A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:

In the military you sometimes hear the advice, "Salute the rank, not the person." Perhaps there is some cynicism in this saying, be it is a practical reality that we have to accept at one time or another. Not everyone who rises to be a manager or a captain or college graduate or a king or a supervisor or a CEO or a Commander-in-Chief is necessarily worthy of the titles and



privileges they enjoy. Indeed, there is the famous "Peter Principle" that says that people tend to be promoted in business and social hierarchies to the point at which they just exceed their abilities and become totally ineffective at their new job... which is also a grim commentary on anyone who is a leader. But in the military, it is recognized that good order is found in honoring and protecting the chain of command, that those charged with giving orders are respected for the office they hold, realizing that they bear the heavy responsibility of that office. The Church expects the same of her clerics, who place their hands in the hands of their bishop on their ordination day, promising "respect and obedience to me (your bishop) and my successors." Just like serving in the military and taking the oath to obey the orders of officers appointed over you, it is a little bit unnerving to make this promise which may someday mean working for someone who is less qualified, less capable in, or less deserving of their leadership role.



In our readings today, we have the curious story of the young upstart, David, finding his way into Saul's camp and finding him completely vulnerable to assassination. Saul had proven himself ineffective and David would be one of the rivals that perhaps the military would have supported if he had supplanted Saul in his kingship. But even if the LORD Himself had put the soldiers into their deep sleep and guided David to this opportunity to dispatch the failed king, David realized that it was not his place – it was not his calling to dethrone "the anointed of God." While Saul was struggling to maintain his kingship and return to the ways of God, David

realized it was not his place to be Saul's executioner, much less judge. God had appointed him and consecrated him as King, and David was the King's rightful subject. To respect the King, even in this vulnerable moment, was an act of respect for Saul's office, and, by extension, God who enthroned him. God could have removed Saul by His own divine will and action. By respecting Saul's office, David set the stage for others to respect the kingly office when he (David) was anointed. How would it look if a royal usurper were to himself fall into sin or scandal? David's behavior would present a welcome excuse for others who thought they could be a better leader to assassinate him!

Couple this reading with the reading from Luke where Jesus says, "Stop judging and you will not be judged. Stop condemning and you will not be condemned" (Luke 6:37). There has been all kinds of mischief committed under the misunderstanding of this saying. I don't think Jesus is saying that there are no standards to follow or expectations we should have of each other, much less our leaders, but the work of vengeance and the work of producing equity belongs to God and God alone. Those who would presume to hold the moral standard and high ground are, to connect with an idea from earlier in the Gospel of Luke, not living the "Jubilee Spirit." They are not practicing mercy; they lack the spirit of humility. Their righteousness shields them from receiving God's mercy and God's favor, not unlike the self-righteous, hypocritical Pharisees. Those who judge in this way are not fit for the Kingdom of God.

Judgement is not the problem. We make judgements about the people and situations we encounter every day. Is the car going to stop before I walk across the street? Does this politician or that politician best represent my values when I vote? Should I really be watching this show on TV? Right Judgement is, indeed, a gift of the Holy Spirit. The problem it turns out is not judgement, but it is the absence of mercy and consideration for those we put under our microscopes while comparing them to our own sense of justice and righteousness. It is the measure with which we measure that God will measure us.
