## From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church in the United States of America celebrates the Solemnity of Epiphany of the Lord. The word epiphany means manifestation. What the Church celebrates today is the manifestation of our Lord to the whole world. After being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. Christian tradition has ever seen in the Magi the first fruits of the Gentiles. They lead in their wake all the peoples of the earth, and thus the Epiphany is an affirmation of universal salvation.

Do not misinterpret this to mean guaranteed salvation or to presume one's salvation. That is simply not an accurate interpretation and presumption of one's salvation is sinful. God indeed desires our salvation and offers it to all people which is the meaning of universal salvation. But this is not a guarantee of one's salvation since we have the responsibility to choose to follow Christ in all things. Just as the Holy Catholic Church is the Universal Church, She is for all people but universal does not mean we believe and do whatever we want. The Universal Church, which Christ Himself established for the sanctification of souls and the world, has a professed Creed based on the Fullness of Truth revealed by Christ alone and the Universal Church places demands upon us that, sadly, some folks ignore. One cannot claim to be part of the Universal Church when he or she denies any portion of the Fullness of Truth revealed to us by none other than Jesus Christ Himself. Does it make any sense to say I believe in Jesus Christ but not in one or more of His teachings or revealed Truths?!

St. Leo brings out this point of universal salvation admirably in a sermon, read at Matins, in which he shows in the adoration of the Magi the beginnings of Christian faith, the time when the great mass of the heathen sets off to follow the star which summons it to seek its Savior. We too are summoned to seek our Savior in the life that God has given us to live. In that seeking, we come to praise, honor, and adore God and to give Him thanks as we strive to follow Him and His Will in all things.

On Monday, January 9, we will celebrate the Baptism of the Lord and draw to a close our Christmas Season. We then enter into the First Week of Ordinary Time and will remain in Ordinary Time until Ash Wednesday which this year is February 22. I will hopefully be able to share more about Ordinary Time in next week's bulletin.

And now just a few notes:

#### -LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

- -Monday, January 9 Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. The celebration of this feast concludes the Christmas Season and, as noted above, we then move into Ordinary Time.
- -Thursday, January 12 In the Dioceses of Bellville, Peoria, and Springfield, Illinois, optional memorial of St. Marguerite Bourgeoys, Virgin. Born April 17, 1620, St. Margurite Bourgeoys was a French nun and founder of the Congregation of Notre Dame of Montreal. She died January 12, 1700, was Beatified in November 1952 by Pope Pius XII, and canonized on October 31, 1982 by Pope John Paul II. St. Marguerite Bourgeoys, Pray for us!
- -Friday, January 13 Optional memorial of St. Hilary, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. St. Hilary was a convert from paganism and a leading opponent of Arianism (denial of Christ's Divinity) in the west. He died in the year 367. St. Hilary, Pray for us!
- -As a reminder, during Ordinary Time when there is no other Obligatory Memorial, Feast, or Solemnity on the calendar for Saturdays, to celebrate a Mass of the Blessed Virgin Mary remains an option.
- -ETERNAL REST Please pray for the repose of the souls of Norma Stone and Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI.

Norma died on Wednesday, December 28. Her Funeral Mass was this past Wednesday, January 4 at Saints Mary and Joseph in Carlinville. Norma is the mother of Fr. Jeff Stone. Fr. Jeff was the Parochial Administrator and then Pastor of St. Brigid in Liberty, St. Joseph in Fowler/Quincy, and St. Edward in Mendon from 2007-2021. He is now Pastor of

St. Lawrence Parish in Greenville. Fr. Jeff's mailing address is: St. Lawrence Parish; P.O. Box 401, Greenville, IL, 62246. Please keep Norma and her family in your prayers. Eternal Rest grant unto her, O Lord, and let Perpetual Light shine upon her. May her soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Parents play a special and indispensable role in nurturing all vocations. The loss of a loved one is difficult for anyone. Priests generally are very close to their mothers and the loss of a parent, and especially our mothers, can be especially difficult for quite a period of time. It is only through our faith and our hope in the Resurrection and Eternal Life that one can really move through this grief. Closeness to our Blessed Mother is also important, and dare I say, even necessary.

