From the Pastor's Desk

"I do not know where you are from. Depart from me." Wouldn't those be terrible words to hear from the Lord, to think that He would not know us!

Today the Church celebrates the Twenty-First Sunday of Ordinary Time, and we are reminded that no one, no matter who they are, has an absolute guarantee of being saved. Still, we know too that Jesus comes to bring the Truth, to bring God's love and freedom to the whole world, to all people. As Christians we should be proclaiming the Truth and the Good News of God's love to the whole world and to show what it means to really live. We do this for our own growth in holiness, but also in hope that many will respond to its message of life through a conversion of their own lives.

But we need to make sure that we are living that Christian life, fully and authentically, as God has called us to. You see, the proclamation of the Good News of God's love is not just verbal. Our whole lifestyle is to be a proclamation to all those who hunger for Truth, and love, and justice, and compassion. Indeed, to be saved is to live and die in a close, loving relationship with God and with others.

This commitment to building a relationship with the Lord and with others that we're called to brings to mind a story of a young novice monk who entered a monastery and took a vow of silence. He was allowed to say two words every ten years. After his first ten years, the Abbott asked him what two words he wanted to speak and his response was "bed, hard." After the next ten years, the Abbott again asked him what two words he would like to speak and his response was "food, stinks." After the next ten years, the Abbott once again asked him what two words he would like to speak and his response was "I, quit," to which "Well, I can see the Abbott responded, why...all you ever do is complain."

Now, this is indeed just a story and perhaps it makes us chuckle a bit. But it brings about a great point for our own lives. You see, for thirty years in the monastery, the monk was immersed in Sacred Scripture, listened to and studied Jesus' teachings, attended Liturgies, and received the Holy Eucharist and yet, somehow, he still missed the point of it all. His interests were not in things associated with the Kingdom that Jesus speaks about but rather in those temporal things that mattered to him.

By placing his needs first, the monk failed to see the value of the discipline that our Second Reading today says will bring the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who are trained by it. Indeed, that Second Reading says "Whom the Lord loves, He disciplines. He scourges every son He acknowledges. Endure your trials as discipline...At the time, all discipline seems a cause not for joy but pain. Yet later it brings the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who are trained by it."

The story of the monk illustrates how our attitude, and failure to act from a place of Truth of God's love, can dampen our very awareness of it. God's love and kindness and fidelity are bursting out in everything around us. If we are to proclaim the Truth and the Good News of God's love to all the world, we've got to align our works and thoughts with the message of the Cross which truly proclaims the steadfast kindness and fidelity of God. It doesn't give us a warm and fuzzy feeling that often times folks desire.

The Lord reveals to us in the Gospel today that the path to life is through a narrow gate and this can be summed up with love. It cannot be stressed enough that the word love has taken on many meanings and is often times misused or misunderstood. What love is here, and throughout the Gospel, is that care and concern for the other, compassion for the other; that is, entering into the suffering of the other for no other reason than for the good of the other, no strings attached, not expecting anything in return - unconditional, genuine love. Love desires the good of the other and seeks the Eternal salvation of the other. The greatest form of love is Truth since Christ is Truth Itself.

Love in one sense seems to be an all-embracing word, yet to guide all of one's actions only by love is a choice that indeed may be difficult for many of us and unfortunately, for some, it is a choice that is rejected or unable to be made. It may be preferred by some to go the broader way, an easier way, a way that feels good, a way erroneously called by some a more human way...that of hatred, jealously, resentment, competitiveness, revenge. But the Lord calls us to that narrow gate of love, no matter our state in life. We might ask ourselves how "successful" we've been in walking that narrow way of unconditional and unremitting love.

Indeed, it would be terrible to hear the words from Jesus "I do not know where you are from, depart from me." We might even wonder how He could ever say that. Well, perhaps it's because we don't recognize Christ

as the Truth or we don't recognize Christ in those people whom we hated, or resented, or used, or exploited, or manipulated, or rejected, or trampled on.

Let us pray that the Lord will recognize us. May we both believe in who Christ is and commit ourselves, each and every day, to building our relationship with Him through love and Truth. A relationship built here on earth will hopefully allow us to recline at table with Him in the Kingdom of God. What will you do today so Jesus knows you?

And now just a few notes:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Monday, August 22 - Obligatory Memorial of The Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This Memorial, prescribed in 1954 by Pope Pius XII for May 31, is now fittingly celebrated on the Octave Day of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In his 1954 encyclical *To the Queen of Heaven*, Pius XII points out that Mary deserves the title because she is Mother of God, because she is closely associated as the New Eve with Jesus' redemptive work, because of her preeminent perfection, and because of her intercessory power.

As the glorified Jesus remains with us as our King till the end of time (Matthew 28:20), so does Mary, who was assumed into heaven and crowned Queen of Heaven and Earth. Mary, Queen of Heaven and Earth, Pray for us!

- Tuesday, August 23 Optional Memorial of St. Rose of Lima, Virgin. St. Rose of Lima was born Isabel de Oliva and was a Peruvian mystic. Because of her beauty, she was nicknamed "Rosa." She was a Third Order Dominican, living a life of penance and solitude while caring for the homeless, elderly, and sick. She died in 1617 at the age of thirty-one. St. Rose is the patroness of the Philippines and of South America, especially Peru. She is also the patroness of florists and gardeners. St. Rose of Lima, Pray for us!
- Wednesday, August 24 Feast of St. Bartholomew, Apostle. Bartholomew is likely a surname in the Synoptic Gospels meaning "the son of Tolmai." In John's Gospel, he is known as Nathaniel. He is closely associated with Philip and is said to have preached the Gospel in India and in Armenia. According to tradition he was martyred by

being flayed alive in the First Century. St. Bartholomew, Pray for us!

- Thursday, August 25 - Optional Memorials of St. Louis and St. Joseph Calasanz. St. Louis IX of France was a model ruler and father of eleven. He was a Third Order Franciscan who cared especially for lepers. He built Sainte Chapelle in Paris as a reliquary for the Crown of Thorns. While on his second crusade, he died of the plague near Tunis in 1270. He is the patron of masons and sculptors. St. Louis, Pray for us!

Joseph Calasanz was born in Aragon and in 1617 founded the Clerics Regular of Religious Schools in 1617 which today numbers almost fourteen hundred Religious. Dedicated to helping poor children, he faced many trials and calumnies for his work including the temporary suppression of his institute. He died in 1648 and is patron of all Christian schools dedicated to assisting the poor. St. Joseph Calasanz, Pray for us!

- Saturday, August 27 Obligatory Memorial of St. Monica After thirty years of prayer, St. Monica obtained the conversion of her dissolute pagan husband and under the guidance of St. Ambrose (whose Memorial is celebrated on December 7), she won the conversion of her eldest son, St. Augustine. St. Monica died in 387 and is the patroness of mothers. St. Monica, Pray for us!
- Sunday, August 28 This year, the Church celebrates the Twenty-Second Sunday of Ordinary Time on August 28. Outside of this, August 28 marks the Memorial of St. Augustine, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. St. Monica, as noted above, was the mother of St. Augustine and her Memorial is celebrated the day prior (August 27 when it does not fall on a Sunday).
