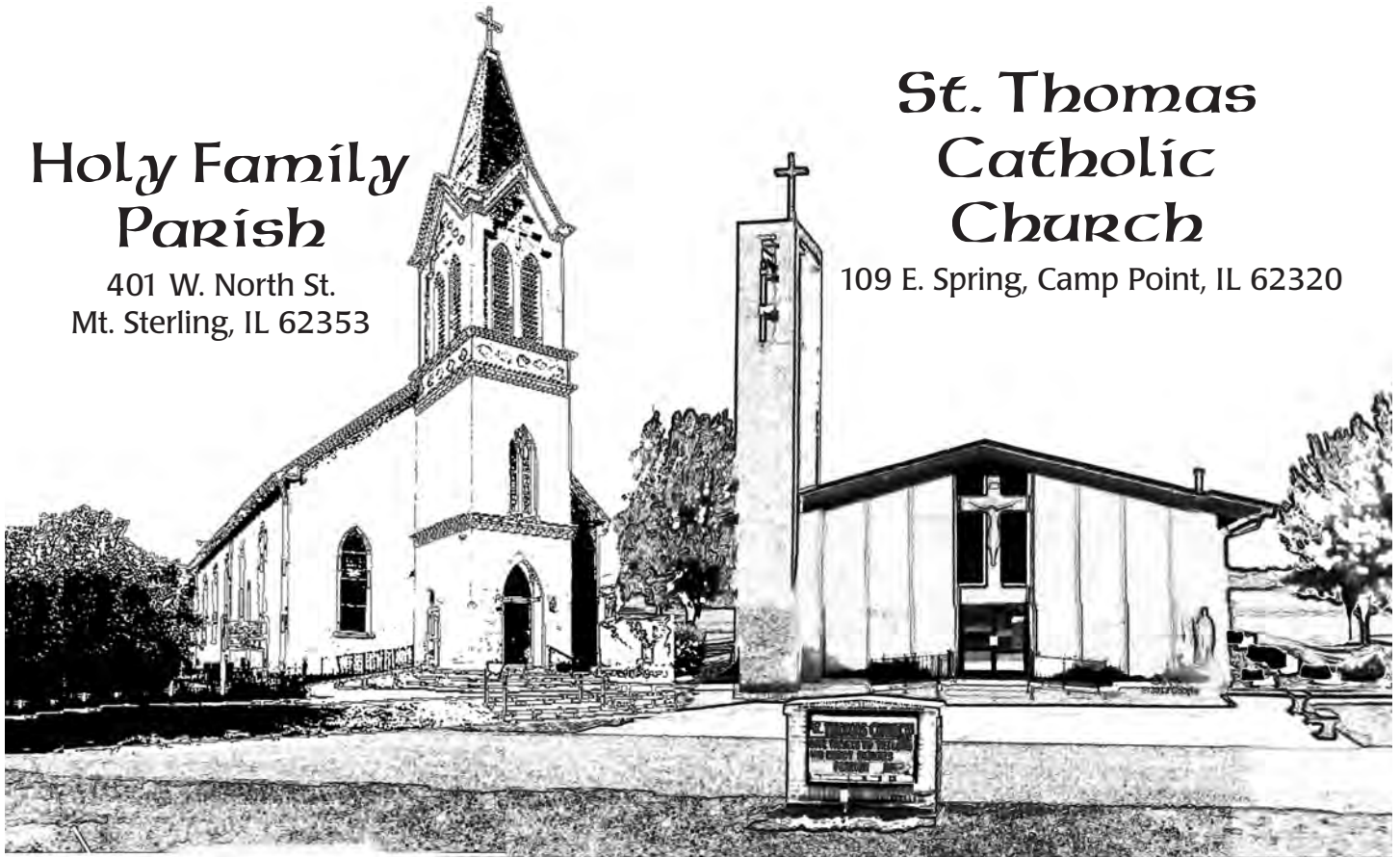

From the Pastor's Desk

Happy Easter to all of you. Today we celebrate the Third Sunday of Easter. We are reminded that through the Holy Eucharist, we receive God's Divine Love so that we may be witnesses to Jesus' mission.

Imagine for just a moment being in the first century and knowing that Jesus would soon be leaving. Like any anxious member of a group, we might ask, "Who's going to lead us when you're gone?" Jesus replies, "Peter!"

We may not believe it. How could Jesus choose the person who denied knowing Him - not once, not twice, but three times? He would not follow Jesus to Golgotha. And yet, he's the one who is supposed to lead Jesus' sheep?!

Peter might not stand out to us at that time as a first choice, but this is the man Jesus chooses to be the leader of the young Christian community. Peter is flawed, and perhaps his trustworthiness seems questionable. But redemption awaits him.

Peter becomes a leader who is not afraid to voice his beliefs in the face of adversity. When he is brought before the authorities and reminded that he is not supposed to be talking about Jesus, Peter emphatically denounces their authority, obeying only God's authority (what a great example for us to follow). In following Him, Peter furthers Jesus' mission. And in doing so, he is honored by God the Father.

