From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Twenty-Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time, and we are reminded to live a life full of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy.

English explorers Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon surveyed the boundary between Pennsylvania and Maryland in 1767. The border has come to be known as the Mason-Dixon Line. During the American Civil War, a century later, it was the dividing line between the Union and the Confederacy.

Now, whether it's true or not, there is a story of a man whose property was right on top of this invisible line separating the states. During the war, he feared both sides would view him as a traitor, so he decided to wear a Confederate jacket and Union pants. When the fighting got too close to home, he was in big trouble. The Union muskets were fired at his chest, and the Confederacy shot at his knees, a grim reminder that we cannot serve two masters. Again, is the story true, I don't know, but it does make for a good lesson.

Such is the challenge between the pursuit of holiness versus the pursuit of wealth and power. This is the focus of today's First Reading from the Prophet Amos. Sometime around 750 B.C., the sheepherder, Amos, was called to leave one flock in service of another. God sent Amos north into Israel to convict people for their sins against the Covenant – working on the Sabbath and cheating the poor out of their hard-earned money.

Amos, in the reading, knows that the merchants in the Temple are fixing their scales to cheat the pilgrims coming to Jerusalem for the feast. These wealthy men became rich and made themselves richer by taking advantage of the less fortunate.

Never will I forget a thing they have done, the prophet says, speaking for God. It is an announcement of God's judgment on those who are deaf to the cry of the poor. They were in need of forgiveness but would only receive it if they humbled themselves to ask for it.

In writing to Timothy, St. Paul affirms God's desire that we all ask for and receive His mercy, and then share it with one another. Paul thought this important, especially for kings and all those in authority, that they might lead a quiet and tranquil life, one without anger or argument. It is God's great desire that everyone be saved and...come to knowledge of the truth.

Mercy and forgiveness are in the message of the parable of the steward that Jesus tells in today's Gospel. The steward is quite creative in dealing with the loss of his job. The steward was not forgiven his debt, but he does forgive the debt of one who owes him a large sum of wheat. Jesus compliments the man for his ability to look beyond earthly wealth to store up for himself treasure in heaven. This appears to be Jesus' way of getting our minds out of our pocketbook and into His Holy Book.

The Lord desires that we all show such industry in our pursuit of Eternal Life. Experience tells us that wealth may leave us or be taken away, but God is a firm anchor. The dollar in our pocket is here today and gone tomorrow, but the Lord is always there for us, and all around us.

We both give and receive as we recognize God as the source of every gift and blessing, and we remain mindful of what the prophet Amos tells us, that God never forgets a thing we have done. So, let us at least live a life worthy of remembering, a life full of the spiritual and corporal works of mercy.

And now just a few thoughts:

LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- Monday, September 19 - Optional Memorial of St. Januarius, Bishop and Martyr. Januarius was Bishop of Benevento. According to stories about him, he was martyred around the year 305 under Diocletian by being thrown to bears at Pozzuolo. His blood is known to liquefy on this day and other days each year. He is the patron of Naples. St. Januarius, Pray for us!

We celebrate several Martyrs this week. All of the saints are great examples and models to us. Martyrs, in particular, demonstrate to us the love of Truth which is so violently attacked at times. Their witness to the Faith through their martyrdom is extraordinary.

- Tuesday, September 20 Obligatory Memorial of Saints Andrew Kim Tae-gon, Priest, and Paul Chong Ha-sang, and companions, Martyrs. Andrew, born in Seoul, Korea, was a convert to the faith and was ordained Korea's first native priest. His father was a martyr. In 1846, Andrew was tortured and beheaded along with his lay associate, seminarian Paul Chong Ha-sang. Between 1839 and 1867, one hundred and three martyrs gave their lives for the faith in Korea. Sts. Andrew Kim Tae-gon and Paul Chong Ha-sand and companions, Pray for us!
- Wednesday, September 21 Feast of St. Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist. St. Matthew is one of the four Gospel writers. His Gospel was written around the year 85 and is generally arranged in an alternating pattern of narrative and discourse. Intended for a largely Jewish-Christian audience, St. Matthew's Gospel seeks to portray Christianity as consistent with the Jewish tradition and a continuation of it. Tradition holds that St. Matthew preached in Judea and Ethiopia where he was martyred. He is symbolized by the winged human being (Ezekiel 1) and is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer 1). He is the patron of accountants and customs officers. St. Matthew, Pray for us!
- Friday, September 23 Obligatory Memorial of St. Pius of Pietrelcina, Priest. Commonly known as St. Padre Pio, he was a Capuchin priest who received the Stigmata (the wounds of Christ). In his life here on earth, he was much sought after

