Sirach 35:12-14,16-18; 2 Timothy 4:6-8,16-18; Luke 18:9-14

The world operates on the "good ole boy" system: You do business with your friends. You scratch their back, and they'll scratch yours. If you know someone in the system, you can get things done. If you have influence, the world is yours.

God doesn't operate that way. Our first reading tells us that God doesn't play favorites. He is not unduly partial toward the poor just because they are poor. And he certainly is not partial to the rich just because they are rich.

Actually, though, the Lord *does* show partiality: He is partial toward those who are humble, sincere, and to persons of complete integrity. But you can't "fake it" with God! So be careful.

The Pharisee was known to be religious. He had the reputation of being a saint. But he is filled with pride. The tax collector (also called "Publican") knew he was a sinner, but he is repentant. The Lord hears him and not the religious professional.

The second reading might be an occasion for discouragement. Paul had worked long and hard for the Gospel, yet he is about to be judged guilty with a death penalty. No one took his side in the court case. But he is not discouraged. Departure from this world will mean a crown of eternal glory for him.

Let us pray for honesty and sincerity in our faith. May the Lord help us to realize that we are nothing without him. May he make us persons of complete integrity and wholehearted service.


Dear Parishioners,

The Church celebrates this weekend the 30th Sunday in Ordinary time. In our gospel, we hear Jesus telling a parable about a Pharisee and a Tax Collector. In this parable, these two people both went to the temple area to pray. In this parable, we find Jesus observing that "the Pharisee took up his position and spoke this prayer to himself, O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity." Then this Pharisee compared himself to so many others, and then patted himself on the back for being so perfect. Then Jesus shared His observations about the tax collector who would not even raise his eyes to heaven, but prayed: "O God, be merciful to me a sinner." The tax collector realizes his own failings and sins and confessed them before God. Jesus then declares concerning the two: "for whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted." A good question to ask ourselves is where do we find ourselves in this parable? How often do we look around our Church and compare our behavior with someone else's. Before we are too critical of the Pharisee, we need to reflect upon our own lives and recognize how often we compare ourselves to others, exalting ourselves in the process. Let us all pray that we become humbler recognizing our need for forgiveness as we see ourselves in the eyes of our God.

On behalf of our parish family, I want to welcome Fr. Delix Michel, the pastor of our sister parishes in Haiti. As I was reflecting upon our first reading for our Mass this weekend, I thought that the words of Sirach are very appropriate for Fr. Michel's presence. In that reading, the author writes, "God hears the cry of the oppressed." In our world today, there is no country that reflects those words more than the people of Haiti. This country is filled with oppression, hunger, poverty, and fear. It is ravaged with gangs that prey upon rich and poor, clergy and lay people. In that same reading, we hear the writer state: "the Lord is not deaf to the wail of the orphan, nor to the widow when she pours out her complaint." In prayer the people of Haiti, innocent and vulnerable, submit their prayer to God. And then the next line is where we find ourselves as the sister parish. "The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds; it does not rest till it reaches its goal." And this is where we find ourselves as the prayer of the sister parishes in Haiti reach our God and then God in turns moves us to respond generously to the plight of our brothers and sisters. In a pledge that I made to Fr. Delix and his people. I promised that we would make our sister parishes part of our stewardship as a parish. I committed us to give to them \$15,000 each quarter to help them survive their situation. And I still stand by that commitment as God is moving us to give generously to them from our treasures. In light of Fr. Delix being present, we will be hosting a social after the 9:30 Mass this Sunday and I invite you to come and enjoy some sweets and drinks along with conversation with Fr. Delix.

The Church invites us to remember those who have died during our month of November. We will be celebrating our Mass of Remembrance on Saturday, November 5. The families and friends of those parishioners who have died and were buried from our parish this past year will be recognized in a special celebration as we pray for them and their families. "May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed rest in peace now and forever. Amen."

On October 23, World Mission Sunday, we join Catholics worldwide in this annual Eucharistic celebration for the Missions of the Church.

Pope Francis reflects on this year's theme: "You shall be My witnesses" (Acts 1:8). He emphasizes the call to every Christian to bear witness to Christ, to participate in a mission of universal evangelization, and to seek strength and guidance from the Holy Spirit.

Beginning in 1822, the universal fund of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith provided some \$7 million in help to the new and growing Churches in the United States. Your prayers and generous support today sustain priests, religious and lay pastoral leaders in more than 1,100 mission dioceses in Asia, Africa, the Pacific Islands, and parts of Latin America and Europe as they proclaim the Gospel, build the Church, and serve the poor.
