From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Twenty-Ninth Sunday of Ordinary Time. We continue to approach the end of our Liturgical year rather quickly it seems. Our readings for today remind us that our perseverance will keep us faithful to God's ways.

The meaning of persistence is certainly brought to mind with our three readings for today. In the First Reading, as long as Moses kept his hands raised, eventually with the help of Aaron and Hur, Joshua and the Israelites prevailed over Amalek and his men. In the Second Reading, St. Paul reminds Timothy to remain faithful to what he has learned and believed. In the Gospel, Jesus uses the parable of the persistent widow to remind His disciples about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary.

And what does it mean, really, to be persistent? The dictionary describes or defines persistent as the firm or obstinate continuance in a course of action in spite of difficulty or opposition. Some synonyms for this "obstinate continuance" include perseverance, tenacity, and endurance.

Let us think about persistence with regard to our relationship with God. There is no doubt that when thinking about how God relates to us, persistence is an apt description though it, like any other word is inadequate in our description of God. Still, God created us and pursues us in love endlessly. He never diverts from this path. He loved us into being, and His love is what sustains us. From our existence, to the daily efforts we expend, God is our source of being. The entirety of Scripture attests to this.

When it comes to our relationship with God we need to also ask ourselves if there is persistence on our part. We certainly have the opportunity for there to be. The Sacramental graces we receive give us the power to persist in prayer, and our participation with that grace enables us to do so. Even when folks faithfully celebrate the Sacraments regularly, there is a real possibility of misunderstanding this or "overlooking" this. Sacramental grace is real, it is important, and it is powerful. The Sacraments are real encounters with Jesus Christ who gave them to us so that we might live that life of holiness that He call us to.

The gift of faith allows us to trust that God will provide for us not just in answer to our prayer, but even in the act of praying for something, as he provided Aaron and Hur to assist Moses. And hope helps assure that our persistence will be rewarded in eternity with Christ. How could we choose not to have persistence in the foundation for our relationship with God!

In Baptism we are united to Christ and to one another and our unceasing prayer for our needs and the needs of the world have an effect. This is so important for each of us to foster in our own lives, that recognition that our persistence in prayer really does have effects.

We are also united in the Holy Eucharist which is both the gift we receive and the gift that we offer to the Lord's Glorious Majesty from the gifts that He has given us, the Pure Victim, the Holy Victim, the Spotless Victim, the Holy Bread of Eternal Life and the Chalice of Everlasting Salvation. If that does not powerfully touch us, I don't know what will!

Through God's grace, we have the persistence to face whatever obstacles might tempt us or drag us away from our purpose in this life. Each of us is a beloved child of the Father, journeying to be one with the Father in the Eternal Kingdom of heaven. That identity as a beloved child of God, made in His image and likeness, is a powerful one and an important one. It may seem so simple but is so often overlooked by many and sadly, by some, it is cast away as if it means nothing at all.

As followers of Jesus Christ, our lives are not easy and there are no "quick fixes" (though many seem to act as if there are). Quick fixes may work for a leaky tire, but eventually the tire will need to be replaced if we want to drive on it for a long journey. May we always be reminded of the voice of God reminding us to pray always without becoming weary and may the grace we receive from God help us follow that command.

And now just a few notes:

-LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, October 17 – Obligatory memorial of St. Ignatius of Antioch, Bishop and Martyr. From Syria, Ignatius of Antioch was an Apostolic Father known as the second successor to St. Peter in Antioch. He wrote seven letters to local communities on church unity and structure and is the first to use the term "Catholic Church" as a collective definition for Christians. Ignatius was martyred around the year 107 under Trajan in Rome's amphitheater. He is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I). St. Ignatius of Antioch, Pray for us! -Tuesday, October 18 – Feast of St. Luke – St. Luke was a Syrian physician from Antioch and a companion of St. Paul. He wrote the Acts of the Apostles and also one of the four Gospels, a Gospel for the Gentile Christians that speaks of God's mercy, salvation love of the poor and marginalized, absolute renunciation prayer, and the Holy Spirit. He is often represented by a winged ox. St. Luke is the patron of the medical profession, painters, artists, sculptors, and butchers. St. Luke, Pray for us!

