From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Third Sunday of Advent which is traditionally known as Gaudete Sunday, so-called from the first word of the Antiphon at the Introit. Gaudete means "Rejoice" and sets a tone of joyful expectation for the Lord's Second Coming and the celebration of His Birth as does the permitted rose-colored vestments for this day.

As a side note, December 11 is the earliest possible date for Gaudete Sunday on the calendar...you never know, you may just need that bit of information in a round of Jeopardy some day. It is somewhat unique, that we still have two full and

complete weeks of Advent...often times the Fourth Week of Advent is not a full week.

The readings for today reflect the rejoicing. Still, we are reminded of the stark reality of John the Baptist's persecution, imprisonment, and the violence against him for the truth he spoke to those in power.

Jesus tells us that there is no one greater than John the Baptist, but then goes on to also say that "yet the least in the Kingdom of Heaven is greater than he" (John the Baptist, that is). So where does that leave each one of us? How can we be great like John? Shall we cry out in the desert and prepare to suffer violence? Not exactly. Our redemption is not about what John the Baptist did but what Jesus does. John the Baptist and his message is important in helping us to prepare, no doubt, but it is Christ who redeems us, and it is He whom we are preparing ourselves for. We may indeed suffer as John the Baptist did as well as many of the Saints. It is Christ who redeems and saves us and our faith in Him demands of us to follow Him completely.

In this Season of Advent especially, may the Lord help us all the more to know our sinfulness and in knowing it, may we be open to and eager for our own conversion and reform of life. Knowing our own sinfulness is a great gift so that we can continue our growth in holiness.

And now just a few notes:

-LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, December 12 - In the United States, Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This Feast recalls the apparitions of Mary at the hill of Tepeyac from December 9 - 12, 1531 to the native convert, St. Juan Diego whose memorial we celebrate on December 9. Our Lady of Guadalupe is known to the Aztecs as Tecoatlaxope (or de Guadalupe in Spanish) which means "she will crush the serpent of stone." Our Lady of Guadalupe was declared Patroness of the Americas by

Pope Pius XII. This celebration was raised to a Feast for all the countries of the Americas by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments on March 25, 1999 is ordinarily observed as the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Mary, the Mother of God is a great and powerful intercessor for us. As a loving Mother, she always points us to Christ. May we look upon her with confidence and model her life of service to God's Will. Our Lady of Guadalupe, Pray for us!

-Tuesday, December 13 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Lucy, Virgin and Martyr. Because of her name, which comes from the word meaning "light," St. Lucy is the patroness of those afflicted with diseases of the eye and she is associated with the festival of light especially in Scandinavia. She is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharist Prayer I) and is also patroness of Syracuse and all of Sicily. St. Lucy was martyred under Diocletian around the year 304, likely in Sicily. St. Lucy, Pray for us!

-Wednesday, December 14 - Obligatory Memorial of St. John of the Cross, Priest and Doctor of the Church. St. John of the Cross was born around 1542 in Fontiveros, Spain. He was a mystic and a poet and an ally of St. Teresa of Avila in founding the Discalced (Reformed) Carmelite Friars (O.C.D.) He suffered imprisonment by the unreformed Carmelites of the Observance. He wrote several pieces, including The Ascent of Mount Carmel, The Dark Night of the Soul, The Spiritual Canticle, and O Flame of Living Love. He is known as the Mystical Doctor. Today the Discalced Carmelites number about 4,000 religious. St. John of the Cross died around the year 1591. St. John of the Cross, Pray for us!

-ST. THOMAS CHRISTMAS PARTY - Just a reminder, the St. Thomas Men's and Women's group parish Christmas party for all St. Thomas parishioners is this Sunday, December 11 in the parish hall following the 10 a.m. Mass.

-DIOCESAN YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST - As I mentioned at the Masses last weekend, Bishop Paprocki “kicked off” our Diocesan year of the Eucharist and the Centennial celebration of the transfer of our Diocese from Alton to Springfield last Thursday, December 8, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Patroness of our Diocese. I will be putting more information out about this, including the Plenary Indulgence that I mentioned at the Masses. Bishop Paprocki will also be including more information in the December 11 edition of the Catholic Times.