In the Gospel, Jesus and Peter have an exchange about love. For English speakers, we only have the one word - love. But the Gospel is written in Greek and there are

several words for love. Jesus asks Peter if he loves Him, using the Greek word *agapas*, which is Divine Love. Peter responds that he does love Him, but instead of using the term *agapas*, he uses the term *philo*, which is brotherly love. This happens again with the same result. Finally, Jesus asks Peter if he loves Him with that brotherly love, and Peter replies that of course he does.

Peter, again showing his limitations, is not able to say that he loves Jesus with Divine Love because he is limited by his humanity. It takes God's grace to be able to radiate Divine Love, and that comes in the fruit of the Spirit at Pentecost. Only when he is imbued with Divine Love does Peter become capable of leading Jesus' flock.

When we partake of the Holy Eucharist - the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ made truly present to us (not symbolically but truly present) in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass - we too become filled with that same Divine Love. What an incredible gift we receive...and are we always aware of that great gift?!

That gift, that love, it is not meant to be hidden; it is meant for us to share. When we leave the church after having received the Holy Eucharist, do we go out and live our lives signifying that we too follow Jesus and that we are filled with that Divine Love? Let us pray that we do.

And now a few notes:

- DOORS - Once again, I remind you to please check the church doors at both parishes as you leave to make sure they have closed completely. Sometimes they seem to be closed but are not latched.

- MAY - The month of May has traditionally been known as the month of Mary. As such, I have asked the music folks at both parishes to include Marian hymns for each Mass. These hymns are a rich treasure that we have in the Church.

We will also be having May Crownings at both parishes. At St. Thomas, this is planned for Sunday, May 1, with our PSR kids. At Holy Family we will be doing a May Crowning in conjunction with St. Mary School's Grandparents/Special Person Day on Friday, May 6, and also again

on Saturday, May 7, at the 5:30 p.m. Mass with Bosco kids and SMS.

May Altars are also very much a tradition, especially in individual homes. I would encourage you to “build” your own May Altar at home for the month of May – a stature of the Blessed Virgin Mary along with flowers and perhaps a Rosary and whatever else to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary. Be sure to pray together as a family as well, perhaps the Holy Rosary each evening, and to talk about Mary’s great role in salvation history and how she is both a perfect example for us in living our Christian lives and a great intercessor.

In addition to your May Altars in your homes, I am hoping to have a May Altar in each parish church during May as well. Mary, our Mother, pray for us!

- FIRST FRIDAY DEVOTION - Friday, May 6, at St. Thomas. Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament beginning at Noon. Confessions from 5:00 p.m. to 5:45 p.m. Benediction at 5:45 p.m. and Mass at 6:00 p.m. As always, I encourage you to spend some time with the Lord in Blessed Sacrament and to join us for Mass, and also to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation regularly.

- NOCTURNAL ADORATION - Beginning at 10:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 7, at Holy Family and going through the night. Benediction is at 7:45 a.m. followed by our regularly scheduled 8:00 a.m. Mass.

- ASSIGNMENTS - New Diocesan assignments for priests were announced last weekend at the Masses in the parishes that are affected. As you keep the clergy in your prayers, I ask you to especially pray for those folks who are affected by these new assignments. Most of the new assignments take effect July 1.

There are not many changes in our area or Deanery. Beardstown, Virginia, and Arensville (not in our Deanery) will have a new Pastor, Fr. Paul Stein. The current Parochial Administrator there, Fr. Ervin Caliente, will serve as Parochial Administrator of the parishes in Carlinville, Gillespie, and Benld for a short time and then will begin a period

of discernment with the Norbertine Community in Silverado, California.

Fr. Dave Beagles (whom many of you know since he spent time here as a seminarian) is currently at St. Francis in Quincy and has been assigned as Pastor of two parishes in Robinson and Oblong.

Fr. Pawel Luczak, the current Parochial Vicar at St. Peter in Quincy, has been assigned to two parishes in Newton and Sainte Marie as Parochial Vicar. Deacon Zachary Samples, who is anticipated to be Ordained to the Sacred Order of Priesthood on May 28, is assigned to St. Peter’s in Quincy as Parochial Vicar.

Again, I ask you to keep in prayer in a special way those affected by the changes, including the priests themselves. Although it is very much a part of the Priesthood, assignment changes are never easy.

- K OF C MEETING - Tuesday, May 3, at Noon in the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. All members are encouraged to attend.

- JUBILEE - On Wednesday, May 4, the priests of the Diocese will gather in Springfield for the annual Priest Jubilee Celebration. It begins in the afternoon with a spiritual talk for the priests followed by Solemn Evening Prayer, and then dinner with recognition of the priests celebrating significant Jubilees. This year we have a number of Jubilarians:

Two priests are celebrating 65 years of Ordination: Fr. Louis Schlangen and Fr. Henry Schmidt.

Three priests are celebrating 60 years of Ordination: Fr. Jerry Wickenhauser, M.M., Fr. Philip Kraft, and Fr. Joseph Zimmerman, O.F.M.

Two priests are celebrating their Golden Jubilee (50 years of Ordination): Fr. John Beveridge and Fr. Richard Chiola.

