

From Growing Disciples. In the diocese of Peoria, we are experiencing a declining and aging population, and too few priests to staff 155 parishes. The Catholic Diocese of Peoria sprawls over 26 counties from the lowa border to the Indiana border and consists of 156 parishes. With 124 priests currently in the diocese, many pastors must drive for miles each week shepherding multiple parishes. This is not the best stewardship of their time and talents. In addition, there are approximately 38 priests who will reach the age of retirement in the next 10 years and only 22 seminarians in formation to replace them. (This statement and its implications, as stated, come from Growing Disciples Discernment Process, currently taking place throughout the diocese.)

From the Prayer Intentions of Pope Francis. We pray that parishes, placing communion at the center, may increasingly become communities of faith and fraternity, welcoming those most in need.

Mass schedule change for the weekend launching Catholic Schools Week. Looking ahead. As a rule, Fr. Tony makes use of one week in October for retreat (already done!) and a week in February, just to get away for a while. Fr.
