Third Sunday in Ordinary Time JANUARY 22, 2023

Isaiah 8:23–9:3; 1 Corinthians 1:10-13,17; Matthew 4:12-23

A better translation of today's first reading might help. It might read, "In former times he degraded Zebulun and Naphthali, but in the latter time, he will make glorious the way of the sad, the land west of the Jordan, and Galilee of the nations."

The territory of Zebulun and Naphthali was the first to be conquered by the Assyrians in the time of Isaiah. But Isaiah promised that Ahaz and his son Hezekiah would be protected from the Assyrian onslaught.

Jesus was reared in the area called Zebulun and Naphthali; it was considered pagan Galilee by the religious professionals at Jerusalem. The contempt was expressed by Nathaniel when he said, "Can any good come from Nazareth?"

In God's providence, however, this "pagan" territory was eager to hear the Good News. Light for the entire world came from this land of "darkness." Matthew sees the "prophecy" of Isaiah fulfilled in Jesus, the light of the world. Jesus calls on us to reform our lives, for the kingdom is near.

The second reading (the "continuous reading") is usually not connected with the other two Scriptures. The Corinthians were torn apart by dissension, bickering, and infighting. They were a fairly "low rent" people, terribly insecure, who wanted to "be somebody." Paul tells them that true wisdom is to be found in the cross of Christ. If they belong to Christ, they cannot be divided or torn by dissension.

One of the messages today is that God can write straight with crooked lines. He can make somebodies out of nobodies, and bring light to those in darkness. He can even change our lives, if we let him!


Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, January 22, 2023

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend, we celebrate the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time. After having been baptized by John, we find Jesus today embarking on His mission to preach the need to repent and to embrace the Kingdom of heaven. Jesus also realized that He could not undertake this mission alone. He needed other human beings to help Him and so what we find today in our gospel is Jesus seeking out people, and calling them to leave everything and to follow Him. Sometimes I wonder to myself what would prompt people of His day to leave what they knew, and to follow this preacher. To hear Jesus say to them, "Come after me and I will make you fishers of men." I'm sure that these people, Peter and Andrew, and then James and John, were attracted to Him for some reason. Maybe it might have been the miracles that they saw Him perform; or how people's lives were changed so dramatically after hearing His message. Whatever the case, these first followers left what they felt comfortable doing, namely fishing, and followed this man on a journey that would change them and the entire world. This same itinerant preacher has called each of us to follow Him in a journey that would change us. We don't have the privilege to see the miracles performed, although they still are present if only we look for them. We don't have the privilege to hear Him preach although the Scriptures reveal the same message. When we feel confused, maybe even doubt, think of these first followers. Can you imagine the confusion and doubts in their lives? Yes, these followers left everything to engage in a journey with this man who called them to follow Him. And as they entered into this relationship with this man whom they would grow to love, they changed. Their lives had purpose, their lives found fulfillment, their lives were complete. This is what Jesus does for us when we let down our walls, leave our nets, and let Jesus touch us with His love and presence.

Next weekend, we begin what is called "Catholic School's Week" here in the United States. It is during this week that we acknowledge the sacrifices made in the past to create our Catholic schools; it recognizes that the same sacrifices are made in the present to maintain and grow what has been given to us; and it challenges us to think outside the box so that we will always provide for the future this integral part of our mission of evangelization. One of the biggest proponents of this mission was the former pastor of St. Peter, and my friend, Fr. Roy Bauer. I can't think of another priest who would make the sacrifices that he made to insure that there was a Catholic school for anyone who desired it. Sometimes his ways were not always accepted, nor agreed with, but his passion for Catholic education was never doubted. It is because of this passion that Fr. Roy Bauer will be honored posthumously by the Friends of Catholic Education at a dinner on Saturday, February 4, at the Atrium here in Quincy. I am encouraging our parishioners to get their tickets and be present for this meal, reflecting our devotion to this man who touched so many people in and through St. Peter School and Notre Dame High School. Please consult the bulletin for further details. On a personal note, his involvement in my Catholic grade school in Springfield as a young priest planted the seed of my vocation to the priesthood. I know that for a fact and thank God for this man who believed in Catholic schools. May he rest in peace.


