From The Venerable Bishop Fulton Sheen: It is hard for a human being to understand the humility that was involved in the Word becoming flesh. Imagine, if it were possible, a human person divesting himself of his body, and then sending his soul into the body of a serpent. A double humiliation would follow: First, accepting the limitation of a serpentine organism; knowing all the while his mind was superior, and that fangs could not eloquently articulate thoughts no serpent ever possessed. The second humiliation would be to be forced as a result of this "emptying of self" to live in the companionship of serpents. But this is nothing compared to the emptying of God, by which He took on the form of man and accepted the limitations of humanity, such as hunger and persecution; not trivial either was it, for the wisdom of God to condemn himself to association with poor fishermen who knew so little. But this humiliation which began in Bethlehem when he was conceived in the Virgin Mary was only the first of many to counteract the pride of man, until the final humiliation of death on the Cross. If there were no Cross, there would have been no crib; if there had been no nails, there would have been no straw. But he could not teach the lesson of the Cross as payment for sin. He had to take it.

We'll Keep it simple: Thank You, Parishioners of The Hancock County Catholic Churches One of the lessons of Christmas is the meaning that followers of Jesus Christ see (or should see) in certain customs of the season. The Christmas tree, for example: Christians should see the Tree of Life mentioned in the Garden of Eden, and then, mention of the Crucifixion of Jesus as being hung "on a tree," amounting to a Catholic Church antiphon, a prayer verse which states, "See how the Cross of the Lord stands revealed as the Tree of Life." Get a good-sized crucifix, and balance it in the middle of your Christmas tree, Behold: at the base of your tree, the Nativity scene; and above, the mystery of the Cross - the reason for that Nativity scene.

Or gift giving. Those gifts should be perfectly understood as signs that we recognize the presence of Christ in each other, that we ourselves, because we bear the image of Christ, are giving Christ to each other, as we give ourselves to each other through the gifts we share. Kids should know that Santa Claus picked up where St. Nicholas left off. The bishop of Myra from ancient times is said to have secretly left gifts of money overnight for a man who needed to provide a dowry for his daughters. Santa knew a good idea when he saw one: he took things over from there. Things could easily be explained this way, to reinforce Santa Claus as a servant of Jesus, the Gift Giver.

And this year - what a year of transition for all of us! - I want to thank Jesus Christ in all of you, and thank you for bringing the presence of Jesus Christ to me. Since June, I've relied heavily on gifts of patience and understanding; the willingness to work and to help beyond the limits of any job description; generosity and self-sacrifice; criticism both helpful and measured in its communication; hopefulness and enthusiasm about possibilities for our future.

Thank you. Bless you. Can't measure up to all I've received, now, and over many years, from you. But I'll keep trying! Fr. T.
