

"On the Q/T..."

From the book, A Simple Path, Mother Teresa of Calcutta, by Lucinda Varney: Our understanding of "faith" as Catholics is that it is a supernatural virtue infused in the soul. It's as if this virtue is a power, an ability....Without faith, we are not able to believe in things that are mysteries and that are beyond our capacity to comprehend.... As we grow into adulthood, we need to penetrate them, to understand them more, so that it becomes more credible."

On to the question from Fr. Tony:

Have you ever seen people who aren't satisfied with anything less than sitting down, taking their time, and figuring things out for themselves, no matter how long it takes? Some of us know people here, past and present, who made livelihoods out of doing just that. Notice one thing, though: what they couldn't figure out didn't mean they could walk away, or change whatever they were working on. The mystery remained the mystery in whatever they were figuring out. And it wouldn't be figured out by their walking away.

So how about this question: What teaching of the Catholic Church have you walked away from, instead of grappling with it, staying with it, understanding it - even being able to give your faith to it...while the understanding isn't there...for as long as it takes? That...takes faith!

AFTER ROE V. WADE: BE PREPARED You never know when or where: protestors of the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision can show up at the doors of our churches. Peaceful protests are never a problem; we realize that people disagree about the Church's position on a number of teachings. But lurking behind just about everything today is the threat of violence. We're not expecting anything to happen here, but we're not waiting to come up with a course of action if anything unexpectedly should happen. Therefore, as parishioners and participants at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, we ask you to adhere to the following: first, try not to engage with such protestors; second, follow the directions of local law enforcement; third, do not respond to media, because it's best to have a single spokesperson, and that should be the pastor; fourth, everyone, be aware. Have you ever been goaded into an argument that served as a pretext for its escalation? Weapons of patience and peace, please, on the part of all of us. – Fr. T.

PASTORAL CARE VISITATION: COMMUNION TO THE SICK AND HOMEBOUND This is one of two things we had better address right away. Whether, as a parishioner who's already offered yourself to this ministry, or as one who senses a call to begin: let's see who wants to help out in this area of our Church life. By now, you know we have rules. You should love the Mass and be there without fail, except for dire circumstances keeping you from the Eucharist; your moral life and behavior should be exemplary, supported by the sacrament of Confession; and while divorce itself doesn't prevent you from being an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion, re-marriage outside the Church without annulment from the previous marriage does. Be aware: when we visit nursing homes or hospitals, we're bound to wear masks - can't change that. When we visit homes, we have to respect the wishes of the resident, whose preference could go either way. Please contact the Rectory and let us know of your renewed or recent interest. We'll take it from there!


