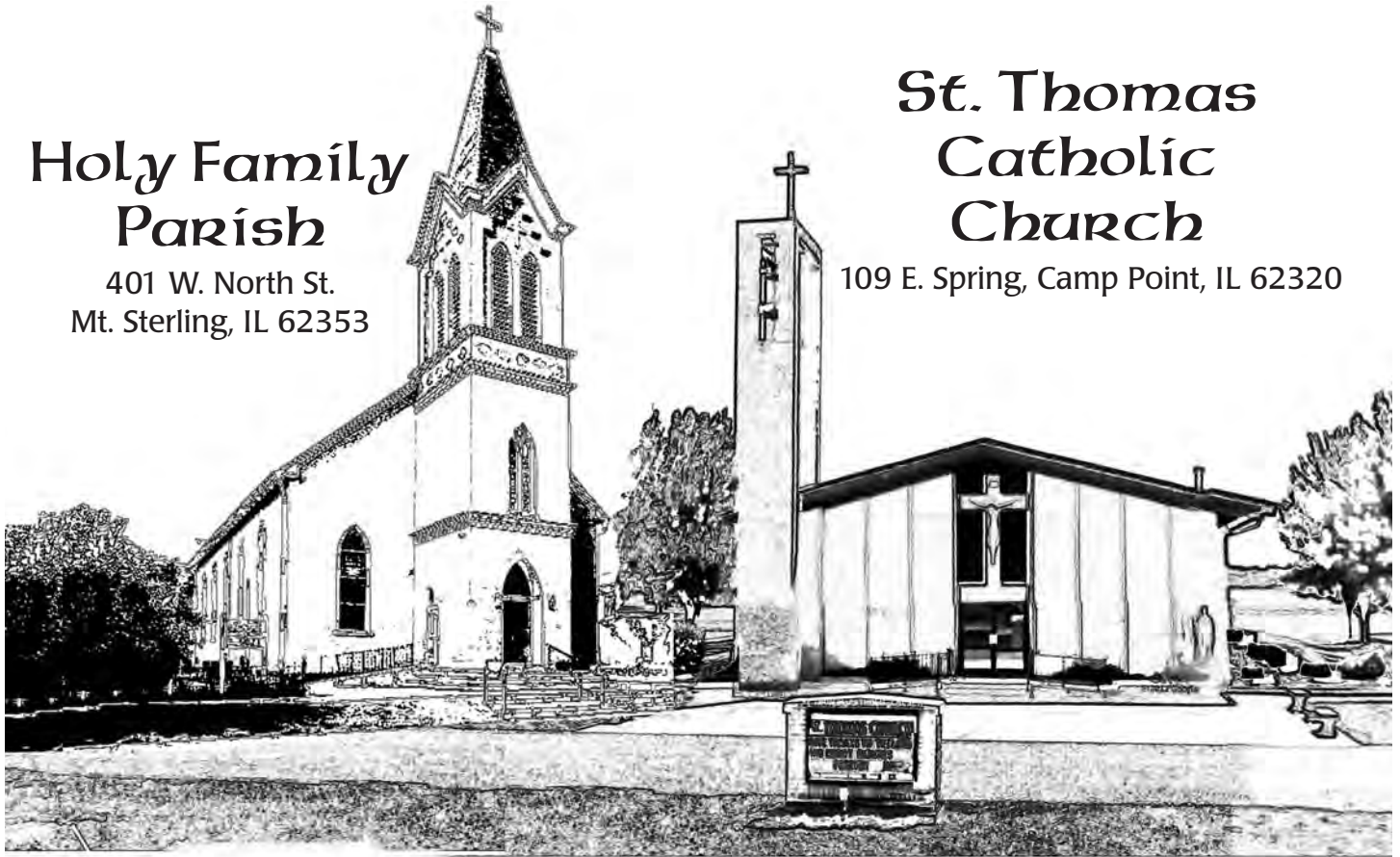

From the Pastor's Desk

In this season of Advent, let us contemplate the great gift that Jesus is to us.

Today the Church celebrates the Fourth Sunday of Advent and the readings for the day

give us much to reflect on about Jesus, God's great gift to all of us.

Micah tells the Israelites that from Bethlehem there shall come a ruler, whose origin is from of old, and He will stand firm and shepherd His flock, God's people. The Letter from St. Paul to the Hebrews reminds us that Jesus did not come to offer God holocausts and sin offerings, but obedience to His Father's Will. And in the Gospel, we find Elizabeth, formerly barren, with child, and she greets as Lord the unborn child that her young relative, Mary, is carrying.

Jesus far exceeds our imagination in both His power and His humility. We are assured throughout the readings about the greatness of Jesus. He is to be the ruler of Israel for all time, with greatness and majesty.