Your prayers for all priests are so very important. Please continue to pray for them and for their holiness. And please remember the parents of priests as well, especially their mothers. Just as it was through our Blessed Mother who brought our Savior, Jesus Christ the High Priest, into the world, it is through these women that priests are born into the world to celebrate the Sacraments which Christ Himself left us. The reflection on this beautiful gift is a powerful one. And like our Blessed Mother, the mother of priests often times quietly and humbly endure the sorrows of our own Blessed Mother.

This, by no means, diminishes the importance of one's father, and the importance of fathers in the life of a family. We are reminded of that in the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. Again, it is the family that brings about and nurtures all good and holy vocations. May our place in the family reflect this as we remain mindful of the devil's unending attacks on the family and family life and his attempts to destroy the family.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI died on Saturday, December 31. His Funeral Mass was on Thursday, January 5. Most of us remember Benedict XVI very well. He was The Sovereign Pontiff from 2005 – 2013.

Bishop Paprocki celebrated the Mass for the Dead on Sunday, January 1 at 10:00 a.m. for the repose of the soul of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. He encouraged his priests to do the same and so the 8:00 a.m. Mass on Sunday, January 1 at Holy Family was celebrated as the Mass for the Dead with the intention of the repose of the soul of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. Additionally, a picture of Benedict XVI with a lit candle has been placed in both St. Thomas and Holy Family Churches and will remain there for a period of time.

Specific Norms govern the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy. Given the unique situation we found ourselves in with the death of Benedict XVI, I share the following instructions from our Office of Divine Worship and some of the associated Norms:

"Bearing in mind that 'the Church offers the Eucharistic Sacrifice of Christ's Passover for the dead so that, since all the members of Christ's body are in communion with each other, the petition for spiritual help on behalf of some may bring comforting hope to others,' it is fitting to offer a Mass for the Dead for the deceased Pope Emeritus. Such a Mass, not being a funeral Mass, is colloquially called a "memorial Mass," though this phrase is not found in the Roman Missal."

"A Mass for the Dead may be celebrated on receiving the news of a death, for the final burial, or the first anniversary, even on days within the Octave of Christmas, on obligatory memorials, and on weekdays, except for Ash Wednesday or weekdays during Holy Week."

"The color of vestments worn for a Mass for the Dead may be "violet, white, or black." However, it is customary for red vestments to be worn at a Mass for the Dead offered for a Pope since we are mourning the death of the successor of the Apostle Peter."

I share this with you as it is both interesting and fascinating to know how our Liturgical Celebrations are governed. They are not to be willy-nilly, do whatever you want and whatever makes us feel good. They are structured so that the sacredness is preserved and there are rules and norms set forth that are not optional but necessary to preserve this sacredness. The Church is not a social club of voting and doing what one likes but rather maintains and safeguards the Fullness of Truth so that we might have Eternal Life through Her.

Please continue to pray for Benedict XVI. Eternal Rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let Perpetual Light shine upon him. May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

In his statement concerning the death of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI which I read in part at some of the Masses last weekend, Bishop Paprocki said this: "Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI was an authentic example of faithfulness to God and Catholicism, living and preaching the Gospel message with truth and passion. Always writing and teaching, his warm smile, gentle demeanor, and pastoral approach to explaining and living out the Catholic faith inspired millions and brought people closer to Christ. His reverence toward the Eucharist, the Mass, and the sacraments are examples for us today on how we should all view and respect these treasures of the Catholic faith. His steadfast defense of our faith's teachings and traditions and remaining faithful to them. despite the pressures of the secular world and from inside the Church, is the mark of a true leader.

To this day, I am humbled Pope Benedict appointed me as the ninth bishop of the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois. I had the honor of meeting with him several times. I will forever remember his friendliness and compassion. His theological genius and his ability to communicate our rich and oftentimes difficult theology to the people in a clear and understandable way was most impressive. The Catholic Church lost an incredible and humble man, but his legacy leaves a lasting impression on the faithful and our Church."
