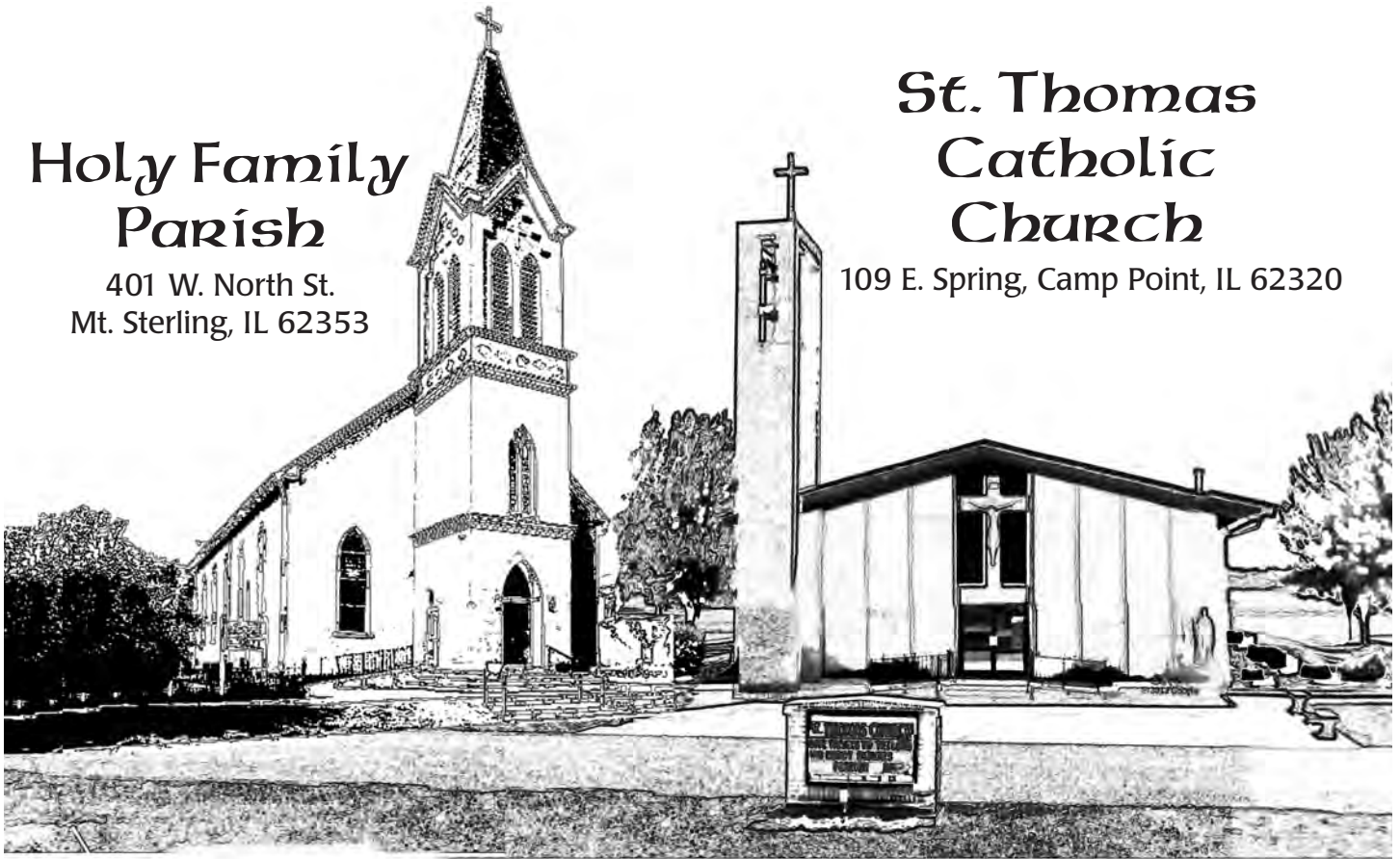

From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Fourth Sunday of Easter. Yes, we continue this great and joyous celebration of our Lord's Resurrection so again, a Happy Easter to each of you.

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is designated Good Shepherd Sunday. I speak more about that later on. We hear in the readings today how Jesus is the Good Shepherd, and that the sheep follow Him because they recognize His voice. He is present to us and leading us. Still, we have to be mindful of how we recognize His voice as we sort out and quiet the voices of strangers who lead us to slaughter and destruction. We pray that the Lord will teach us to hear His voice more clearly, draw us closer to Himself, and protect us from all evil.

And now just a few notes:

-LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, May 1 - Optional memorial of St. Joseph the Worker. To foster deep devotion to St. Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the "May Day" celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the memorial of St. Joseph the Worker in 1955. This memorial extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, mankind both fulfills the command found in Genesis to care for the earth and to be productive in their labors. St. Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is an example of the holiness of human labor.

