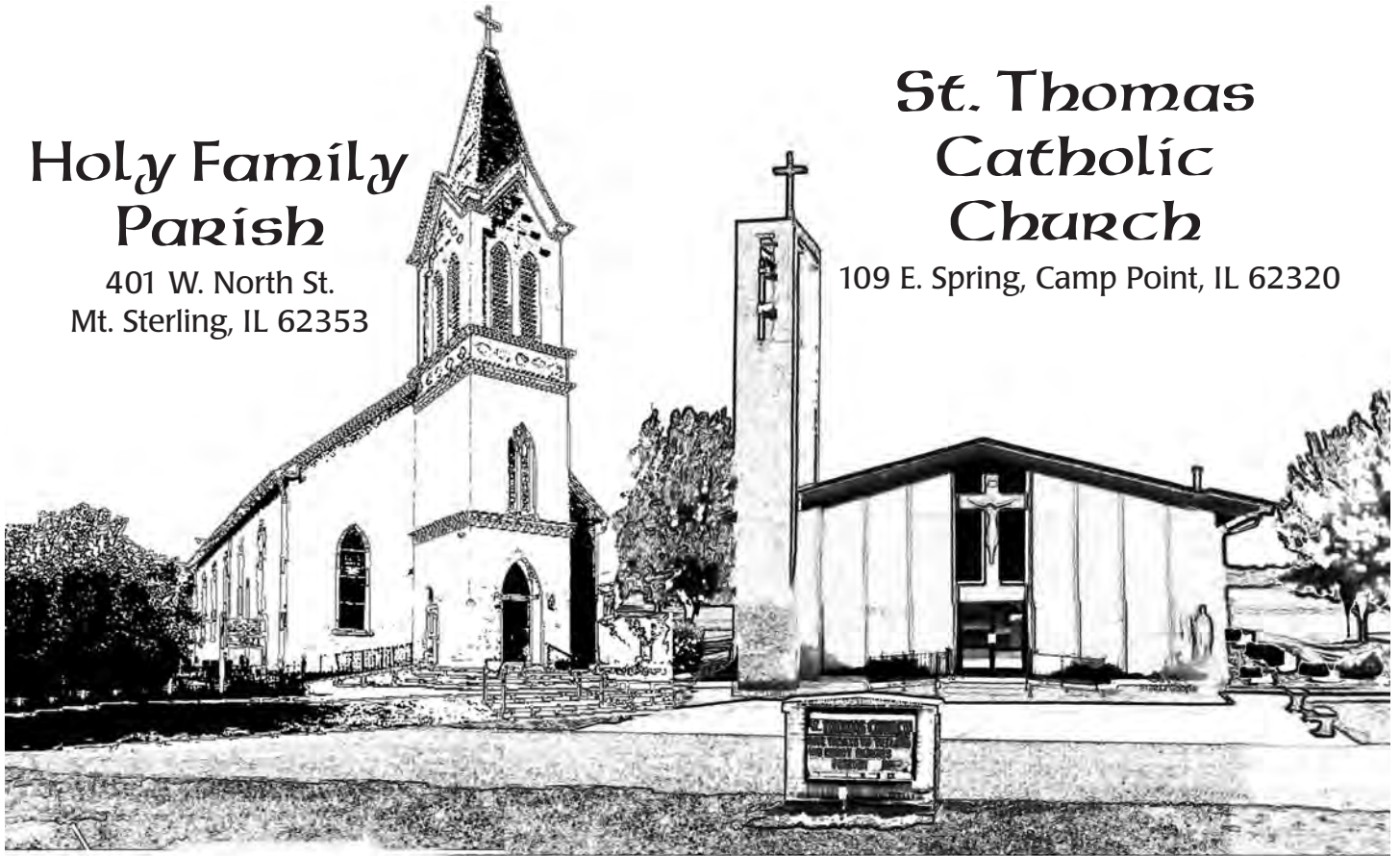

From the Pastor's Desk

Anything that threatens the structure of marriage and family life is serious. There really is no other "nice" way to say it. Unfortunately, divorce has become more commonplace and there is no longer shock in hearing about a divorce. And, in fact, it is often left open as another viable option even when entering into the marriage covenant.

This commonplace of divorce has caused an indifference, of sorts, among folks. It is similar to our own spiritual life and sinfulness. Now first off, let me explain. Don't hear what I'm not saying in that. Yes, divorce is a matter of serious concern, and while it is more widespread than ever, it is painful. In no way am I pointing a finger at someone who is divorced and calling out sinfulness. What I am saying is that when ANYTHING becomes more commonplace, whether it be divorce, or sinfulness, or disrespect, whatever it is, the more it becomes commonplace, the easier it is to become indifferent to it, to fail to recognize its impact. And that's what I mean when I compare the indifference toward divorce to our own spiritual life and sinfulness. I am not equating the two; I'm drawing out similarities to help us better understand our growth in holiness.