Finally, two priests are celebrating their Silver Jubilee (25 years of Ordination): Fr. George Nellikunnel and Fr. Mark Schulte.

Congratulations to each of these priests who are celebrating significant years as a

priest. Many of them are familiar to many of you as they have connections to this area. May God continue to bless them and their work in the Priesthood of Jesus Christ that the Lord has called them to. We are grateful for the work they have done and continue to do, and I ask you to keep them in your prayers. I personally am especially grateful to share in the Priesthood of Jesus Christ with these men.

NEXT SUNDAY - Next Sunday, May 8, is Mother's Day. While this is a secular celebration, it is significant for us as we recognize and honor those women who have cooperated with God to bring life into this world. I will be offering a special blessing to all mothers at all the Masses that weekend.

Next Sunday, May 8, is also the Fourth Sunday of Easter, designated World Day of Prayer for Vocations and commonly known as Good Shepherd Sunday. The following is taken from the USCCB website:

“The purpose of World Day of Prayer for Vocations is to publicly fulfill the Lord's instruction to ‘Pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into his harvest’ (Mt 9:38; Lk 10:2). As a climax to a prayer that is continually offered throughout the Church, it affirms the primacy of faith and grace in all that concerns vocations to the priesthood and to the consecrated life. While appreciating all vocations, the Church concentrates its attention this day on vocations to the ordained ministries (priesthood and diaconate), consecrated life in all its forms (male and female religious life, societies of apostolic life, consecrated virginity), secular institutes in their diversity of services and membership, and to the missionary life. This year marks the 59th Anniversary of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations.”

I ask each of you to pray especially on this day for Vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life and for the holiness of these vocations.

Please also remember our own Diocese's initiative to pray one Hail Mary each day at 4:40 p.m. that our Diocese may have 40 seminarians. I encourage you to join folks throughout the Diocese in this daily prayer.

DONUT SUNDAY - Sunday, May 1, is the first Sunday of the month which means Donut Sunday at St. Thomas. Plan to join us after the 10:00 a.m. Mass in the Hall.

MOWNING - Grass mowing is in full swing now. Thank you to those in the parishes who volunteer to mow and trim the grounds of the parishes. We have quite a number at St. Thomas who take turns each week.

We have begun this at Holy Family as well. We could certainly use more teams to help with mowing and trimming once a week. The more teams we have, the fewer times each team needs to mow. We are off to a good start, and the mowing and trimming look great. If you would be able to help out, please let Tammy know.

CANDLES - A few notes on candles in the Church, especially the votive candles. Votive candles are a tradition in the Church and are lit for a number of reasons, including to accompany special prayers for oneself or others and in thanksgiving to God. Once candles are lit, they remain burning until they naturally extinguish. A monetary offering is usually made for the candle that is lit. Please be aware that recently votive candles, like many other things, have become a bit more difficult to obtain at times. Additionally, we are currently experiencing significant price increases in the votive candles.

Votive candles need to be burned in appropriate containers. Thus far, this is not an issue at St. Thomas. However, at Holy Family, where we have only the 7-day votive candles and a fairly limited number of appropriate containers, folks are lighting the candles outside of the appropriate glass container and then placing the candle openly on the candle stand. This is dangerous and I ask you **PLEASE DO NOT DO THIS!** Besides the appropriate containers needed for burning, there must also be adequate airflow around the candles. At times, I have found a number of lit candles bunched together on the candle rack outside of appropriate containers and without adequate airflow.

Now, I recognize people's desire to light a candle and to have a candle burning. This is good and appropriate. I personally like to light candles. However, we do need to be aware of what I mentioned above. I am looking at the possibility of either acquiring another candle stand at Holy Family or changing out the red globe holders with straight glass holders. The second option, I think, would allow us to have a few more candles on the stand that we currently have. Either way, there will be a cost involved. Another stand would come with a significant cost (I am looking around to see if I can find any good used ones). Changing out the current globes would only add a few more candles and would still involve a cost with the holding brackets and glass containers.

In the meantime, I ask you to light a single candle for now for your intentions, allowing that candle to burn and extinguish before lighting another so as to give as many folks as possible a chance to light candles. Please only light them in the glass containers (at Holy Family). As I explore the possibility of adding candles, please let me know if you are interested in helping to purchase another stand or supplies to make modifications to the one we have.

As far as St. Thomas, the only votive candle stand we have is near the Blessed Mother statue in the Sanctuary. I would like to eventually have a matching one near the St. Joseph statue on the opposite side of the Sanctuary. Also, St. Thomas currently only has options for small votive candles. As I look to add a votive candle stand, I am also looking to add a few of the larger 7-day votive candles to the stands. I have to take a closer look at the stand we have, but I think this is an easy enough option to add or change. Again, as I mentioned above, if you are interested in helping to purchase another stand or modification supplies, please let me know.

Lighting and burning votive candles is a tradition that is important. I recognize that. Thank you for helping out with this. I'll be talking more about candles in future bulletins. Some of the information is fascinating and I think you will find it interesting.

Thank you for your continued prayers for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. You remain in my prayers each day. May you have a most Blessed Week!
