One of the 'memes' of the season reminds us that "wise men still seek him". This is to say, there is wisdom in seeking the Lord and giving one's reverence when he is found. I have often spoken on this feast how it is one that is particularly relevant to our own day and age, which holds such as limited view of what knowledge and wisdom is all about. In our post-renaissance, thoroughly-scientific world, there is a not-so-subtle bias that the only wisdom and the only knowledge which is legitimate is that which can be

demonstrated empirically... that is, through measurement and experimentation. Indeed, the technological wonders of our age are predicated on learning the mysteries of physics and chemistry and biology. Efforts to understand the world in faith, comparatively, seem to many as insufficient and unconvincing. How can one prove the existence of God? How do we make sense of miracles which purport to suspend the laws of the 'real' universe? Might God and the religions which propose to worship him simply be productions of our own minds, comforting us in our suffering, reassuring us in the face of death, and exercising power and authority to exert control over society? The failure of the Church to communicate the faith convincingly by helping Christians to live lives of holiness in harmony with the teachings of Christ certainly undermine the effort to be a credible participant in the marketplace of ideas.

A fundamental question before us is the nature of knowledge and human ability to perceive truth. In centuries gone by, truth would be held as 'absolute'. You believed in God because the Church, in witness to the works and teaching of Christ and often recognized an authority in the civil order, said that you had to. Thus, often 'faith' was an easy choice, because holding the faith was supported by 'polite society' and it affirmed one's goodness and self-regard. Of course, there are other times when holding to the faith could win a person persecution and even martyrdom. This faith was hard-won and precious— it could not be explained by an appeal to simple logic, but it had the merit of the witness to someone willing to give his or her life. The Church has known both extremes from age to age. Indeed, Christianity is often stronger following periods of challenge and persecution.

Much of our Catholic faith is perennially founded in the idea that truth is an objective reality... it is real whether you believe it or not, it is true regardless of what you think, and the final resolution of doubt and disbelief will come when God finally reveals all at the end of the age. This ultimately brings us to making a 'bet'... is it all true or not? Will I bet my life on it and 'win' all that faith purports to give— eternal life? Or is it just as well to go some other way because religion seems to be a dead-end fantasy? This conundrum and the potential solutions to it are eloquently simulated by "Pascal's Wager", which helps evaluate the potential gains and losses from the proposition of faith... but the wager—the 'bet'—is not 'faith' in itself. Faith is not the 'bet' for or against God, but it is something deeper... it is pursuit of things that are true, reverencing them when they are found.

The modern age rejects the proposal that anything is 'absolute'. proclaiming that 'truth is in the eyes of the beholder'. "I think, therefore I am", concluded Rene Descartes. I can thus only know the world as true insofar that I can perceive and measure it and judge it. My parents, the good religious sisters who taught us in school, and the accidental providences in my life have lead me to believe in God. Because the faith been good for me and explains the 'gaps' in my existence, I therefore believe. Fair enough. But the subjective order of truth is being challenged in our day by the unbounded mischief inherent in of having no objective foundation for reality. For example, it is by assuming to one's experiential self the weight of the burden of 'truth' that one can reject the biological reality of their creation and say that subjective experience leads one to conclude that "I might have been born a male, but I believe I am really a woman." Or that "love, is love, is love" and therefore my view of marriage can reject standards rooted in biological reality or appealing to so-called 'traditional' family life or social orders. How much easier it is to bend religious faith to fit one's needs or predilections, rather than to seek that which is truly good and righteous and true! But the inability to establish a reasonable, perennial basis for the truth ultimately breeds extreme individualism, fighting between factional groups, and eventually complete confusion, not unlike what was experienced in language and society at the Tower of Babel in Genesis (11: 1-9).

The essence of today's feast is very modern, yet as ancient as the first men and women who looked up at the stars and wondered about the universe. The wise men we remember this weekend travelled for months from their foreign kingdom and did not set out with preconceived notions of what they were going to find... they were simply seeking the truth revealed in the natural phenomenon they observed. When they arrived at their physical destination, they saw the spiritual object of their search. Somewhere along the way they came to believe... and that lead them to worship. My short column cannot address the reasonableness of faith as discerned by the certainty of truth, but that is our on-going quest as we continue to worship and continue to grow in study and prayer.
