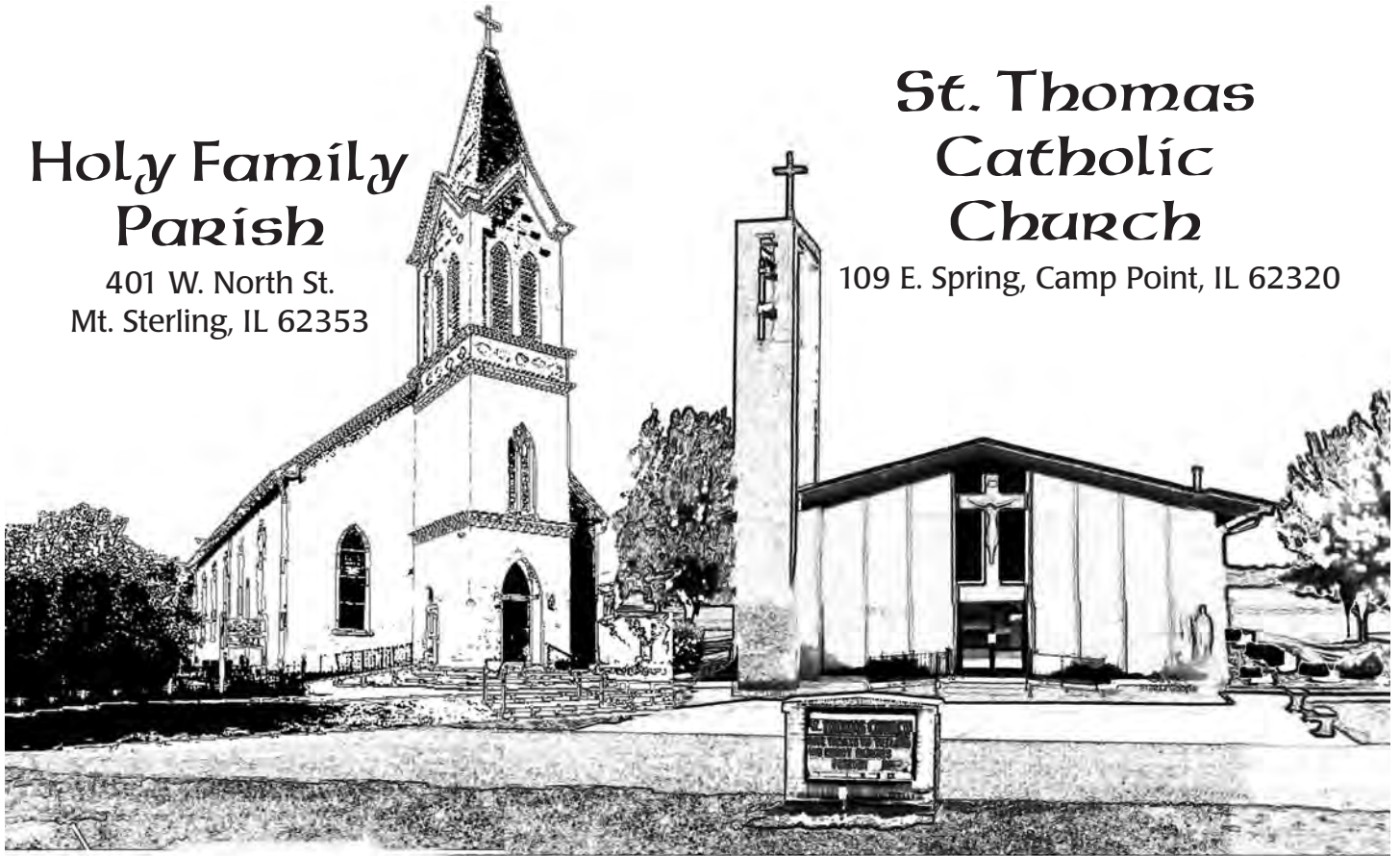

From the Pastor's Desk

Rejoice in the Lord, again I say rejoice! This third Sunday of Advent is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday, a rejoicing reflected in rose vestments and the choice of Scriptures. We are more than halfway through our season of vigilant preparation and persevering prayer as we ready ourselves to both celebrate the coming of Christ in history and look forward to His return in glory. For Christians, this theme of rejoicing lies at the heart of our faith. Even if we are struggling with life's great issues, we are still called to be people of joy and to be ready to share that joy with others.

