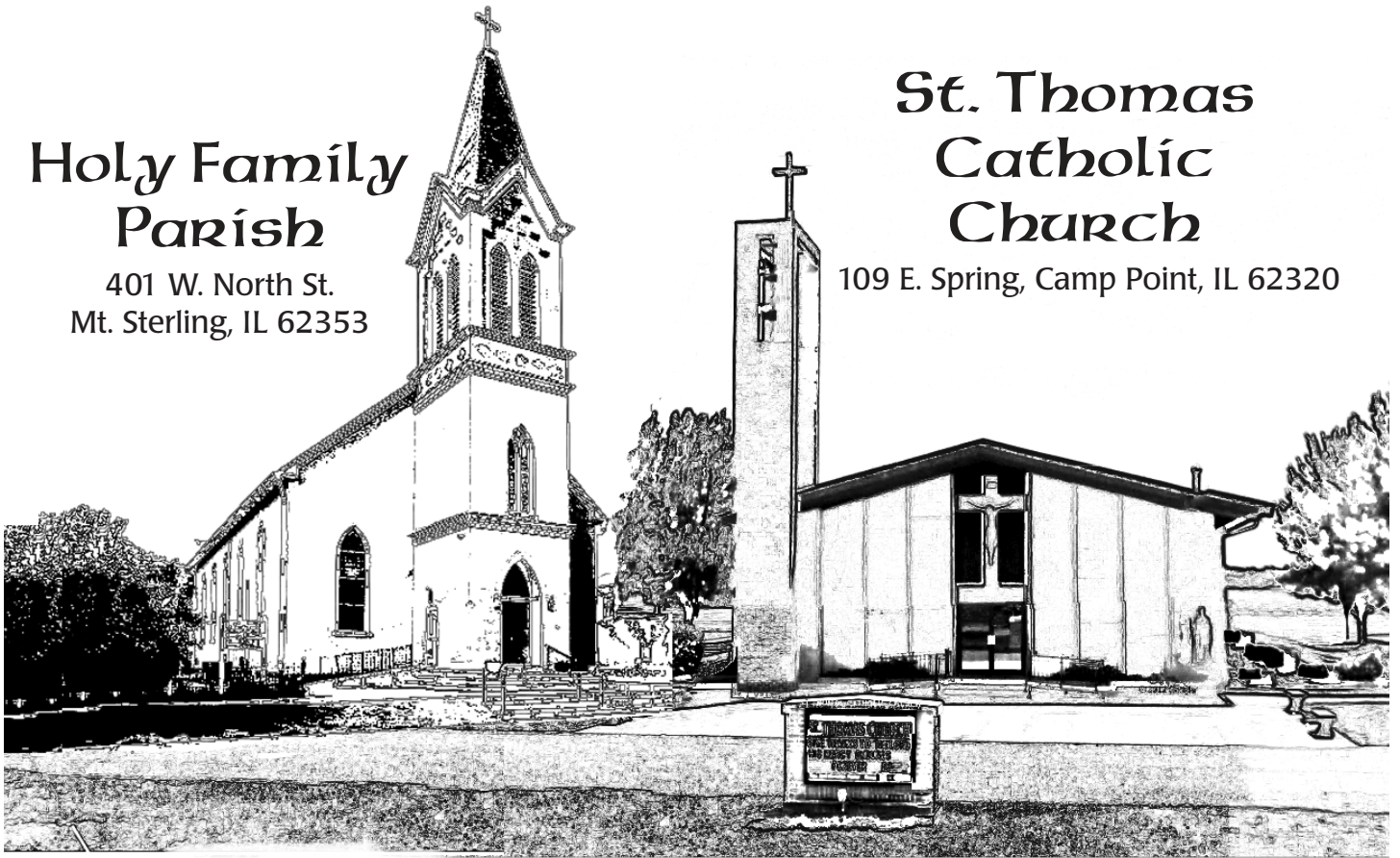

## From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Fourth Sunday of Lent, traditionally known as Laetare Sunday. Laetare comes from the first word of the Antiphon at the Introit (Entrance Antiphon) and is the Latin word meaning *Rejoice*. It sets a tone of joyful anticipation of the Easter Mystery as does the permitted use of rose-colored vestments. Flowers may also be added to the Sanctuary for Laetare Sunday. Indeed, though we remain in the Penitential Season of Lent, we look forward to the glorious celebration of Easter.

It's once again at this point that I encourage each of us to look at our Lenten journey. How are you doing? Re-commit yourself to those Lenten observances of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, and remain steadfast in your perseverance.