As a side note, there are many, many attacks against marriage, family life, Christian life, and life in general. This includes, but is certainly not limited to, same-sex unions, transgenderism, pornography, promiscuity, cohabitation, fornication, and so forth. These things seek to erode the sanctity of the human person, and the sanctity of marriage and family life by attempting to normalize that which is both unnatural and immoral. This attempt comes in a number of ways including direct attacks, but also in more covert ways. We must always be on guard against, and be willing to speak out against these attacks, lest they become commonplace, and we become indifferent to it and the erosion of morality that these things bring.

As we return now to the readings for the day, understanding God's design for family life helps us understand the covenant of marriage and the place of marriage in God's plan of creation. Today, the Church celebrates the Twenty-Seventh Sunday of Ordinary Time, and as we heard in today's Gospel, a man and a woman, through marriage, form a unity. They become one. The two become one flesh, the Lord says. They become co-creators with God. The two are not a mere association but rather a generator of humanity. That is powerful. Seen only as an association, the permanence and fidelity of marriage is minimized or wiped away. Seen only as an association, we simply have two single persons who have decided to make their life more pleasant, more pleasurable, more self-centered.

By now you may have either tuned me out or you may be thinking to yourself, "Yeah Father, I hear what you're saying, and I even agree with some of it, but you just don't understand." And if you're speaking specifically of living a married life itself, you're right; I'll never really understand that. But I do come from a family, I do encounter families every day, I do re-commit myself to God every day. I have desires and longings. I struggle with sinfulness, and I struggle with always keeping God at the center of my life. That

can be difficult for any of us to recognize and admit. And in saying that, I'm not trying to prove my credentials or to make myself a martyr. I am not trying to exempt myself from anything or to make myself part of something. And that's exactly where today's readings move beyond just the topic of marriage and divorce. Yes, they speak to these things, but there is so much more there, something so much deeper. The readings speak to each one of us, regardless of our state in life.

Take a look at that first reading from Genesis. The first line itself speaks to each one of us and reveals a significant truth about each one of us: "The Lord God said: it is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a suitable partner for him." This speaks directly to relationship, our need for others and our need for relationship. Each one of us has a need for the other. Married couples, single people, priests and religious. Don't let that shock you. Don't think to yourself, "Father, I can't believe you would say that about yourself or the priesthood." That kind of thinking shows a lack of understanding of what real relationship is all about. Relationship isn't about self-centered interests and pleasure and pleasurable acts. Now in marriage, certainly that relationship involves pleasurable acts but not for the sake of pleasure itself. A relationship based on pleasure alone is really no relationship at all. It is self-centered gratification. Unfortunately, this can be seen both within and outside of marriage, and our culture's emphasis on sexuality creates a mindset of anything goes, I can do whatever I want. It is all about me. But any true relationship - and again, regardless of our state in life, we all need relationship - any true relationship is based on trust, respect, and unconditional and disinterested love of the other. And it is so important to understand what unconditional or disinterested love is...it is love that desires and wills the good of the other for the sole purpose of the person's good, with no expectation of anything in return. Disinterested love does not refer to us

having no interest in love, that is not true. Disinterested love has removed from it any self-seeking or self-serving motives.

Understanding marriage and understanding relationship requires each of us to understand our vocation, our state in life and where God is calling us. The vocation of married life, as are all vocations, is a beautiful vocation to live out; to unconditionally love another in a very special way and to bring life into the world and to nurture that life. A vocation to marriage, lived out to the fullest and most authentic way, will not be absent of trials and struggles and difficulties. It will bring pleasure and it will bring hardship. But most importantly, it will bring peace and joy and contentment.

The vocation of single life, or those who are single now and perhaps are being called to marriage or religious life, is also a beautiful vocation. Again, this vocation, lived fully and authentically, will not be absent of trials and struggles and difficulties but it will bring great joy and peace when lived out according to God's plan for you.

And the vocation to the priesthood and religious life is also a beautiful vocation. Sometimes it is looked at as suitable for "someone else" or there is pressure to resist such a vocation. But again, this vocation, lived fully and authentically, will not be absent of trials and struggles and difficulties but it will bring great joy and peace and contentment when lived out according to God's plan.

And relationship is key for any of these. It seems more obvious in marriage for folks. But, let me tell, my relationship with each one of you is life giving and valuable. And my close friends help to sustain me. Some of you have already made a huge positive impact on my priesthood, on my prayer life, and in my own spiritual life. The way you faithfully and authentically live out your vocation, whether that be single or married, even in the midst of difficulty, impacts me in such a profound way. Seeing you trying each

day to fully live out God's call for you gives me strength and courage and motivation to continue to live my vocation as fully and authentically as possible despite hardships and setbacks.

