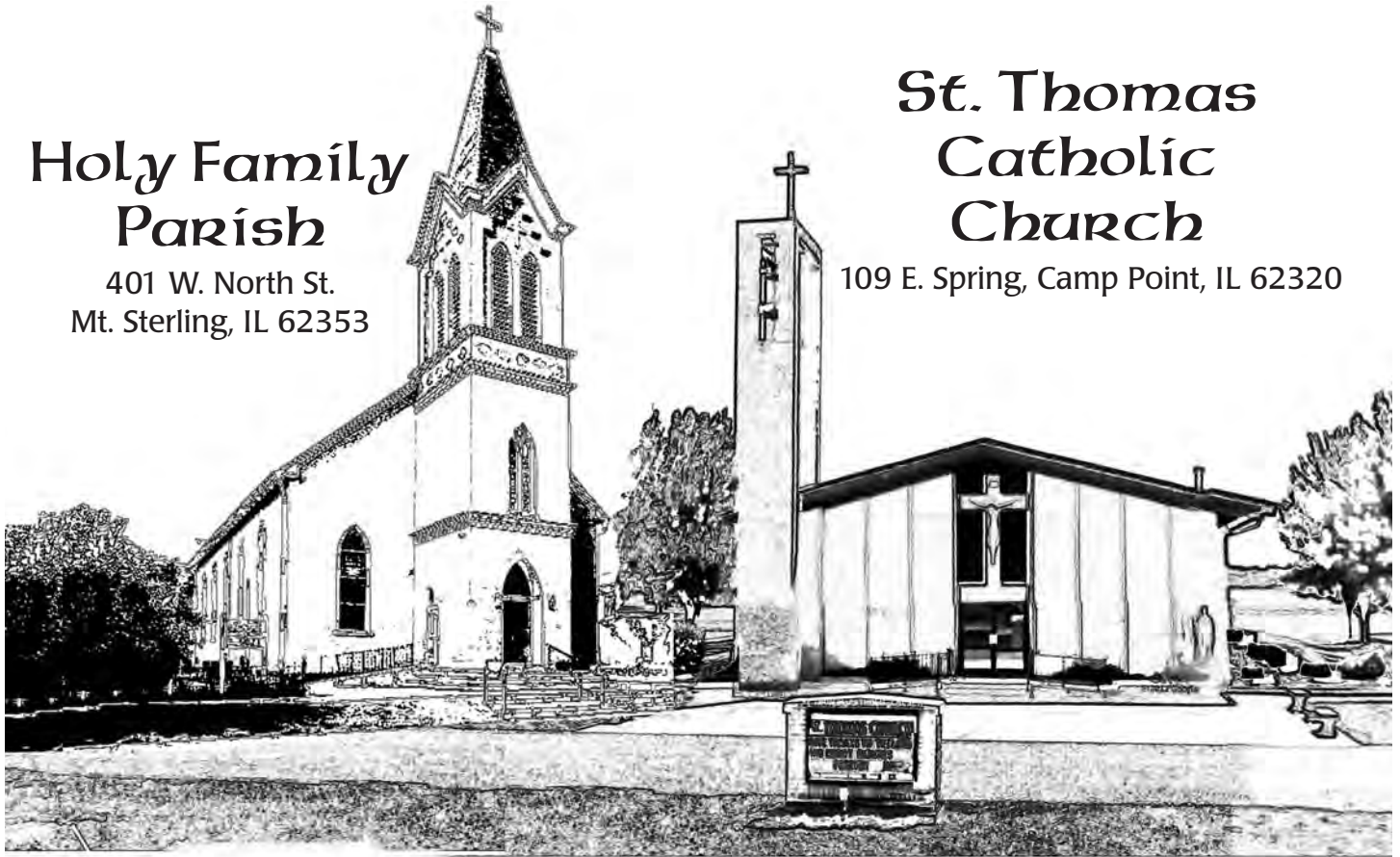

From the Pastor's Desk

As we celebrate the Eighth Sunday of Ordinary Time, our readings remind us to be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord.

As a Church, we have honored the countless learned and holy men and women, teachers of all generations and cultures who have dedicated their lives to the advancement not only of holy wisdom but of earthly knowledge. From the writer of Sirach in our First Reading to St. Paul the great evangelist and preacher, to modern theologians and catechists, they have shared their knowledge and wisdom and laid before us their insights and learning.

There are also those among us who may have less formal scholarship and education, but lead lives and speak truths that advance the Gospel. Often times it is these folks who exemplify holiness more than anyone else.

They are all teachers of the faith who have helped us to mine and understand the mysteries of this world and the world to come. They have helped us to understand how God is present in our world and in those great moments of life and death. Knowledge, integrity, and responsibility are necessary qualities for anyone who wishes to teach, or share, the faith.