Elizabeth recognizes Jesus for who He is, the Son of God, the blessed fruit of Mary's womb. Yet, even as we recognize the greatness of Jesus, we know of how humbly and quietly He came into the world, born in a tiny village that was too small to be among the clans of Judah; and born to a young peasant girl who was also a virgin, from an almost unknown town, Nazareth. He came in humble obedience to God and lived His entire life following God's Will, even to the point of rejection and of suffering terribly on a cross.

As we hear in the Letter to the Hebrews, through Jesus' offering of Himself and His complete obedience to God's Will, He consecrated a people for God, once for all. As people consecrated to God through Jesus, we can continue in our lives the work that our Savior began when He was born in a manger.

The readings remind us that God was able to work through a very small town, a humble young virgin, an older woman who was presumed to be sterile, and a tiny baby. Yes, God can and does work through it all. This great God who created a vast universe out of nothing can also do much in our lives, through our limited resources, time, and talents.

And so, as we prepare all the more to celebrate the gift that God gave us through the Incarnation of His Son, let us also pray that we can be gifts to one another and to those whom God has sent us to serve. Let us pray for obedient hearts, that we might always strive to know God's Will in our lives and to follow that Will. Let us pray that, like Elizabeth, we might be enlightened by the Holy Spirit to see God's work in unexpected places and people. And let us pray

that, like Mary, we can, in a sense, give birth to Jesus in our world today; that through us, Jesus might be the Shepherd of the troubled souls whom we encounter in our daily lives. May we, at all times throughout our lives, allow Jesus to do the Will of God through us, in whatever big or small way He chooses.

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Tuesday, December 21 - Optional memorial of St. Peter Canisius, Priest and Doctor of the Church. St. Peter Canisius was a Dutch Jesuit catechist and missionary and the leading voice in the counter-reformation in Germany. He organized the German Jesuit province and founded several colleges. He died in 1597. St. Peter Canisius, Pray for us!

- Thursday, December 23 - Optional memorial of St. John of Kanty, Priest. St. John Kanty was the Dean of Philosophy and professor of Theology at the University of Cracow. He was noted for his austerity, humility, and charity toward the poor. He died in 1473 and is a patron of Poland. St. John Kanty, Pray for us!

- ADVENT - We remain in the Season of Advent for almost an entire week yet. I encourage you to remain mindful of this Season each day. Advent calls us to prepare, to quiet our minds and our hearts as we reflect on God's presence and His coming. In the business of life, and especially in the hustle and bustle of these days leading up to Christmas, let us remain vigilant to the Season of Advent.

- O ANTIPHONS - As I mentioned in last week's bulletin, according to the Universal Norms, number 42, beginning on (Friday), December 17, the Advent Weekdays are intended to serve to prepare more directly for the Lord's Birth. At Mass, we have begun to use Advent Preface II (we have been using Advent Preface I) and we began hearing the "O Antiphons."

There is much that one can continue to learn about the O Antiphons. From the USCCB, "The Roman Church has been singing the 'O' Antiphons since at least the eighth century...They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative 'Come!' embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah."

And from Catholicculture.org, "The 'O' Antiphons are ancient antiphons that all begin with the invocation 'O.' They call to mind the ancient longing and pleading of the people of the Old Testament for a Savior to come, invoking different Christological titles on the seven days before Christmas Eve. In praying these we remember the original yearning for the First Coming of Christ at Bethlehem and echo the same waiting and supplication for the Emmanuel to come at Parousia, His Second Coming. The 'O' Antiphons take us through chronological order from before Creation to the birth of Christ at Bethlehem.

The O Antiphon for each day are as follows, in Latin and English: December 17: O Sapientia (O Wisdom); December 18: O Adonai (O Lord and Ruler); December 19: O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse); December 20: O Clavis David (O Key of David); December 21: O Oriens (O Dayspring); December 22: O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations); December 23: O Emmanuel (O God with Us). What I find so very interesting is that by the time we reach December 23, the backwards acrostic of the Latin initials of the Christological titles (the first letter of each Latin title) spell ERO CRAS which means "Tomorrow I will come."

Again, there is so much to learn about the O Antiphons. One more quick thing I want to point out is the "O" itself. It may seem that this is nothing more than the start of an invocation. However, the "O" points to fullness. Again, from Catholicculture.org, "The circle is just a simple closed geometric shape, but in context with these 'O' Antiphons it is more than a shape or letter of the alphabet. The 'O' is all encompassing. The 'O' denotes fullness, completeness, wholeness, ripeness. The 'O' symbolizes eternity, no beginning or end. This simple letter plumbs the depths and speaks to the final fulfillment in the Second Coming of Christ at Parousia."

- CHRISTMAS FLOWER DONATIONS - You can still make a contribution toward the flowers for Christmas. St. Thomas parishioners should have an envelope for this in the regular set of envelopes. For Holy Family, please place your contribution in an envelope marked "Christmas Flowers." The envelopes can be placed in the collection basket or mailed into the office. These contributions are often made in memory of someone, so please include the name(s) with your contributions. I will keep these folks in my prayers in a special way and I encourage all of our parishioners to do the same.

