## Easter Sunday

**APRIL 17, 2022** 

Acts 10:34a,37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 (or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8); John 20:1-9 (or Luke 24:1-12)

In all Masses of Easter, we renew our baptismal promises. Most of us were too young to remember our baptism; our sponsors and parents made the promises for us. But we must "ratify" those vows if we are to be Christians. We promised to renounce Satan and all his attractions; we promised to be loyal to Jesus Christ.

What does it mean to you to be a Catholic Christian? Do you just "go through the motions," or does Jesus Christ make a difference in your life at every moment? If Jesus Christ did not rise from the dead, then the Church is a fraud and faith is a sham. But if he really did rise from the dead, his message is true! And if it is true, then you must follow him with all your heart and soul and strength and mind.

On Palm Sunday, the New Testament reading (Philippians 2:6) told us that our attitude must always be that of Christ. Don't be a hypocrite; don't be two-faced: If you say you are Catholic, then be one. If you don't want to practice it, don't pretend!

To be Catholic means some tough decisions in this world. It means absolute honesty. It means carrying our crosses joyfully, whatever they be. It means having hope even when things seem hopeless. It means doing the best we can, and putting our complete trust in the Lord.

To follow Christ means purity of heart and body. It means that we use our sexuality only in the context of marriage. It means the moderation of all our appetites and desires, using them only as God intends them. It means standing up for what is true and right, even when we are opposed and laughed at.

If some of these things seem hard, realize that it is liberating to follow Christ! He frees us from entanglements which drag us to destruction. He gives us absolute joy and eternal happiness, for he has conquered death by his resurrection!

The first reading is a sermon of Peter to Cornelius. He tells the story of Jesus, concluding with the death and resurrection of the Lord. The second reading (Colossians) tells us that we should be concerned about the things of heaven, since (in our baptism) we have been raised with Christ. The alternative second reading tells us that we should live a "Passover" being a pure dough in Christ who was sacrificed for us.

The Gospel translation may not convey the full impact of the words "wrappings on the ground." In the original language, the words mean "wrappings laying in their folds." The idea is that the wrappings still had the contour of the body of Jesus even though the body was not there. It was as if the body had evaporated! The only explanation can be that he had risen from the dead. (Otherwise, the wrappings would show wrinkles, or would show that someone had snatched the body away.) Christ has risen! Let us be loyal to him.

#### Dear Parishioners,

"At daybreak on the first day of the week, the women who had come from Galilee with Jesus took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb; but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. While they were puzzling over this, behold, two men in dazzling garments appeared to them. They were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground. They said to them, "Why do you seek the living one among the dead? He is not here, but He has been raised." Thus the words of the gospel at the Easter Vigil. Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia, Jesus is risen from the dead. This is our Easter joy, this is the Easter message. If Jesus has been raised from the dead, then through our baptisms each of us is a new creation. Our sins and death have been conquered and Christ is the victor. Let each of us rejoice in the Easter mystery as it has changed all of us.

I want to thank all those who made our Easter celebration so special this year. Our decorating committee used their talents to reflect the celebrations of the Triduum as well as the solemn celebration of Easter. I also want to thank Frericks for the Easter flowers as well as the generosity of our parishioners who contributed to the beauty of our solemn celebrations with a memorial for a loved one. Then the music, from the cantors, musicians, choirs, as well as the entire church family — each enhanced our liturgies and made everything come alive. Your presence and participation helped make the joy of Easter present and active in our celebrations this year. After suffering from COVID for over two years, it was great to see people back to church, celebrating the Lord's Paschal Mystery together through the Triduum and Easter Sunday. Then we had the greeters, ushers, lectors, servers, and our parishioners — each contributing by being present and worshipping and celebrating together as a parish family. On behalf of all of us, I thank you from the bottom of my heart. It is such a joy to celebrate with you and for you as we proclaim that Christ has died, Christ is risen, and Christ is present in our midst.

This past Tuesday, April 12, the Bishop celebrated the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral in Springfield. At this Mass, he blessed the following oils that will be used in all the parishes of our diocese: the Oil of the Sick, the Oil of Catechumens, and the Oil of Holy Chrism. A representative from each parish will bring these oils back to each parish, to be used in the celebration of the Sacraments as well as the Blessing of Altars and Churches. The old oils will be burned in our Easter fire for the Easter Vigil and the new oils will be stored in the ambry of the church, which for St. Peters is located in the back wall of the sanctuary.

On behalf of the parish family of St. Peter, I want to welcome the following people who through the Sacraments of Initiation are the newest members of our church: Michael Bicklein, Dustin Forrest, and Douglas Hartley.

We also want to welcome these new members who made their profession of faith in the Catholic Church: Scott Phillips and Jeffrey Terry.