And so, as we each continue to live out our Christian lives, let us do so in the most authentic and perhaps radical way that God is calling us as we strive to not only know the importance of relationship, but also live in right relationship with God and with one another in the midst of a world pulling us in so many other directions. Let us pray for God's grace so that we might persevere always in right relationship and our growth in holiness.

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Monday, October 4 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Francis of Assisi - A deacon, not a priest. He founded the Franciscan Family which includes the Friars Minor (Capuchins, Conventuals, and Leonine Union), Poor Clares, Third Order Religious, and Secular Franciscan Order. St. Francis received the stigmata on September 14, 1224. He is noted for his charismatic personality, deep compassion for all, and love for God's creation, renouncing wealth to live a life of poverty. He died on October 3, 1226, and was canonized just two years after his death. He is the patron of Italy and ecologists. St. Francis of Assisi, Pray for us!

- Tuesday, October 5 - Optional memorial of Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos. Born in Germany in 1819, he entered the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, sent to North America, and was ordained a priest in 1844. He began his pastoral ministry in Pittsburg and would eventually become a full-time itinerant missionary, preaching in both German and English in a number of different states. He died on October 4, 1867, in New Orleans and declared Blessed by Pope St. John Paul II on April 9, 2000. Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos, Pray for us!

- Wednesday, October 6 - Optional memorials of St. Bruno, Priest and, in the United States, Blessed Marie Rose Durocher, Virgin.

St. Bruno sought to “seek God assiduously, to find God promptly, and to possess God fully.” He founded the mother house of the Carthusians whose motto is “While the world changes, the Cross stands firm.” St. Bruno died in 1101. St. Bruno, Pray for us!

Blessed Marie Rose Durocher was born in Quebec and began the first Canadian parish sodality for young women. She founded the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary for Christian Education. She died in 1849 at the age of thirty-eight. Blessed Marie Rose Durocher, Pray for us!

- Thursday, October 7 - Obligatory Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary - This Memorial was established by Pope St. Pius V in thanksgiving for the victory at Lepanto on October 7, 1571, and recalls the Holy Rosary and its meditations on the Mysteries of Christ and our Salvation. Our Lady of the Rosary, Pray for us!

- Saturday, October 9 - Optional memorials of St. Denis, Bishop, and Companions, Martyrs and St. John, Leonardi, Priest.

St. Denis was the first bishop of Paris, martyred in 258 along with the priest, Rusticus, and the deacon, Eleutherius. St. Denis and Companions are the patron of Paris and France. St. Denis and Companions, Pray for us!

St. John Leonardi founded the Congregation of Clerics Regular of the Mother of God. In 1579 he founded the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and published a complete compendium of Christian Doctrine. He and St. Philip Neri cofounded the Collegio Urbano in Rome which, under the direction of the Congregation for the Evangelization of the Peoples, trains priests for the foreign missions. He died in 1609 in Rome. St. John Leonardi, Pray for us!

- RESPECT LIFE MONTH - October is designated as Respect Life Month and Sunday, October 3, is designated as Respect Life Sunday. We remain mindful of the tragedy of abortion that kills thousands of babies each year and our need to continue to pray for an end to abortion and to work for the protection of all human life in all stages. While abortion is a great tragedy, Respect for Life is much broader than just abortion. When we hear respect for life, our thoughts often turn to the tragedy of abortion, but respect for life is also about respect and care for the poor, the family, our own bodies, and so on. Disrespect seems to be everywhere today. Again, I encourage you to spend some additional time, this month especially, in prayer and sacrifice for the respect for life and to work against all those things opposed to life. There are many!

- MONTH OF THE HOLY ROSARY - October is also known as the month of the Holy Rosary. As noted above, we celebrate the Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7. I would encourage you to pray the Holy Rosary each day, especially with your family. The Holy Rosary, as we meditate on the Life of Christ through the Mysteries, is a most beautiful and powerful prayer. If you are unsure on how to pray the Rosary, there are pamphlets in the back of each church to help you, or please reach out to me and I'd be happy to help.

- PRIEST CONVOCATION - As you all know, I was away from the parishes a couple of weeks ago attending our Diocesan Priest Convocation. Thank you for your prayers. While it is always good to be with the other priests, I am happy to be back in the parishes.

- BAPTISM - Last Sunday, September 26, I baptized Ashtyn Michelle Llewellyn at St. Thomas during the 10:00 a.m. Mass. Ashtyn Michelle is the daughter of Andrew and Amanda Llewellyn. What a great joy it is to have celebrated the Baptism. We welcome Ashtyn Michelle as a daughter of God and into our faith community and extend our warmest wishes to her parents and family.

- THANK YOU - Thank you to all who helped support the St. Mary School Hog Roast on Sunday, September 19. It was a great success, and it was so good to see many of you there.
