# Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King NOVEMBER 20, 2022

2 Samuel 5:1-3; Colossians 1:12-20; Luke 23:35-43

Who is Jesus? What does he mean in your life? We call him *Messiah* or *Christ*; do these words mean anything to you personally? We call him *Savior, Redeemer*, and *Lord.* What effect does this have in your life? In the Scriptures, he is called *Son of David, Son of God,* and *Son of Man.* Are these just words, or do they have a meaning for you?

The Church gropes for ways to express the mystery of Jesus, the Christ. Each *title* for Jesus should have some meaning for our lives. Today we use the title *king*. This title may have little relevance in our democratic world. But by this title, we seek to recognize that Jesus is the heart and center of our lives; we live for him; we find the meaning of all things in him; we accept his rule over our lives, and we live by his code of morality. It means that we strive to follow his will and to serve him in everything we think, say, and do.

Our first reading describes the anointing of David as King of Israel (c. 1000 B.C.) The words *Messiah* and *Christ* mean *Anointed One*. As David was anointed king, so Jesus is anointed to be King over all peoples. The Gospel does not show the glory of kingship. Jesus is dying on the cross. He does not choose to save himself, but to save another person, a thief! He forgives his sin and promises paradise to him. Our King Jesus shows his power most perfectly in his mercy. He died for you; will you live for him?

The second reading is one of the most profound passages in the entire Bible. The background is this: Mainstream Judaism at the time of Jesus believed that the Torah was the ultimate, eternal, unchanging, self-revelation of God. From all eternity, God spoke his saving word. When God created the universe, he used the Torah as the model. The whole purpose of creation was to fit in with the Torah.

The Torah was delivered to Moses in time, (c.1290 B.C.). But it was eternal and unchangeable. The view of Paul in the reading today is that Jesus, not the Torah, is the ultimate self-revelation of God. Jesus has replaced and superseded the Torah. Jesus is the image of the invisible God (i.e. the perfect expression of God). Everything was created through and for him (and not for or through the Torah). Everything that makes God to be God (*fullness*) is embodied in Jesus.

In the view of Paul, God the Word, the Second Person of the Trinity, would have become man, even if mankind had never sinned! The reason: Because Jesus (not the Torah) was the model and purpose of all creation, you can't have any creation without the model: the incarnate Son of God! We were created to reflect the incarnate Jesus Christ. We show that he is king over our lives by living as perfectly as possible the life of Christ.


With our celebration this weekend, we will be closing out what is called "ordinary time." The official end, however, is next Saturday morning, for the evening Mass next weekend will begin the Season of Advent. As we look ahead without shocking anyone, this Season of Advent begins four Sundays in which the Church challenges us to prepare for, believe it or not, Christmas. And I'm sure no one is quite ready for that time. But in the meantime, we celebrate this weekend the end of this liturgical year with the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the King of the Universe.

Not sure how many of you watched the burial of Queen Elizabeth and the media presentation of her life, her many accomplishments as Queen for so many years, and then the royal celebration of her funeral and burial. Things were done with much precision and much royal attire. Then we had the installation of the new king, King Charles III. Again this was done with much tradition and all the royal customs. We experienced what it meant to have royalty as in the case of a King.

As I relate these experiences of a modern day monarchy, it seems to be a far cry from the experiences that are shared in our gospel of Jesus, who is called our King. In fact, we find our gospel telling us that the rulers sneered at Jesus, the soldiers jeered at him, and even one of those crucified with Jesus mocked Him. There was not much royalty in terms of experiences of monarchies. In fact, the throne of Jesus became His wooden cross upon which He was crucified; His crown upon His head was a crown of thorns that pierced His skull. As I said in the depiction of Jesus as the "King of the Jews" there was not much royalty, nor was their much kingship exhibited. Instead, we find the Word of God made Flesh giving Himself totally to us, His servants, on the cross, seemingly being defeated by the forces of evil and of human beings who rejected Him. However, as this Solemnity celebrates, His death on the Cross lead to the ultimate victory for us all, namely, the resurrection. This is declared by the gospel writer who in one of the criminals dying next to Him asking Jesus "Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom." I hope and pray those will always be my words each and every day of my life. My prayer is that I hear Jesus say what He said to that young man, "Amen, I say to you today you will be with me in Paradise." Amen.

This Thursday, November 24, is Thanksgiving Day and a national holiday. For we who are stewards of God's gifts, today is the day we gather to give God thanks for all the blessings and gifts that come our way. Of all days, this is the time to be thankful, to express our gratitude for the gifts of our faith, our hope, and our love. As a way of publicly saying thank you, we will gather to celebrate the Eucharist at 9:30 a.m. The reason for the late start for our Mass is that we are trying to be good neighbors as the YMCA has their traditional turkey walk/run beginning around 8:00 a.m. that day. They usually close off Maine street to make that happen and so we will postpone our Mass until after this annual community event takes place. So I encourage you to come and celebrate as a very thankful people for all the blessings that God has given to all of us. We live in a great country and God has blessed us with a freedom to celebrate and live our faith. Let us always be thankful. May God continue to bless us with our gifts of time, talents, and treasures.