So, what does this spiritual or holy joy look like? Clearly, it is not the same as pleasure or human satisfaction. These are emotions that are short-lived and derived from the external; they are what we perceive and experience. Spiritual joy arises from our interior life, our relationship with the Divine. Like a well bubbling up from the depths of the earth, spiritual joy wells up even in the midst of life's struggles and becomes the hallmark of the true Christian.

Zephaniah in the First Reading for today is exultant in his description of God's faithfulness and promise. And in the Second Reading, St. Paul, too, wants his community in Philippi to be joyful, not with a superficial

rejoicing but with a joy that flows from the Lord as they await His imminent return in glory. To maintain this joy, St. Paul reminds them to stay prayerful at all times.

Yet in the midst of all this rejoicing, we hear another voice, that of John the Baptist in the Gospel calling us to repentance and justice. But it is really the question put to John the Baptist that should catch our attention...“What should we do?”

This is a very practical question, and John the Baptist has practical answers. They are not to retreat from life, but rather be converted to a just way of living. They are not simply to put on sackcloth and ashes or retreat to the Temple but be sensitive to the needs of justice – to be sharers rather than takers. Tax collectors are not to resign but be just, soldiers are not told to desert but to use their power fairly. This particular message from the Gospel, when taken seriously and lived authentically, can change the very face of the world.

And what must we do? How can we bring about change in our world? John the Baptist’s practical answers are for us as well. As spouses and family members, we can strive to love with a God-like love. As parents and guardians, we can teach our children that their true value lies not in material things or the latest gadget or brand, but in how they treat others and serve the less fortunate. As civic-minded people, by using our freedom to serve our community. As employers and employees, by paying a just wage and working hard. And as Christians, by being faithful to the Gospel and rejoicing in God’s presence and promise! The list is endless, and it is only when we are faithful to Christ that we will know real joy and understand the challenging hope of Advent.

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

– December 12 is ordinarily observed as the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. However, since December 12 falls on a Sunday this year, the Third Sunday of Advent takes precedence. Still, as I mentioned in last week’s bulletin, I encourage you all to learn more about Mary under the title of Our Lady of Guadalupe and to include devotion to our Blessed Mother in your own devotions. Mary, the Mother of God,

is a great and powerful intercessor for us. As a loving Mother, she always points us to Christ. May we look upon her with confidence and model her life of service to God’s Will.

– Monday, December 13 – Obligatory Memorial of St. Lucy, Virgin and Martyr. Because of her name which comes from the word meaning “light,” St. Lucy is the patroness of those afflicted with diseases of the eye, and she is associated with the festival of light, especially in Scandinavia. She is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharist Prayer I) and is also patroness of Syracuse and all of Sicily. St. Lucy was martyred under Diocletian around the year 304, likely in Sicily. St. Lucy, Pray for us!

– Tuesday, December 14 – Obligatory Memorial of St. John of the Cross, Priest and Doctor of the Church. St. John of the Cross was born around 1542 in Fontiveros, Spain. He was a mystic and a poet and an ally of St. Teresa of Avila in founding the Discalced (Reformed) Carmelite Friars (O.C.D.) He suffered imprisonment by the unreformed Carmelites of the Observance. He wrote several pieces including *The Ascent of Mount Carmel*, *The Dark Night of the Soul*, *The Spiritual Canticle*, and *O Flame of Living Love*. He is known as the Mystical Doctor. Today the Discalced Carmelites number about 4,000 religious. St. John of the Cross died around the year 1591. St. John of the Cross, Pray for us!

– ADVENT LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS – According to the Universal Norms, number 42, beginning on (Friday), December 17, the Advent Weekdays are intended to serve to prepare more directly for the Lord’s Birth. At Mass, we begin the use of Advent Preface II (we have been using Advent Preface I) and we will begin to hear the “O Antiphons”... O Wisdom, O Sacred Lord, O Flower of Jesse’s Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, O Emmanuel (O God is with Us).

– ADVENT – As we have entered into and remain in the Season of Advent, I encourage you to remain mindful of this Season each day. Advent calls us to prepare, to quiet our minds and our hearts, as we reflect on God’s presence and His coming. In the business of life, and especially in the hustle and bustle of these weeks, let us remain vigilant to the Season of Advent.

- CALENDARS - 2022 calendars are now available in the back of both churches while they last. Hendricker Funeral Home in Mt. Sterling provides these calendars for our parishes. I thank them for continuing to provide these for our parishioners. Feel free to take one for yourself and/or for anyone you know who may be homebound or in a nursing home or otherwise unable to get one from the church.