Jesus is scathing when these are absent. One is guilty of hypocrisy when one ignores serious matters and insists that others adhere to minor things. Likewise, if we all concentrate on removing the splinters in our own lives, we would have no time to judge and gossip about the faults and struggles of others.

For Jesus, the ultimate "success" of an individual's efforts relies on the effect they have on the lives of others. The true teacher will produce good fruit whereas the uninformed, self-centered, or misguided teacher will produce rotten fruit. The status of the fruit reveals the true nature of the tree.

The blind cannot lead the blind. Good produces good and evil produces evil. As we hear in the First Reading, so too does one's speech disclose the bent of one's mind. So let us always, as St. Paul says in our Second Reading, be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord. For the ways of the Lord are always and only good, and thus so shall be what we teach, preach, and live as a result.

May our hearts and bodies be nourished with the Living of Word of God and the Holy Eucharist, that perfect gift from God...the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ. May it give us the grace to be firm and steadfast as St. Paul encourages and bear good fruit for the world.

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Wednesday, March 2 - Ash Wednesday - This, of course, marks the beginning of Lent. More about this below.

- Thursday, March 3 - In the United States, optional memorial of St. Katherine Drexel, Virgin. Katherine Drexel was a Philadelphia heiress and Foundress of the Missionary Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. She established some forty-nine foundations. She died on March 3, 1955, at the age of ninety-seven and was canonized by Pope John Paul II on October 1, 2000. St. Katherine Drexel, Pray for us!

- Friday, March 4 - Optional memorial of St. Casimir. St. Casimir was a Polish prince known as the "brother and defender of the poor." He is well known for the austere life that he led. He died in 1484 and is patron of Poland and Lithuania. St. Casimir, Pray for us!

- FIRST FRIDAY - Friday, March 4, is First Friday and so we will be having our First Friday Devotions at St. Thomas. Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament will be at Noon and Adoration will go until 5:45 p.m. Benediction will be at 5:45 p.m. followed by Mass at 6:00 p.m. Confessions will be available from 5:00 p.m. to 5:45 p.m. As always, I encourage you to come and spend some time in prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament. Since the

St. Mary School Fish Fry is that evening, I may try to find another priest to hear confessions and celebrate Mass.

Just a side note concerning the First Friday Devotion. Often times for First Friday Devotions, the Votive Mass of the Sacred Heart is used. Currently, I do not use that (although I may look into doing so sometime). I use the Mass for the day. I say this here because the First Friday Votive Mass of the Sacred Heart is forbidden during Lent. Thus, the Mass of the day is to be used which is what I currently do anyway.

- NOCTURNAL ADORATION - Saturday, March 5, is also the first Saturday of the month and so we will have Nocturnal Adoration at Holy Family. Exposition and Adoration begins at 10:00 p.m. and goes through 7:45 a.m. Sunday morning. Benediction is at 7:45 a.m. followed by our regularly scheduled 8:00 a.m. Mass.

Please note...because of the weather in January and the death of my mother on the first Saturday in February, Nocturnal Adoration was canceled. The list of hours for March is posted in church. Please take a look so that you know what hour you are scheduled.

- FISH FRIES - St. Mary School will be holding their annual Fish Fry on Friday, March 4, at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling from 5:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. It will be drive-thru only.

St. Thomas will be holding a Fish Fry on Friday, March 11, from 4:30 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. It will be drive-thru only at the Parish Hall.

I encourage you all to come and get some meals to enjoy and to support the parishes and school. I look forward to seeing you all there.

- TRIVIA NIGHT - The St. Mary School Trivia Night is scheduled for Saturday, March 19. Please see the spot here in the bulletin for more information.

- FALL COLLECTION - Although our Fall Collection at Holy Family has officially ended, if you have not yet turned in your contribution, you may still do so. Drop it in

the collection basket at church or mail it into the Parish Office. Thank you for your continued support of this important collection.

- ACSA/PARISH TITHE ENVELOPE - Parishioners in both parishes should have received an envelope in their packet of collection envelopes marked "ACSA/PARISH TITHE." As I hope you are all aware, the Annual Catholic Services Appeal no longer exists through the Diocese. Rather, we offer a tithe of our parish income each month to the Diocese. This equates to 10 percent of parish income. This has been in place now since July 2021, with our first monthly tithe to the Diocese sent in August for the month of July and continuing each month. Although there have been some minor adjustments along the way, it seems to be working well.

You may recall that for the Annual Catholic Services Appeal in years past, you received a letter from the Bishop (usually in late August or early September) and an invitation to participate in the Appeal by sending in a contribution to the Diocese. The parish was assessed an amount and any shortfall in contributions was paid by the parish from operating funds. Your contributions to the Appeal were very important to both the parish and the Diocese. Thank you to all who supported the Appeal.

