From the Pastor's Desk

As we celebrate the Fifteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time, we are reminded that we owe God our full-hearted "yes," we owe God our complete selves.

Today's Scriptures present us with a challenge; that is, to live out our Christian lives wholeheartedly, to love God with everything that is in us, and to put aside our own comfort and ease in the service of our neighbor, especially at the moment we see our neighbor in need. It's true, we all know this is so much easier said than done

at times. And at times, what God calls us to doesn't fit into the sentimentality of the "faith" we have created for ourselves.

In the first reading from the Book of Deuteronomy, Moses presents us with this deep challenge as he tells his fellow Israelites to return to God with all your heart and all your soul, listening to God and obeying God's commands. In the Gospel, the scholar seems to understand this demand when he tells Jesus that the way to eternal life is to love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself.

This is a tall order, and it calls on us to examine our conscience. It asks us to think about all that we do each day and ask ourselves whether or not we are indeed loving God and neighbor absolutely and completely. We might consider how we give this love in the midst of our busy lives, when we have children to take care of, jobs that call on much of our attention each day, and responsibilities to our friends and our community.

One way to do this is through love and service to our neighbor, especially at difficult and inconvenient times. That was certainly the case in Jesus' parable in the Gospel. The Samaritan probably had his own plans for the day as he walked along the road. Yet the moment he saw the robbers' victim lying on the road, severely injured, he dropped his plans and responded. He showed incredible care for this stranger, his neighbor, even changing his plans to return the next day to ensure that this neighbor was looked after.

This great love for God and neighbor is a "simple" command that we all know can at times be difficult to follow. Moses reminds us that God's law is written within our hearts. All we need is to listen to God as He speaks within our hearts and respond fully to what we are told to do at each individual moment. This could mean

praise and adoration of God – or responding to the immediate situation...calling a friend whose mother or father died, listening to a child's tale of woe, or helping the stranger at our door.

As we approach the Altar each time to receive the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist, made truly present to us in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, let us pray for open, loving hearts and minds, ready to respond immediately out of total love for God to whatever is demanded of us at each moment.

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Monday, July 11 Obligatory Memorial of St. Benedict, Abbot. Benedict wrote the famous Monastic Rule noted for its wisdom and moderation and need for obedience. He founded twelve monasteries and is considered the Patriarch of Western Monasticism. Benedictines today number about seven thousand five hundred Religious. St. Benedict died in 547 and is a patron of Europe. St. Benedict, Pray for us!
- Wednesday, July 13 Optional memorial of St. Henry. Henry II, along with his wife, St. Cunegunda, is known for assisting the poor. As emperor, he respected the Church's freedom, fostering ecclesiastical and monastic reform. He founded the See of Bamberg as a center for missions to the Slavs. He died in 1024 and is patron of the Benedictine oblates. St. Henry, Pray for us!
- Thursday, July 14 In the United States of America, Obligatory Memorial of St. Kateri Tekakwitha, Virgin. Kateri Tekakwitha led a life of great austerity and love in spite of ridicule and abuse. Called the Lily of the Mohawks, she was the first Native American to be declared Blessed (in 1980). She died in 1680 at the age of twenty-four and was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on October 21, 2012. St. Kateri Tekakwitha, Pray for us!

As a side note, in the United States of America, the optional memorial of St. Camillus de Lellis, priest, is perpetually transferred from this day to July 18.

- Friday, July 15 Obligatory Memorial of St. Bonaventure, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. Bonaventure was Minister general of the Order of Friars Minor (O.F.M.) for seventeen years. He was also Cardinal Bishop of Albano. He is known to have authored Biblical Commentaries and many spiritual and ascetical treatises. Bonaventure is known as the "Seraphic Doctor." He died in 1274. St. Bonaventure, Pray for us!
- Saturday, July 16 Optional memorial of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. The Scriptures speak of the beauty of Mount Carmel in Galilee where the prophet Elijah defended the faith of Israel in the Living God. It is on Mount Carmel at the beginning of the Thirteenth Century, under the title of St. Mary of Mount Carmel, that the Order of Carmelites (O. Carm.) had its formal beginning. Today, the Carmelites number about one thousand nine hundred Religious. Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Pray for us!

- ATTACKS AGAINST TRUTH Mainstream media continues to promote a culture of death, immorality, and hatred and violence toward Christians, and especially Catholics. Sadly, some "professed" Catholics have fallen into all of this as well. Some argue "how dare you say that" yet the evidence is so clear and no longer even subtle in many cases.

Make no doubt about it, the devil is real, prowling the world seeking the ruin of souls, relying on his minions to help carry out that destruction. And as people turn to God more and more, the devil's attacks become even more severe. It is not a cause for fear, but it is something we must remain mindful of, and we cannot fall into complacency. We must also be mindful of the "wolves in sheep's clothing" that surround us. They work to snatch us from the flock of Truth, seeking the destruction of our Eternal Salvation. They are clever and cunning but always speak against the Truth.

For some, there seems to be no concern for the salvation of souls...their own or anyone else's. This is a sad state of affairs. Our primary focus as we live out our Christian life is the salvation of souls. We know of God's love and mercy, but we can never presume our own or another's salvation. Presumption is problematic in not only its sinfulness but in the other things it often leads one to, such as complacency or mediocrity or expectation.

Our Christian lives are not about sentimentality. We are called to live in the joy and peace of Christ that only He can give, and our lives are filled with goodness help us grow in holiness. Still. Christianity and our concern about salvation isn't about feelings or making us feel good. It is, rather, very serious, and I urge everyone to recognize the seriousness of it and to live lives in accordance with the Gospel Truth. What the world tries to put forth as truth or invent as truth is not such. There is often times an attempt to pass it off as something good, framed in a misunderstanding (at best) or a deliberate twisting of "equality" or "freedom" or "love." But Truth is found only in Christ, who is the fullness of Truth.

Attacks on the Catholic Church continue because the Catholic Church has and proclaims the fullness of Truth and many folks do not want to hear the Truth, much less live the Truth. As these attacks against Truth continue, I urge you to pray and offer sacrifice for the Church, for Her members, for Her clergy, for all people, and for the salvation of the world. The Lord promises us that the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against the Church. This is a powerful reminder for us. Though the Lord says nothing about being easy or free from trial, we know that the Church and the Truth will prevail.

Thank you for your continued prayers for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. Please know of my continued daily prayers for you. May you have a most blessed week!