Today we also have the second of the three Scrutinies for the Elect. At the Mass with the Scrutiny (Saturday evening), the readings for Year A are used. The readings for Year C are used at the other Masses. I gave a brief explanation of the Scrutinies in last week's bulletin, so I encourage you to take a look at that rather than repeating it here. The following reflection is based on the readings for Year C.

As we celebrate this Fourth Sunday of Lent, we are reminded that God indeed provides for us but also gives us free will.

God knows our weaknesses and is always ready to receive us with forgiveness and mercy when we turn to Him with trust, repentance, and humility. The first reading in particular is a reminder that God provides for us. For years while the Israelites were in the desert, God had provided manna, which miraculously showed up in the desert so the people could keep up their strength during their journey in the desert. But once they arrived in the land that had been promised to them and had access to the fruits of the land, God ceased the necessity of providing the extraordinary gift of manna and allowed the people of Israel to be nurtured through their free cooperation with nature and the natural order of crops.

Similarly, Jesus shows us how God, through the character of the father in the parable of the prodigal son, takes care of us without forcing Himself on us or preventing our turning

away from Him. The father honors the unreasonable request of his younger son (who by Jewish law has no claim on any inheritance) and divides his estate between the two sons. He doesn't prevent the younger son from leaving home to live a life of sin in a foreign country but gives him the freedom to make mistakes. He doesn't chase after his son or send out detectives to find him and bring him back. Rather, he lets the son use his free will to embark on the path he has chosen.

Once the son realizes his mistake and comes back home, however, the father meets him more than halfway and welcomes him whole-heartedly, without judgment or reproach.

God works the same way with us. He provides for us, but He does not force us into a relationship with Him. By His grace we are invited. By our will and His grace, we respond.

During Lent, we are invited in a special way to turn back to God in whatever way may be necessary, to take the first step of reconciliation with God and with others. The readings from a weekday Mass early last week remind us that God is merciful and forgiving and calls us to be likewise. However, it is not our mercy and forgiveness that causes our love for God...quite the opposite. Our love for God and our faith lead us to Reconciliation. If we find Reconciliation difficult for some reason (with God or with someone else), then we need first to look at our love for God and our own faith rather than seeing Reconciliation as something we must "do." Again, Reconciliation springs naturally from our love of God and our faith.

God waits for us patiently in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and is ready to absolve us and make us "new creations" as we confess our sins and ask for God's forgiveness and strength. Let us pray and encourage one another to live out God's call to us in Lent, to turn back to God with all our heart, mind, and soul.

And now just a few notes:

- MOWING - As I mentioned at Masses last weekend at Holy Family, I just found out that the person who had been mowing at Holy Family will be unable to continue this year. In a very short time, we will certainly need to attend to this. What I'd like to do is similar to what St. Thomas embarked on a few years ago. Teams of folks have volunteered to mow and trim the property each week. It has worked out

remarkably well and I am so very grateful that the folks have taken this on. It is one of many great ways to embody stewardship in the parish. St. Thomas has about a dozen teams, and so the number of times that each team mows and trims in the year is minimal – two or three times is all. I would like to get at least that number of teams (or more) at Holy Family as well as someone to oversee it. A few folks have already signed up. Please let Tammy or I know as soon as possible if you'd be able to help. My hope is to continually improve the landscaping around the property and to have folks who make this part of their contribution to parish life.

- LISTENING SESSION - As part of our diocese's response to Pope Francis' call to provide input for the Synod of Bishops that will take place at the Vatican in October of 2023, Bishop Paprocki invites all the faithful of our diocese to a diocesan wide listening session this Sunday, March 27, at 2:00 p.m. Groups will gather locally in the deaneries and connect together with the Bishop and across the deaneries by video. More information was in the *Catholic Times* that I hope you had a chance to read. The Quincy Deanery will gather at the St. Francis Parish Center, Quincy, from 2:00-4:00 p.m. Anyone interested from the parishes is invited.

I would like to just briefly mention that while some folks often try to define or alter Truth, Truth is found only in Jesus Christ. Christ is the fullness of Truth, and He has revealed the fullness of Truth to us, found fully in the Holy Catholic Church that He established here on earth. No one can change or define Truth. It is given and revealed to us by Christ who is Truth Itself. We can come to understand Truth more fully, and certainly should. We can also help others to come to know and understand Truth more fully, and certainly we should. However, we must ALWAYS keep in mind that Truth is not ours to define. Truth is not ours to "tweak." Truth is not ours to change in order to make people feel better. Truth is Christ and to seek to define, tweak, or change Truth is a grave insult against Christ Himself. It is only in the Truth that Christ is that we are set free, that we find fullness of life, and that we can hope for Eternal Life with the Father in Heaven. No one can change or define Truth. A Synod cannot define or change Truth. An attempt to do so is nothing short of heresy.