Since the Annual Catholic Services Appeal (ACSA) has been replaced with the parish tithe, I included an envelope in your packet of envelopes to make a designated contribution toward this. The contribution is made to the parish and remains with the parish. It will not be included in regular parish income but is considered a designated gift when used with this envelope. For those of you who regularly supported the Annual Catholic Services Appeal in years past, I encourage you to use this envelope to do the same. Consider contributing what you contributed to ACSA and perhaps even increasing your contribution if at all possible. For those of you who may not have contributed directly to ACSA in the past, please consider making a contribution now in this envelope. Thank you for your consideration.

- DCCW - The Spring Meeting of the Quincy Deanery Council of Catholic Women will be held on Wednesday, March 16, at St. Mary Church in Pittsfield. Registration is at 8:30 a.m. in the church lobby followed by Mass and the Rosary at 9:00 a.m. The meeting and luncheon (with speaker) will be in the Parish Hall. Registration and luncheon are only \$6.00. More information and a sign-up sheet are on the bulletin boards in the back of each church. You are asked to sign up by March 11, if possible.

I want to encourage all women of the parishes to participate, if possible. The Council of Catholic Women is a great organization, and I am grateful to see the effort to bring it back more fully to the Quincy Deanery. Sadly, in some parishes, the ladies' groups (Altar Society) and men's groups (Holy Name Society) have become stagnant or, even worse, non-existent all together. The Council, too, encourages all women to join them for this day of fellowship with Catholic women of our deanery area, in service and leadership to our Catholic faith and joining the beautiful work of the Lord. If you have any questions, please contact Claudia Coggeshall or me. Again, this is a great opportunity to meet and be with other Catholic women in the area.

- LENT - As I mentioned above, Wednesday, March 2, is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the Liturgical Season of Lent. Lent is very significant to us and is a season marked by a call to prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. I encourage each of us to reflect on these three things during the season of Lent.

Lent runs from Ash Wednesday until the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, which then begins the Sacred Paschal Triduum. The Liturgical color for Lent is violet which signifies its repentant nature. "Alleluia" is not sung or said from the beginning of Lent until the Easter Vigil. Although not required, I will most often use Eucharistic Prayers for Reconciliation I and II for Masses during Lent.

Ash Wednesday and the days of Holy Week take precedence over all Solemnities

and Feasts. All memorials of saints occurring during Lent are observed as optional. Note that this is for memorials only. So, for example, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary on Saturday, March 19 (not on Ash Wednesday and not during Holy Week), is not optional as it is a Solemnity, not a memorial.

In order to help prepare more fully, the following are some additional opportunities in the parishes for Lent:

- ADDITIONAL MASSES - I will celebrate a Wednesday evening Mass at Holy Family at 5:30 p.m. during Lent. I will offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation before Mass from about 4:45 p.m. - 5:15 p.m. Stations of the Cross will follow Mass each week.

I will celebrate a Thursday evening Mass at St. Thomas at 5:30 p.m. during Lent. I will offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation before Mass from about 4:45 p.m. - 5:15 p.m.

- STATIONS OF THE CROSS - At Holy Family, we will have Stations of the Cross after the Wednesday evening Mass each week.

At St. Thomas, Stations of the Cross will be at 7:00 p.m. on Friday evenings.

Additionally, I will lead the Stations of the Cross each Sunday afternoon at 1:00 p.m., alternating parishes. I will begin at Holy Family on Sunday, March 6. I will also offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation prior to this each week from about 12:15 p.m. - 12:45 p.m.

- RECONCILIATION - In addition to the regularly scheduled confessions times (Saturday evenings 4:30 - 5:00 at Holy Family; First Friday 5:00 - 5:45 at St. Thomas), I will also offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation as noted above, before each Mass on Wednesday evenings at Holy Family and Thursday evenings at St. Thomas and prior to the Stations of the Cross on Sundays at the parish I am at.

- THE WORD AMONG US - Copies of *The Word Among Us* for Lent are available in the back of each church. We receive additional copies of this for Lent so please take one to use in your daily Lenten devotions if you'd like.

- LENTEN REGULATIONS - Please note the following regulations (3) concerning Lent. These are not nice suggestions for us to consider following but are necessary in our celebration of the Season of Lent.

1. ABSTINENCE - Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

2. FAST - Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed.

3. TO DISREGARD COMPLETELY THE LAW OF FAST AND ABSTINENCE IS SERIOUSLY SINFUL.

Thank you all for your continued prayers and support for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. As we prepare to embark on the Season of Lent, may our desire for and growth in holiness lead us ever more to the fullness of Christ, the fullness of Truth. May you have a most blessed week.
