

"On The Q/T..."

From the devotional, God Calling, the entry for June 27: "You must not feel the burden of your failure. A rigid doing of the simple duties and success will crown your efforts. I had no words of reproach for any I healed. The man was whole and free who had wrecked his physical being by sin; the woman at the well...; the woman taken in adultery...; (none were) told to bear the burden of the consciousness of their sins."

On to the question from Fr. Tony:

We used to call them "Chinese handcuffs." I don't know what they call them now. I am referring to that long tube-like contraption of woven strands of paper, into which you put a finger on your left hand into one side, and a finger on your right hand into the other side, and when you pull from both sides that tube wraps itself more and more tightly around your fingers and you can't get out. The escape comes with pushing the fingers toward each other, then releasing one at a time. Guilt - especially guilt you're trying to avoid - is exactly that type of entrapment. Can't yank yourself out of it; instead, relax, move toward it, face squarely your responsibility. Then comes the release.

So how about this question: What's keeping me from doing the simple things that keep my faith in Jesus alive? I know what they are - have to, to avoid them as skillfully as I do. What am I pulling against, and getting more immobile, more entrapped? How can I relax, face what I've put in the way, take responsibility for it - and get a move on to show Christ to others?

HAPPY FOURTH OF JULY "The legalization of termination of pregnancy is none other than the authorization given to an adult, with the approval of an established law, to take the lives of children yet unborn and thus incapable of defending themselves. It is difficult to imagine a more unjust situation...." The quote comes from Saint Pope John Paul II, in his book, *Crossing the Threshold of Hope*. You heard this, and a bit more, during the sermon for July 2/3. It hasn't sunk into the national consciousness yet: how much the meaning of the Fourth of July depended upon the recent Roe v. Wade related Supreme Court decision. We have demonstrated that within our governing charters, we are able to correct and renew ourselves as a nation. That's a terrific thing to celebrate on this Fourth of July. Opposition, even within the Catholic Church, sees things differently. And so the quest for the upholding of the gift of life continues...in the nation that is "up" for the challenge.
