

"On the Q/T..."

From *Thoughts of Saint Therese, The Little Flower of Jesus*: "There is no artist who does not like his work praised, and the Divine Artist of souls is pleased when we do not stop at the exterior, but penetrating even to the inmost sanctuary which He has chosen for His dwelling, we admire its beauty." From *Teresa of Calcutta: A Pictorial Biography:* "We are talking of peace. These are things that break peace, but I feel the greatest destroyer of peace today is abortion....Because if a mother can kill her own child - what is left for me to kill you and for you to kill me - there is nothing in between."

On to the question from Fr. Tony:

October 1 is the feast day of St. Therese of The Little Flower; and Saint Teresa of Calcutta took the name, "Therese," in honor of St. Therese of The Little Flower. The first quote is a general quote about the inner beauty of each soul created, loved and treasured by God. The second comes from then Mother Teresa's Nobel Peace Prize speech. Strange: that the beauty of a soul created and destined for the fullness of human manhood/womanhood in the womb of a mother has become so obscure that women can commit abortion to themselves and think they're doing themselves a favor. It's their bodies; look at what they're doing to themselves. Hence, this question: What do women fear...what terrifies them so...what is the depth of the hopelessness...that looms larger than the divine artistry that they are, and that taking place within them?

Go Make Disciples: Bringing People to Christ – One More Look. This year's goals: SSPN, \$32,878; ICC, \$27,409; SHDC, \$11,595; SHW, \$14,932; SMH, \$13,348. A review of last year's ADA: SSPN paid \$22,151 of its \$28,590 goal; ICC paid \$24,946 out of its \$23,834 goal; SHDC paid \$8,805 of its \$10,469 goal; SHW paid \$9,050 of its \$12,984 goal; and SMH paid \$5,956 of its \$11,607 goal. Bishop Tylka desires that our highest aspirations be reached in Evangelization, Discipleship, Eucharistic Revival, and Vocations. Let's do our best to serve the divine life in our churches and in our entire diocese worthy of the calling we have received.

Luke Spannagel, whose first assignment was right here in Hancock County, is one of fifty-eight priests chosen by our Bishops to preach the Revival of the Holy Eucharist throughout our nation? Spread the word: to family members, friends, brother and sister Catholics and fellow Christians alike, even people you might know from other world religions – people who are unsure there is a God, or who appear to be sure there is none. Each of our churches will host Fr. Luke throughout the week; his talks will be different in each place. So clear your schedules as best you can, and try to be present for as many of his talks as possible. And keep the bulletin flier for quick and easy reference.

Fr. Tony thanks you for the meals! I've told Jesus many a time over the years: "Lord, this is Hancock County. Fasting and abstinence just plain doesn't happen here. The eatin's too good." Thank you for your time and expense in preparing such fine food for your pastor who is constantly on the go. If I may make one suggestion: no doubt, you've noticed that he has grown in "wisdom and grace" – check out the beltline without being rude about it! So the portions can be a bit smaller. The teaching of the Catholic Church will be addressed to Socialism and Communism on October 2; to Nominalism in the face of sex, gender, and identity issues on October 9; and to Empiricism and Relativism in the face of the immorality of the day a situation that people have become so accustomed to, that it's rarely challenged anymore. And yes: it's all anchored in the Bible. (If you go to the 10 a.m. Mass in Nauvoo, by all means, go to Mass for a Catholic, that's always the most important thing you can do.)


