Third Sunday of Lent MARCH 20, 2022

Exodus 3:1-8a,13-15; 1 Corinthians 10:1-6,10-12; Luke 13:1-9

[There are alternate Biblical texts that may be used for the first and second readings.]

"Get with the program!" might sum up the theme of today's Mass.

The first reading describes Moses' encounter with the Lord in the burning bush. The Lord calls on Moses to return to Egypt to lead the Israelites out of slavery. Moses is an escaped felon. He has a good thing going. He has married well, and would be perfectly content to live the rest of his days in the land of Midian.

Here, and elsewhere, Moses puts up every possible objection as to why he should not return to Egypt. God reveals his name as "I AM" or "he who is, who was, and who will never cease to be." This is the Hebrew word "Yahweh." (So sacred is the Name that even today Jews will never pronounce it! We might well imitate their reverence!)

In the second reading, Paul draws an analogy for the Corinthians. They had grown smug and self-satisfied. They had been baptized. They had received the Holy Spirit. They had the Eucharist. Paul tells them that all this is worthless unless they show forth the good fruit of virtue — especially charity. He says that the Israelites in the desert were "baptized" in Moses (when they passed through the Red Sea); they had spiritual food and drink (water from the rock and manna); the cloud of God's presence was with them.

But they were not pleasing to God! They were gripers, whiners, and rebels. It is an object lesson not only to the Corinthians but to us. (Jewish tradition said that the rock followed them throughout forty years' wandering, and that they always had fresh water. Paul goes a step further and says the rock was Christ!)

The Gospel is not one of the best in the lectionary, but its meaning is clear: Some people think that catastrophes happen because of sins. Jesus uses some examples known to his hearers and says that they weren't any worse sinners than other people.

All are called to bear good fruit. If a fruit tree doesn't bear fruit, you prune it and fertilize it. If it still doesn't bear fruit, you cut it down. This will be our lot unless we bear good fruit. Get with the program! Stop your whining and griping! Stop hesitating! Start bearing the good fruit of righteousness in the community of faith!

Dear Parishioners,


This weekend we celebrate the Third Sunday in our season of Lent. It is on this weekend in Lent that we begin what we call the scrutinies. In the former days in our Church, the scrutinies were examinations or tests of worthiness which the Elect (catechumens) have to pass before being admitted to baptism. In those days there were seven of them. However, in recent times, scrutinies are no longer tests but are prayers of intercession for our Elect. And so beginning on this Sunday and continuing the next two Sundays, these scrutinies will be celebrated at our 9:30 a.m. Mass. We also find that the scrutinies are based upon certain themes found in the cycle A of our weekend readings, so usually the cycle A readings will be proclaimed at only our 9:30 a.m. Mass. This Sunday our gospel has the theme of baptism and the encounter by Jesus of the Samaritan woman at the well. If you read or listen closely to this gospel, we find a conversion experience of this woman who allows Jesus to enter her life. We can only hope and pray that all of our lives will be touched by Jesus as He did this Samaritan woman.

Our first reading for our Masses other than the 9:30 a.m. Mass is from the Book of Genesis. In this particular reading, we find Moses encountering a strange phenomenon in his life: a bush that was burning but not being consumed by the fire. With curiosity, Moses comes closer only to hear a voice saying, "Moses, come no nearer. Remove the sandals from your feet for the place where you stand is holy ground." Moses does as he was directed and then God reveals to him His identity as "I am who I am." Then Moses is given a mission, to set the people of Israel free from their slavery, and that Moses would do as directed. Today, through our baptisms, we too encounter our God in a holy place; namely, in the celebration of the Eucharist. And we too are given a mission, a mission to live out our baptismal promises, having been strengthened by our encounter with God in this holy place called our Church. May each of us find God's grace in this sacramental presence and fulfill our mission to live out the gospel of Jesus.

This Sunday, March 20, we will have the first of two city-wide Penance Services at 2:00 p.m. This first service will be in St. Anthony Church with a number of priests from the area helping to hear individual confessions. Let's make use of this opportunity to experience what we proclaimed in our Responsorial Psalm for our Maas, "The Lord is kind and merciful." Our second service will also be on Sunday, April 10, here at St. Peter Church, at 2:00 p.m.

Finally, next Sunday, March 27, the Bishop is inviting parishioners to attend what he calls a Listening Session which will be done virtually with him at St. Francis Church, Quincy, at 2:00 p.m. Three topics will be discussed: 1. We will reflect on the progress we have made in the five years that have passed since we held our Fourth Synod in 2017; 2. We will reflect upon steps that the Holy Spirit invites us to take to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ; 3. We will also reflect upon the challenges to authentic discipleship that we are called to live. The Bishop states "I look forward to the ongoing dialog across our diocese and the insights we will share in the upcoming listening sessions." Please join us!





Calvary, St. Boniface, and St. Peter Cemetery Clean Up

The clean up this year for Calvary, St. Boniface, and St. Peter's Cemeteries will be held March 28-April 1. You must have everything off the graves by Sunday, March 27, as the clean up will start early on March 28. Please do not replace flowers until the clean up is over on April 1.

You may leave the shepherds hooks, but clean up is a good time to take them home and repaint them. Also, if they are rusting you don't want the stone damaged due to the rust dripping on the stone!

Please do not replace flowers until the clean up is over. We suggest you mark your flowers with the name on the stone and your contact number so if they come off there is a better chance of having them returned to the right spot. (Markings should be weather proof if possible.)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The circus and traveling shows ministry, an initiative of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Subcommittee on Pastoral Care of Migrants, Refugees, and Travelers (PCMRT), works to raise awareness and address the pastoral needs of performers. Among those doing this valuable ministry is Deacon Gary Nosacek, a circus and traveling show minister of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, who performs this ministry of presence and prayer with joy. With support from The Catholic Relief Services Collection, PCMRT attends to the needs of these families that might otherwise be unmet.


