# From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. This marks the last Sunday of Ordinary Time and the Liturgical Year. The following has been taken from catholicculture.org, authored by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Rudolph G. Gandas. It is a short piece on today's Solemnity but is very much worth reading, perhaps even several times, and reflecting on it.

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, formerly referred to as "Christ the King," was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 as an antidote to secularism, a way of life which leaves God out of man's thinking and living and organizes his life as if God did not exist. The {Solemnity} is intended to proclaim in a striking and effective manner Christ's royalty over individuals, families, society, governments, and nations.

Today's Mass establishes the titles for Christ's royalty over men: 1) Christ is God, the Creator of the universe and hence wields a supreme power over all things; "All things were created by Him"; 2) Christ is our Redeemer, He purchased us by His Precious Blood, and made us His property and possession; 3) Christ is Head of the Church, "holding in all things the primacy"; 4) God bestowed upon Christ the nations of the world as His special possession and dominion.

Today's Mass also describes the qualities of Christ's Kingdom. This Kingdom is: 1) supreme, extending not only to all people but also to their princes and kings; 2) universal, extending to all nations and to all places; 3) eternal, for "The Lord shall sit as King forever"; 4) spiritual, Christ's "Kingdom is not of this world."And now a few notes:

#### -LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, November 21 – Obligatory Memorial of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Today's Memorial find's its origins in a Second century apocryphal source, the Protoevangelion of James, and the dedication of the Basilica of St. Mary the New in Jerusalem on November 21, 543. The Memorial celebrates the Presentation of Mary in the Temple by her parents, Anne and Joachim, and continues the impact, so to speak, of Mary's Immaculate Conception and Birth. It emphasizes the holiness conferred on Mary from the beginning of her life on earth continued through her early childhood and beyond. The magnificence of Mary also enriches us who are Temples of God and sanctified in order that we might enjoy and share in God's saving work.

-Mary, conceived without sin, Pray for us!

-Tuesday, November 22 – Obligatory Memorial of St. Cecelia, Virgin and Martyr. St. Cecelia is known from her legendary "Passio," a poem which exalts Christian virginity. She is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I) and has been honored in Rome since the Fifth Century. She died a martyr in the Third Century and is the patroness of Sacred Music because of the song of God in her heart. St. Cecelia, Pray for us!

-Wednesday, November 23 - Optional memorials of St. Clement I, Pope and Martyr; St. Columban, Abbot; in the United States, Blessed Miguel Agustin Pro, Priest and Martyr.

St. Clement I was the fourth Bishop of Rome, known for his epistle that he wrote to the Corinthians, and is mentioned in the Roman Canon. He was martyred around the year 100 under Trajan. St. Clement I, Pray for us!

St. Columban (also known as Columbanus) was an Irish monk and missionary to France. He wrote a strict monastic rule and Penitential and founded several monasteries. He was exiled to Italy for denouncing court immorality and lax bishops. He died in 615 at Bobbio. St. Columban, Pray for us!

Blessed Miguel Pro was a Jesuit from Guadalupe, Mexico, noted for his sympathetic nature and firm piety. During Mexican religious persecution, he was accused of plotting against the government and was executed exclaiming "Long live Christ the King!" He died on November 23, 1927 at the age of thirty-six.

-Thursday, November 24 – Obligatory Memorial of St. Andrew Dung-Lac, Priest, and Companions, Martyrs. During the seventeenth through nineteenth centuries in Vietnam, some 130,000 Christians suffered cruel martyrdom, many by decapitation or strangulation. This day's memorial remembers St. Andrew Dung-Lac and his companions, most of whom died between 1820 and 1883. All were canonized on June 19, 1988 by Pope St. John Paul II. St. Andrew Dung-Lac and Companions, Pray for us!

In the United States, Thanksgiving Day is also observed. While there is an option to use alternate readings and Propers, I will likely use the readings and Propers for the Memorial.

-Friday, November 25 - Optional memorial of St. Catherine of Alexandria, Virgin and Martyr. St. Catherine of Alexandria was a learned woman of the early fourth century who, according to legend, following her conversion at the age of eighteen, preached the Gospel throughout Alexandria in Egypt. While imprisoned by the emperor Magnus Maximus, she converted both the empress and the leader of the armed forces. For this, she was martyred. There is a story that upon her death, after a wheel of torture (known as "Catherin's wheel") broke, her body was carried by angels to Mt. Sinai. St. Catherine is the patron saint of philosophers, preachers, and unmarried women. St. Catherine of Alexandria, Pray for us!

-NO SCHOOL – There is no school at St. Mary School from Wednesday, November 23 through Sunday, November 27. Dismissal on Tuesday, November 22 is at 2:00 p.m. This serves as a small break for our teachers, staff, and students and a time to spend time with family for Thanksgiving.

There will be an 8:30 a.m. Mass on Tuesday, November 22 with the school kids and teachers present before they head out for Thanksgiving break. I will also celebrate the regular 7:00 a.m. Mass that day. You are, of course, welcome to join us for either Mass.

Although there is no school on Friday, November 25, Mass will still be celebrated at 8:30 a.m. as usual.

-THAKSGIVING – As we celebrate Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, I want to wish each of you and your family a very Happy and Blessed Thanksgiving. I will be celebrating Mass at both parishes that morning...7:00 a.m. at Holy Family and 9:00 a.m. at St. Thomas. I encourage you to make every effort to join us as we give praise and thanks to God for all the gifts and blessings in our lives that He alone has bestowed upon us.

-ANNIVERSARY – Thursday, November 24 would also mark my parents' 60th wedding anniversary. As many of you know, dad died eleven years ago and mom died in February. I miss them both beyond words. I thank God for the gift of my very life, my parents, and my family. I will be offering Mass for mom and dad on this day and I encourage each of you to pray for those who have died and also to pray for good and holy vocations to Marriage, Single Life, and Priesthood & Religious Life and that within the great gift of family, all these vocations may be nurtured.

-NOVEMBER – A reminder that during the month of November especially, we remember and pray for the dead. Please pray for the repose of the souls of all the faithful departed.

-THANK YOU – Thank you to all who helped make this year's Brown County Deer Classic a great success. No matter how you supported the event, thank you. All proceeds go to support St. Mary School. It was quite an enjoyable evening and it was good to see the folks here. I know a lot of work goes into planning and carrying out such an event so thank you.

-ADVENT – Ordinary Time and our Liturgical Year are coming to a close. Our new Liturgical Year begins with the celebration next week of the First Sunday of Advent. Take time now to consider how you will spend the upcoming Season of Advent.

-FOOD DRIVE – Once again, a reminder that we are collecting different kinds of food each week at Holy Family for the Mt. Sterling Food Pantry at least through the end of November. Next week we will be collecting food items of your choice. If you'd like to donate to the food pantry to help those who are in need, you can bring your items to church and place them in the tote in the vestibule. Thank you to all who have contributed and helped in any way. For now, this will be the last week that we are collecting.

-COATS FOR KIDS – The Mt. Sterling Knights of Columbus distributed winter coats to kids last Thursday, November 17. Many of you helped by contributing cash donations. As of my writing this, I do not know if all the coats were distributed so if your child or the child of someone you know needs a winter coat, I would be happy to check for you. Again, thank you to the Knights of Columbus for this and to all who supported it in any way.

-ST. THOMAS CHRISTMAS PARTY – Mark your calendar for St. Thomas Men's and Women's group parish Christmas party for all St. Thomas parishioners on Sunday, December 12 in the parish hall. They are planning to have folks sign-up so that they can plan accordingly so please be on the look-out for that and other information.


