From the Pastor's Desk

Today we celebrate the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Our Gospel for Year C reminds us that as Jesus liberates the woman caught in adultery, so too He wishes to free us from our sins and our guilt.

Guilt is one of the most common of all human experiences and often the heaviest burden to carry. Some will use it to come to terms with their life choices and bring about renewal and change. Others will deny its reality even though it may burn like a fire within them, or they may project it onto others, avoiding responsibility and the need for change. Some will even use it to punish themselves and so add to their pain.

The biblical perspective on guilt is evident in today's Gospel. Dragged before Jesus by the Pharisees and scribes, the woman is, by all appearances, guilty, and deserving of the punishment laid down by Moses that she be stoned. Other than the sin of which she is accused, we know nothing about her or her life's circumstances. (All too often, that is the case with many things that we rush to make judgement about.) We do not know her name, her family, or the identity of her partner in the act...keep in mind, it takes two to tango, but often times we want to forget that!

Alone, humiliated, and at risk, she stands before Jesus awaiting her fate. Yet we know that she is a sinner not just because of the adultery, but because like all humanity, she has fallen short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23). When understood in strict legalistic terms, sin is usually seen as the breaking of rules and regulations...she was a sinner because she committed adultery. But for Jesus, sin is a bigger concept when understood in spiritual and relational terms...it is our alienation from God, from others, and from ourselves. Its origins lie in our prideful and rebellious hearts, and so all humanity is sinful and in need of God's forgiveness and healing.

What makes the passage even more provocative is that the scribes come to Jesus not out of concern for the law, but in the hope that they might put Him to the test. Would

He uphold the law or demonstrate compassion? Either way He would alienate someone.

To this day, we will never know what Jesus wrote in the dirt. Was He playing for time or giving the scribes time to think again before He turned the tables on them? His response to their demands has echoed through the centuries...let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her. Outflanked and silenced, they are without words and slowly, one by one, they slip away.

For most folks the story could have ended there, but Jesus goes one step further by offering the woman not just forgiveness but a new beginning. Instead of condemnation, He challenges her to turn her life around and sin no more. What ultimately happened to this woman we do not know, and perhaps it's just as well for the real focus here is on God's mercy and forgiveness.

In this encounter, Jesus opened the door for the woman to a new way of life, but the decision to walk through was hers alone. We see it over and over again; Jesus invites but does not coerce, He challenges but never infringes on our freedom. For love that is not freely given is not true love, and it is true perfect love that God wants us to experience and share.

And now just a few notes:

- SCRUTINIES - This weekend we celebrate the Third of the Three Scrutinies (at the 5:30 p.m. Vigil Mass at Holy Family). For that Mass, we will use the readings from Year A (we are currently in Year C). The reflection above comes from the readings for Year C.

Just as a review, the Scrutinies (there are three of them) are for the Elect, those who will be Baptized at the Easter Vigil, and are celebrated at a Sunday Mass (or at the Saturday Vigil Mass). The Scrutinies are beautiful rituals given to us by the Church to help those who are journeying toward Baptism and entry into the Church that their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ may be deepened. The Scrutinies are Rites of the Church for self-searching and repentance and have, above all, a spiritual purpose. The Scrutinies are

meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the Elect; to bring out, then strengthen, all that is upright, strong, and good. The Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the Elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

The Elect have been presented with the Creed and following the Third Scrutiny, the Elect will be presented with the Lord's Prayer.

Please continue to keep in your prayers all the Elect and all those preparing to come into the Church both at the Easter Vigil and outside the Easter Vigil. These folks have taken on a great commitment to come to know the Lord more fully. What a glorious celebration!

- LENTEN REGULATIONS -

1. ABSTINENCE - Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
2. FAST - Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed.
3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

- ADDITIONAL CONFESSION TIMES -
Wednesday evenings during Lent, 4:45 p.m. to 5:15 p.m. at Holy Family and Thursday evenings during Lent, 4:45 p.m. to 5:15 p.m. at St. Thomas. Sundays during Lent at the parish where I am leading the Stations of the Cross, 12:15 p.m. until 12:45 p.m.

- STATIONS OF THE CROSS - Wednesday evenings after the 5:30 p.m. Mass at Holy Family. Friday evenings, 6:00 p.m. at St. Thomas. Sunday afternoons at 1:00 p.m., alternating

parishes (Sunday, April 3, will be at Holy Family; Sunday, April 10, will be at St. Thomas).

- 40 DAYS FOR LIFE - St. Thomas has the 40 Days for Life Calendar in the back of church. Please sign up for one or more days to pray for life during Lent.

- RICE BOWLS - Are in the back of each church. Please consider taking one and using it as part of the Lenten Season and your own Lenten practices.