- RETURNING HOME - If you know of folks away from the church, I would like to send them a personal invitation to return and join us especially for our Christmas Liturgies. I will be writing out letters/invitations to folks and getting those in the mail soon. If you know of anyone away from the church, please consider sharing the names with me as soon as possible so that I can send them an invitation. Thank you to those who have already helped with this.

- CHRISTMAS FLOWER DONATIONS - As I mentioned in last week's bulletin, if you would like to make a contribution toward the flowers for Christmas, St. Thomas parishioners should have an envelope for this in the regular set of envelopes. For Holy Family, please place your contribution in an envelope marked "Christmas Flowers." The envelopes can be placed in the collection basket or mailed into the office. These contributions are often made in memory of someone so please include the name(s) with your contributions. I will keep these folks in my prayers in a special way and I encourage all of our parishioners to do the same.

- DECORATING - Again, as I mentioned in last week's bulletin, at Holy Family we are looking to bring in some new and young people to help with the decorating of the church, working with our experienced members to always make sure the church is beautiful. If you are able to help out, especially with the upcoming Christmas decorating, please let me know. If someone reaches out to you and asks you to help, please consider saying yes. If you think you may not know what to do, no worries. We have folks that will help you, but they need your help as well. Please don't hesitate to jump in. Thank you for seriously considering helping with this.

- CHOIRS - As of this writing, I still haven't had a chance to talk with the music folks about this; but I know there are talented singers in both parishes, and I encourage you to participate in the choir. The music for our Liturgical celebrations is so very important.

Also, if you are interested in playing for Mass, especially the organ at Holy Family or the keyboard at St. Thomas, please let me know. Perhaps you are interested in learning to play. Either way, please talk to me about how you can share your talents.

- NOCTURNAL ADORATION SOCIETY - If you are not already participating in Nocturnal Adoration at Holy Family, I encourage you to consider doing so. This involves a commitment

of one hour each month (rotating hours). Nocturnal Adoration is the first weekend of each month beginning at 10 p.m. on Saturday evening and ending with Benediction just before the 8 a.m. Mass on Sunday morning. During your hour, you and other members of the Society pray a portion of the Church's Liturgy of the Hours together. To find out more, contact Jim Henrick, Jerry Shoopman, or me. This is not limited to Holy Family parishioners, and it is a wonderful opportunity.

- END-OF-YEAR CONTRIBUTIONS - Often times, folks wish to make a year-end contribution to the parish. If you would like to make such a contribution, I ask you to make those as soon as possible so that we can get them recorded in this calendar year.

Often times, folks are also required to take a disbursement from a retirement account each year. In many cases, if the disbursement goes directly to a charitable organization, there are significant tax advantages. Additionally, I just learned of a new temporary tax law that may allow you to deduct up to \$600 given to a charitable organization, even if you do not itemize deductions. If either of these apply to you, I encourage you to speak to a tax expert soon and consider a contribution to the parishes or to St. Mary School. As always, thank you for your continued support of the parishes and school.

- FALL COLLECTION - Holy Family Parishioners, just a reminder that the annual Fall Collection is under way. Remember to return your contribution as soon as possible. I have heard from a couple of folks that they had not yet received their letter and envelope for the Fall Collection. I was late getting the letter together this year, and thus the packets for those contacting our parishioners were also delayed. However, if you have not yet received your Fall Collection letter, prayer card, and envelope, let me know and I will check into it. Thank you for your support.

- SPIRITUAL REFLECTION - The following is from Pope benedict XVI: "Praying fervently for the coming of the Kingdom also means being constantly alert for the signs of its presence and working for its growth in every sector of society. It means facing the challenges of present and future with confidence in Christ's victory and a commitment to extending His reign. It means not losing heart in the face of

resistance, adversity, and scandal. It means overcoming every separation between faith and life and countering false gospels of freedom and happiness. It also means rejecting a false dichotomy between faith and political life, since, as the Second Vatican Council put it, 'There is no human activity - even in secular affairs - which can be withdrawn from God's dominion.' It means working to enrich . . . society and culture with the beauty and truth of the Gospel, and never losing sight of that great hope which gives meaning and value to all the other hopes which inspire our lives."

Thank you for your continued prayers and support for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. Please be assured of my prayers each day for you. May you have a most blessed day and week.
