From the Pastor's Desk

As the Church celebrates the Thirty-First Sunday of Ordinary Time, we are reminded that God's command to love challenges us to put Him first and to love our neighbor as ourselves.

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength." What does it mean to love God in this way? Certainly, it means that God should be our "center." Our life should revolve around him. He should be first in our thoughts, in our actions, and in our hearts. It means we must nurture our spiritual relationship with God through daily prayer, by learning all we can about Him, by reading Sacred Scripture, and through participation in the sacraments.

Loving God in this way also means following another commandment: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love of self in this command is not vain or selfish in that it is directed toward the higher good of caring for and protecting this life, which God has given us, in service of Him. We are made in the image of God. That alone makes us worthy of love.

Self-love requires us to take care of our basic needs. We make sure we are fed, clothed, and sheltered. Then we reach beyond and indulge our wants as well. We spend time and energy doing things we enjoy, seeking joy, and surrounding ourselves with the people and activities that please us. For a moment here, you might think I'm headed down the wrong path because certainly that self-love is not about what we want and desire and

neither is our love for others. Rather, all of this is good and beautiful, but only when our lives themselves are ordered toward praise of God.

In the same way, we must love others. This is, after all, not merely a suggestion. It is a command. Loving our neighbor is not passive. It requires action. It calls us to reach out and provide for the needs of others; to share our time, our talents, and our resources with our neighbor; to invite them into God's embrace and give comfort and love freely to those who need it.

And if we model our love after the Father's love, we must reach beyond our own circle. God's love is unconditional. He does not offer His love to only a few. He loves everyone, even those we might think are unlovable. His command to love our neighbor goes well beyond our circle of family and friends. It includes our enemies and those who are different from us; it includes all people. No one is excluded from our responsibility to love them. No one.

Clearly, following this command is not always easy, but it is expected of us, nonetheless. Sometimes it requires forgiveness and putting aside judgment. Fortunately, when we ask, God will provide all the grace and strength we need to put His command into action.

And now a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Monday, November 1 - Solemnity of All Saints. This is a high celebration in the Church as it has been elevated to a Solemnity. We celebrate those who have gone before us who now enjoy the glory of Eternal Life with the Father in Heaven. May their holiness of life always be an example to us, and may we always be reminded that they now share in what our ultimate end is. We ask the intercession of all the Saints.

The Solemnity of All Saints is normally a Holy Day of Obligation where one is

required to participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. In the United States, since the Solemnity falls on a Monday this year, it is not a day of obligation for this year. Still, it is celebrated as a Solemnity and is significant. I will be celebrating Masses at both parishes that day...7:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. at Holy Family, and 5:30 p.m. at St. Thomas. The 8:30 a.m. Mass will be a school Mass but, as always, everyone is welcome to join us. I do encourage each of you to celebrate Mass with us that day.

- Tuesday, November 2 - The Commemoration of all the Faithful Departed (All Souls Day). Rooted in ancient Christian Tradition, St. Odilo of Cluny established a memorial of all the faithful departed in 988. It was accepted in Rome in the 13th century. All Souls Day is also significant, but sadly has become dismissed by many as just another day. While it is always appropriate and necessary to pray for the dead, All Souls Day sets aside a day especially for this. Again, we remember those who have gone before us, and we pray for the eternal redemption of their souls.

With the significance of All Souls Day and the importance of praying for the dead, I will be offering Masses this day at both parishes as well...7:00 a.m. at Holy Family and 5:30 p.m. at St. Thomas. I hope that you will be able to join us for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass on this day as we pray for the dead.

- Wednesday, November 3 - Optional memorial of St. Martin de Porres, Religious. St. Martin de Porres was born in Lima, Peru of a Spanish father and a black slave mother. A lay brother of the Order of Preachers, he humbly ministered to the poor and the sick, especially African slaves. He was a close friend of St. Rose of Lima and devoted to the Holy Eucharist. He is the patron saint of social justice and of people of mixed races. St. Martin de Porres, Pray for us!

- Thursday, November 4 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Charles Borromeo, Bishop.

Charles Borromeo was a Cardinal and Secretary of State at age twenty-two for his uncle, Pope Pius IV. He implemented reforms of the Council of Trent in his diocese of Milan and was considered a model pastor by many bishops including St. Francis de Sales. He held five provincial councils and eleven diocesan synods. He is the founder of seminaries and the patron of catechists and of catechumens. He died on November 3, 1584, at the age of forty-six. St. Charles Borromeo, Pray for us!