as a spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor. Despite such notoriety, he would often say, "I only want to be a poor friar who prays." His life was devoted to the Eucharist and to prayer. St. Padre Pio is a more contemporary saint, born in 1887. He died in 1968. He was canonized in 2002 by Pope St. John Paul II. He is considered the patron of civil defense volunteers and Catholic adolescents. St. Padre Pio, Pray for us!

As a side note, a movie about Padre Pio is scheduled to be released this month. I don't watch a lot of movies, but I am looking forward to hopefully viewing this movie at some point. I don't know what it will be like, of course, but I do hope that it accurately portrays the beauty and holiness of St. Padre Pio.

- HOG ROAST Don't miss out on the St. Mary School Hog Roast this Sunday, September 18, from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., served drive-thru at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Mt. Sterling. You'll also want to be sure and get your tickets for the pellet grill and beef bundle drawing. As I mentioned last week, along with the great meal, our Hog Roast has become famous for its high-end raffle prize. Come and get a great meal, your chance at the grill and beef bundle, and support St. Mary School. Thank you for your continued support and thank you to all who make this great event possible.
- CONVOCATION Our Diocesan Priest Convocation is this week. It begins Monday evening and runs through Thursday afternoon. With few exceptions, all active Diocesan priests are expected to be present. I will be attending the Convocation with my other brother priests. We will be meeting in Collinsville this year. Please keep me and all the priests and Bishop Paprocki in your prayers.

Because of the Convocation, there will be no Mass Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday. Deacon Mike will offer a Communion Service each of those days in addition to the regular Communion Service on Monday. While it is always good to be with the other priests, I will certainly look forward to being back at the parishes with all of you.

- CATECHETICAL SUNDAY This weekend is Catechetical Sunday. Thank you to those in our parishes who formally act as catechists. There will be a special blessing at the Saturday evening Vigil Mass at Holy Family and at the Sunday morning Mass at St. Thomas for our catechists. Our catechists play an important role in helping to teach the Faith. As a reminder, it is our responsibility to continue to grow in our faith and learn the Faith, and it is the primary responsibility of parents to teach their children the Faith in the family.
- PSR St. Thomas PSR kicked off another year with Mass last Wednesday evening. It was also an opportunity to meet the catechists and to register. May our PSR teachers, students, and families be blessed with a fruitful year.
- HAPPY BIRTHDAY Our Principal, Mrs. Melissa Obert, celebrates a birthday on Friday, September 23. I suspect I will be in trouble for putting it in the bulletin. Please keep Melissa and all the school teachers and staff in your prayers. Melissa does an excellent job in leading our school and I can attest to the many things she does that go unnoticed and unknown by most folks. I appreciate Melissa's leadership and commitment to St. Mary School.

- RESTORATION UPDATE - Just a quick note to let you know that work continues to progress on the exterior restoration of Holy Family Church. Additional scaffolding has been put up around the bell tower (as vou can see) with some work done there. There has been a lot of masonry work being done and also some painting started. It is hard to see some of the progress, but it is happening, and it is good to see. Just as I am writing this, I spoke with the foreman and operations manager (who thus far, I must say, have been excellent to work with). They tell me that they are waiting on the new slate to arrive and are looking at a week or so for its arrival. With its arrival, I'm sure we will then see some additional work on the roof.
