From the Pastor's Desk

Today, as we approach the end of the Liturgical Year evermore, the Church celebrates the Thirty-Second Sunday of Ordinary Time. Our readings today remind us to give all we can in recognition of a God who loves us so much that He gave His only Son for us.

In today's Gospel, Jesus contrasts the widow's two coins with the lavishness of the scribes who did things only for show and not for the glory of God. Far from using their wealth and influence to help the less fortunate, Jesus said they devour the houses of widows, enriching themselves while making the poor even poorer. Jesus admires the widow's action and extols her virtue because she makes a total gift of all that she has to God.

The widow in the first reading is in completely different circumstances, but she, too, makes a total gift, in this case to the prophet Elijah. The context for this story is that no rain has fallen in the lands for three and a half years. The drought was meant to remind the people to depend on God at a time when they were worshipping pagan idols. The widow in that first reading worshipped Baal, the god of the storm, but

her prayers for rain went unanswered, and thus she has little in the way of food.

Then Elijah appeared. He asks her for something to eat and though she does not have much, she shows him hospitality with what she does have, and this act of selfless charity is greatly rewarded... her jar of flour does not run empty, and the jug of oil does not go dry. They eat for a year. What she has invested by giving her all is returned to her a hundred-fold.

Even more wonderful, in the next few verses which we do not hear today, through the power of God, Elijah will raise her son from the dead.

When the prophet fed her and her son for a year, the widow came to believe that Elijah was a prophet. When he gave her son his life back, she came to believe in the God of Israel.

These two widows gave all they had for God, and though it wasn't much in monetary or material terms, it shows a great love. The challenge for all of us, of course, is to become as free as the widows were, to give all we can in recognition of a God who loves us so much that He gave His only Son for us.

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Tuesday, November 9 - Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica. This day marks the anniversary of the dedication of the Cathedral Church of Rome on land owned by the Laterani family by Pope St. Sylvester I in 324. The Lateran Basilica is honored as the Episcopal Seat of The Pope as Bishop of Rome. According to an inscription which Pope Clement XII placed on the façade, this Basilica is the "Mother and Head of All Churches of Rome and the world." The present structure was commissioned by Pope Innocent X in 1646. Beneath its High Altar rests the remains of the small wooden table on which, according to tradition, St. Peter celebrated Mass. It was dedicated to the Savior and later to St. John the Baptist.

- Wednesday, November 10 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Leo the Great, Pope and Doctor of the Church. St. Leo the Great was a well-known Pastor and preacher and a defender of the Roman Primacy. He was a great combatant of heresy, especially Pelagianism (in short, denies Original Sin and Christian Grace), and Manichaeism (a dualistic religion whose cosmic dualism of God and Satan is unacceptable to any monotheist who believes in One Supreme God of goodness). His extensive and scholarly writing on Christ's Two Natures was accepted by the Council of Chalcedon in 451. He is known to have saved Rome from marauding Huns and Vandals. Many of St. Leo's prayers are found in the Roman Missal. He died in 461. St. Leo the Great, Pray for us!

- Thursday, November 11 - Obligatory memorial of St. Martin of Tours, Bishop. St. Martin of Tours was a soldier turned Christian at the age of eighteen. He was a disciple of St. Hilary and founded the first monastery in the West. He was the Bishop of Tours and was the first non-martyr with an annual feast in the Western Church. He died in 397 and is the patron of soldiers, wine producers, and France. St. Martin of Tours, Pray for us!

- Friday, November 12 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Josaphat, Bishop and Martyr. Josaphat was born in Poland, raised Ukrainian Orthodox, and became a Basilian monk of the Ruthenian Rite at Vilna. His fidelity to the Roman See and his desire for union between the Ukrainian Church and Rome led to his murder. He died in 1623 and is the first formally canonized saint of the Eastern Rite. St. Josaphat, Pray for us!

- Saturday, November 13 - In the United States of America, Obligatory Memorial of St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, Virgin. St. Cabrini was from Lombardy and the youngest of thirteen children. She founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart and for twenty-eight years labored in the United States and South America. She established some sixty-seven institutions including schools, hospitals, and orphanages. She died

in Chicago on December 22, 1917, and was the first U.S. citizen to be canonized, in 1946. She is the patroness of immigrants and migrants. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, Pray for us!

- TURKEY DINNER - A final reminder that the Holy Family Turkey Dinner is Sunday, November 7, serving from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., drive through only at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. Don't miss getting some delicious meals and your chances for some great raffle prizes.

- DONUT SUNDAY - Sunday, November 7, is "Donut Sunday" at St. Thomas. Please join us after the 10:00 a.m. Mass in the Parish Hall. We are also in need of folks to take turns spearheading this each month. Please contact Robin Coggeshall to let him know with which month you can help.

- DEER CLASSIC - The Brown County Deer Classic is almost upon us. It is Saturday, November 13. Check out their website for more information and to purchase tickets and items. There is also a link to the online auction. The website is www.bcdeerclassic.com. A reminder that the Saturday evening Vigil Mass that evening, November 13, will be at 4:00 p.m. at Holy Family.

- THANKSGIVING DAY MASSES - Looking ahead for those making plans, I am planning to offer a Thanksgiving Day Mass at each parish, 7:00 a.m. at Holy Family and 8:30a.m. at St. Thomas. As you make your plans for Thanksgiving Day, why not start the day off with the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass!

- NOVEMBER - A reminder that during the month of November especially, we remember and pray for the dead. Please pray for the repose of the souls of all the faithful departed.

