Second Sunday of Lent

MARCH 5, 2023

Genesis 12:1-4a; 2 Timothy 1:8b-10; Matthew 17:1-9

Remember that Lent is devoted to baptism and baptismal renewal. Last week we saw that baptism does not mean freedom from temptation. As the Lord was tempted, so will we be tempted. We must daily struggle to overcome.

This week we see the profound meaning of our baptism: Through baptism, we are transformed into the image of Christ himself! But don't expect that everything is "glory."

Only once during his earthly life did Jesus allow his divinity to shine through his humanity. He was transfigured before three of the apostles. At all other times he looked like an ordinary human being. We may not "see" our divine baptismal dignity, but it is there; and we must reverence that image with humility and gratitude.

Our first reading tells of the call of Abraham. All nations and peoples will be blessed through a descendant of his. Abraham's call was great; our call to baptism is greater. We share in the blessing promised to him.

Our second reading tells us that the Gospel will also mean hardship. Jesus was divine; yet he suffered and died on the cross. We share his divine life; and we, too, must carry our crosses in union with him. Let us not rebel against our daily crosses; let us bear them joyfully.

The experience of the Transfiguration was intended to strengthen the disciples for the ordeal of the cross. It was to help them to see that the Messiah was not the triumphant and over-powering person expected, but was a suffering Messiah. If we want to follow Christ, we must follow him in his cross as well as in his resurrection.

2ND SUNDAY OF LENT

From the desk of our DRE,

I suffered miscarriages of my first and third children—Clare and John. Shortly after losing John, we called my friend Bret. The call was barely over when there was a knock at the door—it was Bret. He said, "I'm so sorry," sat down at the table and cried with us. Years later, Bret's wife Lori (another friend) needed emergency surgery. I sat in the waiting room, listened to Bret's fears, prayed and made sure he ate. When the surgeon came out, he said, "This news is only for family." Bret clasped me in a side-hug and said, "This is our sister."

Intimacy is "into-me-see." It's vulnerable sharing and being-with. Jesus Christ is God the Son, Who took on a human body and soul and loves with a human heart. He deeply desires intimacy with you. At the Last Supper, Jesus gave us the best parting gift ever: Himself. Holy Communion IS Jesus Christ: Risen, complete and whole, hidden behind appearances of bread and wine (CCC 1374). He comes inside of you—literally heart to heart. "...the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, 'This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup." 1 Cor 11:23-30

The 3rd Precept of the Church is Receive the Sacrament of the Eucharist at least once a year during the Easter Season. Holy Communion received worthily forgives venial sins and helps us grow in holiness. The steps to a worthy Communion are 1) know Whom you receive, 2) be in a state of grace (confess your mortal sins to a priest and be absolved), 3) fast – nothing by mouth except water and medicine for one hour, 4) receive reverently and 5) thank God. Examine yourself before Mass (CCC 1385). If you are not prepared, come to Mass but don't receive Communion. It is a very serious mortal sin (a sacrilege) to receive Communion unworthily. Preparing well for Communion respects the intimate friendship that Jesus is offering us. This relationship began with the gift of grace and adoption at baptism. Jesus' friendship truly makes us family.

Being united as family with Jesus doesn't just give us access to surgery results. Clasped to the side of Jesus, our Father gives us access to Heaven. "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day." Jn 6:54 Receiving Holy Communion worthily allows us to start living Heaven now!