-Wednesday, October 19 – In the United States, the Obligatory Memorial of Saints John de Brebeuf and Isaac Jogues and Companions, Martyrs. Saints John de Brebeuf and Isaac Jogues were French Jesuit priests. They and their companions were missionaries to the Hurons and Iroquis of North America. Isaac was tomahawked to death by Iroquis near Albany and John was savagely mutilated and slain near Georgian Bay. Isaac and John and their companions were martyred between the years of 1642 and 1649. Saints John de Brebeuf and Isaac Jogues and Companions, Pray for us!

-Thursday, October 20 – In the United States, optional memorial of St. Paul of the Cross, Priest. In the United States this optional memorial of St. Paul of the Cross is perpetually transferred from October 19 to October 20. St. Paul of the Cross was a renowned preacher and founder of the Passionists (C.P.), today numbering nearly 2,000 members. Passionists combine the apostolate of retreats and missions with penitential monasticism. St. Paul of the Cross died on October 18, 1775. St. Paul of the Cross, Pray for us!

-Saturday, October 22 – Optional memorial of St. John Paul II, Pope. Born Karol Jozef Watjtyla in 1920 in Wadowice, Poland, John Paul II is well known to many of us and a beloved Pope to many. As Archbishop of Krakow, he took part in the Second Vatican Council. He was elected pope on October 16, 1978. His exceptional apostolic zeal, especially for families, young people, and the sick, led him to make numerous pastoral visits throughout the world. John Paul II left as a heritage to the Church a rich Magisterium and the promulgation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the revised Code of Canon Law, and the Third typical edition of the Roman Missal. Pope John Paul II died on April 2, 2005 and was canonized by Pope Francis on April 27, 2014 along with Pope John XXIII whose memorial we celebrated last Tuesday, October 11. Pope St. John Paul II, Pray for us!

WORLD MISSION SUNDAY – Next Sunday, October 23 is World Mission Sunday. We are encouraged to and called to assist with the mission of the Church in spreading the Gospel. The following is a letter form Bishop Paprocki concerning World Mission Sunday:

"Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, On October 23, World Mission Sunday, we join Catholics worldwide in this annual Eucharistic celebration for the Missions of the Church. Pope Francis reflects on this year's theme: "You shall be My witnesses" (Acts 1:8). He emphasizes the call to every Christian to bear witness to Christ, to participate in a mission of universal evangelization, and to seek strength and guidance from the Holy Spirit.

Beginning in 1822, the universal fund of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith provided some \$7 million in help to the new and growing Churches in the United States. Your prayers and generous support today sustain priests, religious and lay pastoral leaders in more than 1,100 mission dioceses in Asia, Africa, the Pacific Islands, and parts of Latin America and Europe as they proclaim the Gospel, build the Church, and serve the poor.

Blessed Pauline Jaricot began this work 200 years ago. As Pope Francis reminds us, "She accepted God's inspiration to establish a network of prayer and collection for missionaries so that the faithful could actively participate in the mission 'to the ends of the earth." Her vision would lead to World Mission Sunday, which helps the Pope support missionary activity.

When you contribute to the World Mission Sunday collection, you make it possible for the Holy Father to provide for the formation of our seminarians and religious men and women. You assist in building the schools and orphanages that care for children in places few visit. Missionaries can build churches in areas with scarce resources. Priests and religious Brothers and Sisters can buy food and the bare essentials that make it possible to proclaim the Gospel and celebrate the Sacraments.

I encourage your generosity on World Mission Sunday, especially in this bicentennial anniversary year. Your prayers remain your greatest gift, and your financial support is lifegiving to our brothers and sisters in the world's most vulnerable communities. Thank you, and God bless. Sincerely yours in Christ, Most Reverend Thomas John Paprocki, Bishop of Springfield in Illinois."