Truth is often met with great hostility, hatred, and even violence. It seems so strange to me. Still, I would much rather be hated for upholding the Truth than loved for making folks feel good. I hope you can approach Truth in the same way, and I pray that each of us can always know the Truth more fully and persevere in the Truth because the attacks against Truth are both real and strong.

- RIGHT TO LIFE - The Illinois Right to Life has embarked on what they are calling the "Ground Zero Tour." In efforts with the Adams County Right to Life, the Ground Zero Tour will be hosting an evening in Quincy on Tuesday, March 29, at St. Francis beginning at 6:00 p.m. I would encourage you to learn more about this and to try to attend if you are able. You can learn more by going to the Adams County Right to Life website, [www.rtlac.org](http://www.rtlac.org). There, you can also find additional information for upcoming events concerning Right to Life. Or give me a call if you don't use a computer or have trouble with the website.

I want to mention also that although I watch very little TV, one evening recently when I had it on a local channel, I saw a most beautiful advertisement for life, emphasizing the moment that life begins in the womb and the significant stages of development of human life in the womb...heartbeat, brainwaves, etc. I did not catch who was sponsoring the ad (I think it was at the bottom at the very end), but I do appreciate the efforts. And more than appreciate, I find those efforts so very necessary in a world that has created a culture of death with which many of us have become complacent. We must return to the culture of life and do all we can to do so. Many folks these days, including folks in positions of authority or government, want to say "follow the science." That's fine...God gave us science. And when it comes to life, I say also, follow the science; don't pick and choose and don't distort science for personal gain. Gifts given to us by God should never be distorted or manipulated. Life is a gift from God that begins at the moment of conception. No one is at liberty to say otherwise. As I talked about Truth earlier, this is a Truth that is not ours to define or change. If we remain complacent in the culture of death, there can be no respect for life...what a tragedy!

- FIRST FRIDAY - Friday, April 1, is First Friday, and so we will be having our First Friday Devotions at St. Thomas. Exposition of

the Blessed Sacrament will be at Noon and Adoration will go until 5:45 p.m. Benediction will be at 5:45 p.m. followed by Mass at 6:00 p.m. Confessions will be available from 5:00 p.m. to 5:45 p.m.

- NOCTURNAL ADORATION - Saturday, April 2, is the first Saturday of the month and we will have Nocturnal Adoration at Holy Family. Exposition and Adoration begins at 10:00 p.m. and goes through 7:45 a.m. Sunday morning. Benediction is at 7:45 a.m. followed by our regularly scheduled 8:00 a.m. Mass.

- ANNIVERSARY - Saturday, April 2, marks the anniversary of the death of St. John Paul II in 2005. St. John Paul II, pray for us!

- POPE'S INTENTION - The Holy Father's Intention for April is for health care workers. We pray for health care workers who serve the sick and the elderly, especially in the poorest countries; may they be adequately supported by governments and local communities.

- MATCHING SCHOLARSHIP DONATIONS - A matching gift program for select schools in our diocese, including St. Mary School, is happening right now thanks to a generous couple who is offering a 1:1 donation match toward the 2022-2023 tax credit scholarships that help students in need. Gifts made through Empower Illinois for the Invest in Kids Tax Credit Scholarship Program at St. Mary School will be doubled up to \$10,000.

This program provides need-based scholarships to kids from low-income and working-class families. Donors earn a 75% state tax credit on their gift. Donors can direct their donations to the school of their choice, including St. Mary School.

Donations must be made before April 15 for St. Mary School to be eligible for the match. For more information on how to donate, visit [empowerillinois.org/donate](http://empowerillinois.org/donate) or contact me or our Principal, Melissa Obert.

I encourage you to seriously consider this opportunity. Let's try to reach the matching cap of \$10,000. Remember, in order to be matched, the gift must be made by April 15.

- CONSECRATION & SPECIAL COLLECTION - Some have asked about details of Bishop Paprocki's participation in the Holy Father's consecration of Russia and Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and about any plans for a diocesan collection for Ukraine.

As of this writing, regarding the consecration, Bishop Paprocki planned to join the Holy Father in his consecration of Russia and Ukraine on Friday, March 25, with a prayer service at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Barring any further direction from Rome, Bishop Paprocki expected to begin with a prayer of consecration, followed by the Rosary. The Blessed Sacrament was then to be exposed for Adoration. I encourage you to continue to pray for reconciliation and the restoration of peace.

Regarding a second collection, the Diocese is encouraging the faithful to contribute to a number of recognized and reputable groups that are established in Eastern Europe and able to direct funds where they are most needed. Following is a list of Catholic organizations that are accepting contributions to help address the crisis and growing need of refugees from Ukraine, along with financial aid and support for those in dire need.