- EXODUS 90 - Exodus 90 is a Catholic-based program for men paralleling the Old Testament story of Exodus to help them gain freedom from modern distractions and addictions and to grow in a deeper relationship with Christ. In it, men are challenged to commit to a 90-day exercise

combining prayer, asceticism, and fraternity. Exodus 90 can be started at any time and is often begun 90 days prior to Easter. There will be an informational meeting about this program on Thursday, November 11, at 6:00 p.m. at the Quincy Council Knights of Columbus. For more information, contact John McDowell (217-440-8187) or Aaron Kerkhoff (217-316-9203).

There are many ways that the Lord invites folks to deepen their faith. This may be a great opportunity for some of the men in our parishes. We remain mindful that such opportunities (this and many others) may not be for everyone, and that these opportunities are not the end-all of our faith but should always be entered into as a way of deepening our faith and our participation in the Mysteries of the Faith. We must always keep God at the center of our lives, not something else, and we need to avoid falling into "the next best thing" that comes along. With that said, I encourage all men who are interested to go and learn more about this opportunity.

- CROCHETING & KNITTING - I am interested in getting together a group of ladies for each parish who specifically crochet and/or knit...perhaps other handiwork as well as we form these groups. I have some projects I'd like for these ladies to consider working on. If you crochet or knit or do other kinds of handiwork, please let me know and also let me know if you would be willing to head-up a group of ladies in the parish. Please do not be afraid to step forward...I promise I only want to meet with you initially to talk about the projects I'd like to see these groups of ladies do.

- RETURNING HOME - Although we certainly do not want to rush the end of Ordinary Time and we certainly do want to enter into the Season of Advent fully, Christmas will be here before we know it. And while we can and should always invite those who are away from the Church back to the Church, Christmas is an especially appropriate time. I encourage you to personally do just that. However, I would

also like to make a personal effort to do the same, and I need your help doing so.

If you know of someone who is away from the Church, and in particular our parish, I would like to send them a personal invitation to come back and join us, especially for our Christmas Liturgies. It would be great if I could include your name in that invitation as well, although I will certainly respect your desire not to have that done. So, if you know of someone away from the Church, I'd ask you to consider giving me their name and mailing address (if you have it), and to let me know if I may use your name in the invitation that I send. I ask you to prayerfully consider this and look at it as an opportunity of great love to bring others back to the Church, not an opportunity to brow-beat or embarrass someone.

Also, this is primarily for those who are away from the Church. If you know someone interested in joining the Church, wonderful, but that is more for RCIA. You are welcome to give me those names as well, but please make the distinction.

For any names submitted, I will keep them confidential, but I do ask that you include your name and your phone number even if you prefer that I do not use your name in the invitation. This will help if I have any questions. Again, if you do not want me to use your name in the invitation, I won't. Just make that clear on what you submit. I will likely not send invitations to folks who are submitted anonymously. If you'd like to share any brief information on the person that you think I would find helpful, please feel free to do so.

I am hoping to put together a little form that you can use for this and either have it in the bulletin or in both churches. In the meantime, you can get me the information a number of ways...by e-mailing me, giving it to me (written out) at Mass, or by dropping it in the mail or by the office. Any questions, please let me know.

- VOCATION AWARENESS - This Sunday, November 7, marks the beginning of National Vocation Awareness Week. I encourage each

of you to pray for and do all you can for good and holy vocations, especially to the Priesthood and Religious Life. Please continue to join folks across the Diocese to pray one Hail Mary at 4:40 p.m. each day that our Diocese may have 40 seminarians.

- ANDREW DINNER - There will be an Andrew Dinner on November 22 in Quincy. These dinners are for young men, high school age on up, who may be interested in the priesthood or are considering a vocation to the Priesthood. Dinner is with the Bishop and priests of the deanery and, of course, other young men in the Diocese. I want to encourage all of you to consider a young man you know who may have a calling to the Priesthood and encourage him to attend. Or perhaps there is a young man himself reading this who may be feeling called to the Priesthood or to at least learn more about it. Please contact me as soon as possible so I can make reservations and arrangements. Certainly, the Lord continues to call men to the Sacred Order of Priesthood. I suspect there are men in our parishes whom the Lord is inviting to learn more about the Priesthood. Please open yourself up to how the Lord is calling you.

- PADRE PIO RELICS - As I mentioned in last week's bulletin, I am still looking at hosting the relics of St. Padre Pio. I've been on a momentary hold since all dates for this calendar year for hosting are filled. I will be in contact with the Foundation again soon to begin securing a date.

In the meantime, our own Cathedral is hosting the relics of St. Padre Pio this weekend, November 6 and 7. The relics will be available for public veneration at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Springfield following the 4:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, November 6, until 8:00 p.m., and then again following the 10:00 a.m. Mass on Sunday, November 7, until 4:30 p.m. These are some wonderful opportunities. I look forward to our parishes being able to host the relics locally, as well sometime next year. What a great and blessed opportunity!

- ST. THOMAS CHURCH - Just a reminder, we now have folks who have graciously agreed to unlock and lock St. Thomas Church during the week so that the church is open during the day for folks to stop in and make a visit and pray. I am very grateful for this. These folks have the locking and unlocking of the church arranged among them. I ask that if you have a key to the church and find it unlocked when you are there, please DO NOT lock the doors. Again, the folks doing this have it worked out and go out of their way each day to unlock and lock the church.

Thank you for all you do and for your continued prayers and support for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. You remain in my prayers each day. May you have a most blessed week.