- POPE'S INTENTION - The Holy Father's Intention for November is people who suffer from depression. We pray that people who suffer from depression or burn-out will find support and a light that opens them up to life.

- NOVEMBER - During November, we are called in a special way to remember "our brothers and sisters who have fallen asleep in the hope of the Resurrection" (Eucharistic Prayer II). The month of November, especially All Souls Day, is also a traditional time for visiting graves of loved ones. I encourage you to keep all the faithful departed in your prayers each and every day and especially during the month of November, and to also visit the graves of your loved ones.

- FIRST FRIDAY - Friday, November 5 is First Friday. We will be having our First Friday Devotion at St. Thomas with Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from Noon until 5:45 p.m., Benediction at 5:45 p.m., and Mass at 6:00 p.m. The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available from 5:00-5:45 p.m. I encourage everyone to spend some time in prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament and to join us for the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. I also encourage folks to regularly receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

- NOCTURNAL ADORATION - Saturday, November 6, is First Saturday. Nocturnal Adoration will begin at 10:00 p.m. Saturday evening at Holy Family and run through 7:45 a.m. Sunday morning.

Benediction will be at 7:45 a.m. followed by the regularly scheduled 8:00 a.m. Mass.

- DONUT SUNDAY - Sunday, November 7, is the first Sunday of the month which means "Donut Sunday" at St. Thomas. We are in need of folks to take turns spearheading this each month. Please contact Robin Coggeshall to let him know with which month you can help.

- TURKEY DINNER - Just a reminder that the Holy Family Turkey Dinner is next Sunday, November 7. It will be served drive-thru only at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Make your plans now to come and get your delicious meals to enjoy, and don't forget to get your name in for the raffle. There are some great prizes to be had. Thank you to everyone for all your hard work and your support of the Turkey Dinner.

- DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME - A reminder that Daylight Savings Time ends on Sunday, November 7. At 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, clocks are set back one hour. If you arrive an hour early for Mass, wonderful...spend an extra hour in prayer!

- VOCATION AWARENESS - Sunday, November 7, marks the beginning of National Vocation Awareness Week. I will be speaking more on vocations, but I do encourage each of you to pray for and do all you can for good and holy vocations. Please continue to join folks across the Diocese to pray one Hail Mary at 4:40 p.m. each day that our Diocese may have 40 seminarians.

- ANDREW DINNER - There will be an Andrew Dinner on November 22 in Quincy. These dinners are for young men, high school age on up, who may be interested in the Priesthood or are considering a vocation to the Priesthood. Dinner is with the Bishop and priests of the deanery and, of course, other young men in the Diocese. I want to encourage all of you to consider a young man you know who may have a calling to the Priesthood

and encourage him to attend. Or perhaps there is a young man himself reading this who may be feeling called to the Priesthood, or to at least learn more about it. Please contact me as soon as possible so I can make reservations and arrangements. Certainly, the Lord continues to call men to the Sacred Order of Priesthood. I suspect there are men in our parishes whom the Lord is inviting to learn more about the Priesthood. Please open yourself up to how the Lord is calling you.

- PADRE PIO RELICS - I am still looking at hosting the relics of St. Padre Pio. I've been on a momentary hold since all dates for this calendar year for hosting are filled. Very soon, I will be in contact with the Foundation again to begin securing a date.

In the meantime, our own Cathedral will be hosting the relics of St. Padre Pio. This is scheduled for the weekend of November 6 and 7. The relics will be available for public veneration at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Springfield following the 4:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, November 6, until 8:00 p.m., and then again following the 10:00 a.m. Mass on Sunday, November 7, until 4:30 p.m. These are some wonderful opportunities. I know this is a busy weekend especially for Holy Family, but I thought it important that we get the information out. I look forward to our parishes being able to host the relics locally, as well sometime next year. What a great and blessed opportunity!

- BROWN COUNTY DEER CLASSIC - The annual Brown County Deer Classic is back and scheduled for Saturday, November 13. I encourage everyone to take part. This is an important fundraiser for St. Mary School, but also a wonderful opportunity for so many of us to come together. The Saturday evening Vigil Mass that evening will be at 4:00 p.m.