-ADVENT LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS - According to the Universal Norms, number 42, beginning on (Saturday), December 17, the Advent Weekdays are intended to serve to prepare more directly for the celebration of the Lord’s Birth. At Mass, we begin the use of Advent Preface II (we have been using Advent Preface I) and we will begin to hear the “O Antiphons” ...O Wisdom, O Sacred Lord, O Flower of Jesse’s Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, O Emmanuel (O God is With Us). It is no coincidence that the hymn, O Come, O Come Emmanuel has seven verses - as each verse picks up on one of the seven O Antiphons.

-ADVENT - As we have entered into and remain in the Season of Advent, I encourage you to remain mindful of this Season each day. Advent calls us to prepare, to quiet our minds and our hearts as we reflect on God’s presence and His coming. In the busyness of life and especially in the hustle and bustle of these weeks, let us remain vigilant to the Season of Advent.

-ADVENT GIVING TREE - A reminder that there is an Advent giving tree in the back of each church with Advent “ornaments.” The ornaments list baby items that we will collect and give to a pregnancy center. There is also a short prayer on the back of each ornament that I encourage you to pray.

If you’d like, take one or more ornaments and purchase the item(s) listed on the ornament. Return the item(s) to church by Sunday, December 18 (or as soon as possible thereafter). I will have totes somewhere in the back of the churches to place your items. Please do not wrap the items and please keep the ornament and pray the prayer that is on it.

There are many needs and many opportunities to give. This is but one way to help those in need. I will keep the trees up until after Masses on December 18.

-CALENDARS - 2023 calendars are now available in the back of both churches while they last. Hendricker Funeral Home in Mt. Sterling provides these calendars for our parishes. I thank them for continuing to provide these for our parishioners. If you see Jamie or his staff, please thank them or send them a note thanking them for the calendars.

There are 2 different styles this year...Feasts and Saints (similar to what we’ve had for 2022) and the Divine Mercy. These are excellent calendars to have as they give a lot of information concerning Liturgical celebrations and norms.

Feel free to take one for yourself and/or for anyone you know who may be homebound or in a nursing home or otherwise unable to get one from the church. We are also planning to send one home with each St. Mary School Family.

-SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION - Please keep in your prayers those who are preparing to receive the Sacraments of First Reconciliation, Confirmation, and First Holy Communion. We have a number of children from both parishes preparing for these Sacraments in the spring. We also have a number of folks in RCIA who are either preparing for full initiation into the Church or for Baptism and full initiation. Please keep these folks in your prayers as well.

-CHRISTMAS FLOWER DONATIONS - As I mentioned in last week’s bulletin, if you

would like to make a contribution toward the flowers for the Church at Christmas, that would be great.

St. Thomas parishioners should have an envelope for this in the regular set of contribution envelopes. If you don't, you can simply put your contribution in an envelope marked "Christmas Flowers" and place it in the collection basket.

For Holy Family, please place your contribution in an envelope marked "Christmas Flowers." The envelopes can be placed in the collection basket or mailed in to the office.

These contributions are often made in memory of someone so please include the name(s) with your contributions. I will keep these folks in my prayers in a special way and I encourage all of our parishioners to do the same.

Mass will be celebrated that day at Holy Family at the regularly scheduled time for Friday, 8:30 a.m. I am hopeful that we will celebrate the Solemnity with some rolls and coffee after Mass so please plan to join us.

-END-OF-YEAR CONTRIBUTIONS - Often times, folks wish to make a year-end contribution to the parish. If you would like to make such a contribution, I ask you to make those as soon as possible so that we can get them recorded in this calendar year.

Additionally, folks are sometimes required to take a withdrawal from a retirement account each year. In many cases, if the withdrawal goes directly to a charitable organization, there are significant tax advantages. If this applies to you, I encourage you to speak to a tax expert soon and consider a contribution to the parishes or to St. Mary School.