- HOLY WEEK - It's almost hard to believe but next Sunday, April 10, is Palm Sunday and marks the beginning of Holy Week. Palms will be blessed and available for everyone. Following is the Holy Week Schedule:

- Palm Sunday, April 10 - Regularly Scheduled Masses.

- Monday, April 11 - Communion Service at Holy Family, 7:00 a.m.

- Tuesday & Wednesday, April 12 & 13 - Weekday Mass at Holy Family, 7:00 a.m.

- Tuesday, April 12 - Chrism Mass at the Cathedral in Springfield, 6:30 p.m.

- Holy Thursday, April 14 - No morning Mass. Mass at St. Thomas, 5:30 p.m.; Mass at Holy Family at 7:30 p.m. The Blessed Sacrament will be reposed at a side Altar after each Mass for prayer throughout the night...at St. Thomas, until 11:00 p.m. and at Holy Family until Midnight.

- Good Friday, April 15 - No Masses this day anywhere in the world. Services at 5:30 p.m. at St. Thomas; Services at 7:30 p.m. at Holy Family. Additionally, Stations of the Cross at Holy Family at 11:00 a.m. and at St. Thomas at 3:00 p.m.

- Holy Saturday, April 16 - No Masses until Easter Vigil. Easter Vigil begins at 8:00 p.m. at Holy Family.

- Easter Sunday, April 17 - 6:30 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. Masses at Holy Family; 10:00 a.m. Mass at St. Thomas.

- HOLY THURSDAY - I need to have at least two people (or two couples) sign up to be present with the Blessed Sacrament after the Masses at both parishes on Holy Thursday night. Of course, anyone is both welcome

and encouraged to spend some time in prayer that evening in front of the Blessed Sacrament, but since I will be having Mass at both parishes it will be necessary to make sure there is someone always present with the Blessed Sacrament as I cannot be at both places the entire time. I now have the sign-up sheet in the back of each church. For St. Thomas, I will need folks starting around 6:30 p.m. through 11 p.m. At Holy Family, I will need folks from about 8:30 p.m. through Midnight. Except for one slot, it will be 1-hour slots. Again, I encourage everyone to spend some time that evening in prayer with the Blessed Sacrament, but am asking that I have at least two people at all times who can sign up for an hour and commit to being present. If you miss the sign-up sheet, just give me a call at the Rectory, 217-773-3233.

- WASHING OF FEET - I will be doing the washing of feet during the Holy Thursday Liturgy. I will be asking folks, but if you are planning to be present, I'd ask you to consider having me wash your feet. Please let me know or be open to accepting when I ask.

- BAPTISM - I am happy to have baptized Barrett Don Louis Flesner on Saturday evening, March 19, at Holy Family. We welcome Barrett Don Louis as a son of God and one of the newest members of God's family. Barrett Don Louis is the newborn son of Brandon and Danielle Flesner.

- BLANKETS - A while back I asked for folks who crochet or knit. I've had several ladies at Holy Family (I don't have anyone from St. Thomas yet) who have crocheted pure white baby afghans to be used as the white garment for our Baptisms and lap afghans that I will be using when I visit the sick or homebound of the parishes. These have been so meaningful to those who have received them and very much appreciated. I think the ladies are working on a few more white baby afghans at Holy Family, but I want to encourage others that if you knit or crochet and would like to make some of these afghans, please let me know (or, at Holy Family, contact Ann O'Sullivan). Again, it's one of the many great ways to embody

stewardship in our parishes. Thank you to all who have been helping!

- MOWING - A reminder and call for help...the person who had been mowing at Holy Family will be unable to continue this year. We will certainly need to attend to this very soon. I'd like to have teams of folks volunteer to mow and trim the property each week. This is yet again one of many great ways to embody stewardship in the parish. I'd like to have a dozen or so teams so the number of times that each team mows and trims in the year is minimal, two or three times is all. A few folks have already signed up. Please let Tammy know as soon as possible if you'd be able to help. My hope is to continually improve the landscaping around the property and to have folks who make this part of their contribution to parish life.

- SATURDAY MORNINGS - Though we are not officially "scheduling" them, I normally offer the weekday Saturday Mass at 8:00 a.m. at Holy Family. This is the weekday Mass, not the Vigil Mass in anticipation of Sunday. You are, of course, most welcome to come and join us. Occasionally I cannot offer that Mass at Holy Family and try to make that announcement at the Thursday and Friday morning Masses prior to the Saturday if I am aware (and remember). You can also give me a call at the Rectory to check and see if I am offering Mass on a particular Saturday morning.

Thank you for your continued prayers and support of me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. I do hope that your Lent is holy and fruitful. Please be assured of my prayers for you during this Lenten Season and throughout the year. May you have a most blessed week.