- DECORATING - For a number of years, Amanda Genenbacher has been overseeing the decorating of St. Thomas Church. I thank her for all of her work to help make the church beautiful. Amanda is looking to step away from overseeing the decorating, and so I am looking for someone to take on this role. This does not involve doing everything yourself, but rather overseeing and directing the decorating for different Liturgical Seasons. Amanda is willing to work with someone to help you get started, and I also offer guidance in terms of proper Liturgical colors, decorations, etc. If you are interested in taking on this important role, please let me know.

- THANK YOU - The St. Thomas Christmas party last week was a great success. Those who were able to be there seemed to really enjoy it. It was wonderful to gather together as a parish. Thank you to everyone who helped put this together.

- ETERNAL REST - Judy Meats and Eleanor McClelland recently died, and the funeral Masses were at Holy Family. We pray for the repose of their souls and for their families in this time of sorrow. Eternal Rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let Perpetual Light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

- SCHOOL/PSR/RCIA - We will be taking a short break from school, PSR, and RCIA the next couple of weeks. I thank all of our teachers, staff and catechists for all they do. Always remember that these formal meetings, while both necessary and important, are but one element of our faith formation. Faith formation itself never stops, and so I ask you to consider how you are continuing your faith formation each and every day. This question is not just for our school families, PSR families, and RCIA folks. It is a question for each and every one of us. If you cannot answer the question specifically, take some time to pray and reflect on it. Your continual faith formation is critically important to the eternal salvation of your soul which is of utmost importance.

- CALENDARS - There were still some 2022 calendars available in the back of both churches. Hendricker Funeral Home in Mt. Sterling provides these calendars for our parishes. I thank them for continuing to provide these for our parishioners. While they last, feel free to take one for yourself and/or for a parishioner you know who may be homebound or in a nursing home or otherwise unable to get one from the church.

- END-OF-YEAR CONTRIBUTIONS - You still have time to make an end-of-year contribution. If you would like to make an end-of-year contribution, I ask you to make those as soon as possible so that we can get them recorded in this calendar year.

Often times, folks are also required to take a disbursement from a retirement account each year. In many cases, if the disbursement goes directly to a charitable organization, there are significant tax advantages. Additionally, I learned of a new temporary tax law that may allow you to deduct up to \$600 given to a charitable organization, even if you do not itemize deductions. If either of these apply to

you, I encourage you to speak to a tax expert soon and consider a contribution to the parishes or to St. Mary School. As always, thank you for your continued support of the parishes and school.

- RESTORATION UPDATE - I wanted to give you a quick update on the church restoration projects at Holy Family. I have received updated proposals for a lot of exterior work on the church that is very much needed. The work includes replacement of the roof (using slate as is already on there), restoration of the bell tower, guttering restoration (preserving and restoring the unique gutter hangers), masonry work, and exterior painting. The proposals are being reviewed by the Diocesan Office for Properties.

The total cost of these portions of the restoration will be right at \$1,000,000. It is recommended that we have on hand an additional ten percent of this amount for contingency and unforeseen circumstances.

Thus far, we have about \$420,000 from our Capital Campaign. Additionally, as I mentioned previously, we were anticipating some funds from insurance. This has been finalized and we anticipate receiving about \$130,000 from insurance. Part of this will be received only after the project is completed.

We do still have funds from the sale of the farm property. While we will likely need to use some of these funds, I would prefer not to exhaust those funds completely on the restoration.

Given this, you can see that we are still short in covering the entirety of these projects. Additionally, there are other restoration projects that we certainly want and need to look at after completing those mentioned here. And so, our capital campaign remains ongoing and is still very important.

We are, however, in a position to move forward. I will be looking at additional funding sources and opportunities. I encourage you to continue to support the Capital Campaign and to encourage others to do so as well.

I am looking at having the same contractor complete all of the projects mentioned here. They would likely begin erecting scaffolding as early as March and begin work in late April or May depending on weather. They estimate that this would be a four to six-month project.

As I've mentioned several times, this is a large multi-faceted project, and one that is so important to preserving our beautiful church. Holy Family Church has stood strongly for many,

many years and it is time to make sure we preserve it for many more years to come.

I look forward to getting the work started as I know you are also anxious to see the work begin. I am equally excited about getting the projects completed and then to look at our other projects. Thank you for your continued support of this restoration project.

Thank you all for your continued prayers and support for me, one another, the parishes and school, and the Universal Church. As you prepare for the great celebration of Christmas, may you remain in this Season of Advent all the more fully, and may you have a Holy and Blessed Advent. And please be assured of my prayers for you each and every day. May you have a most blessed week.