In his encyclical, *Laborem Exercens*, Pope St. John Paul II says: "the Church considers it Her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society." St. Joseph is held up as a model of such work.

To capture the devotion to St. Joseph within the Catholic liturgy, in 1870 Pope Pius IX declared St. Joseph the Patron of the Universal Church. In 1955, Pope Pius XII added the memorial of St. Joseph the Worker. This silent saint, who was given the noble task of caring and watching over the Virgin Mary and Jesus, now cares for and watches over the Church and models for all the dignity of human work.

As a side, as many of you are aware, there is also the Solemnity of St. Joseph, the Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, normally celebrated on March 19. St. Joseph the Worker, Pray for us!

-Tuesday, May 2 - Obligatory Memorial of St. Athanasius, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. Athanasius led a tumultuous but dedicated life of service to the Church. He was the great champion of the faith against the widespread heresy of Arianism, the teaching by Arius that Jesus was not truly divine. The vigor of his writings earned him the title of Doctor of the Church.

Born of a Christian family in Alexandria, Egypt, and given a classical education, Athanasius became secretary to Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, entered the priesthood and was eventually named bishop himself. His predecessor, Alexander, had been an outspoken critic of a new movement growing in the East—Arianism.

When Athanasius assumed his role as Bishop of Alexandria, he continued the fight against Arianism. At first, it seemed that the battle would be easily won and that Arianism would be condemned. Such, however, did not prove to be the case. The Council of Tyre was called and for several reasons that are still unclear, the Emperor Constantine exiled Athanasius to northern Gaul. This was to be the first in a series of travels and exiles reminiscent of the life of Saint Paul.

After Constantine died, his son restored Athanasius as bishop. This lasted only a year, however, for he was deposed once again by a coalition of Arian bishops. Athanasius took his case to Rome, and Pope Julius I called a synod to review the case and other related matters.

Five times Athanasius was exiled for his defense of the Doctrine of Christ's Divinity. During one period of his life, he enjoyed 10 years of relative peace—reading, writing, and promoting the Christian life along the lines of the monastic ideal to which he was greatly devoted. His dogmatic and historical writings are almost all polemic, directed against every aspect of Arianism. Among his ascetical writings, his *Life of St. Anthony* achieved astonishing popularity and contributed greatly to the establishment of monastic life throughout the Western Christian world.

Athanasius suffered many trials while he was Bishop of Alexandria. He was given the grace to remain strong against what probably seemed at times to be insurmountable opposition. Athanasius lived his office as Bishop completely. He defended the true faith for his flock, regardless of the cost to himself. In today's world we are experiencing this same call to remain true to our faith, no matter what. St. Athanasius, Pray for us!

-Wednesday, May 3 - Feast of Saints Philip and James, Apostles. Philip was from Bethsaida and among the first disciples called by Jesus. Tradition holds that he preached in Phrygia, dying on a cross at Hierapolis in the first century. Along with St. James, they are venerated as patron saints of Uruguay.

James, the son of Alphaeus was leader of the Jerusalem Church. St. James has an Epistle in Sacred Scripture ascribed to him. He is believed to have been beaten or stoned to death in the year 62. He is a patron of the dying and both he and St. Philip are mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer 1).

As in the case of the other apostles, we see in James and Philip human men who became foundation stones of the Church, and we are reminded again that holiness and its consequent apostolate are entirely the gift of God, not a matter of human achieving. All power is God's power, even the power of human freedom to accept his gifts. "You will be clothed with power from on high," Jesus told Philip and the others. Saints Philip and James, Pray for us!

-WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS - Sunday, April 30 this year is observed as the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. The purpose of World Day of Prayer for Vocations is to publicly fulfill the Lord's instruction to, "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into His harvest" (Mt 9:38; Lk 10:2). As a climax to a prayer that is continually offered throughout the Church, it affirms the primacy of faith and grace in all that concerns vocations to the priesthood and to the consecrated life.

While appreciating all vocations, the Church concentrates its attention this day on vocations to the ordained ministries (priesthood and diaconate), consecrated life in all its forms (male and female religious life,

societies of apostolic life, consecrated virginity), secular institutes in their diversity of services and membership, and to the missionary life.

2023 marks the 60th Anniversary of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations.

As we observe this World Day of Prayer for Vocations, I encourage each of us to pray in a special way for these Vocations, today especially, but to also keep this in your prayers each day.

As a reminder, in our Diocese we are encouraged to pray one Hail Mary each day at 4:40 that we may have 40 seminarians for our Diocese.

-GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY - The Fourth Sunday of Easter (this year, April 30) is referred to as Good Shepherd Sunday. In the Liturgy of the Word, we will hear the reference to Christ as the Good Shepherd. The following is taken from catholicculture.org and, in part, from Fr. Kevin O'Sullivan, O.F.M.:

"Christ Himself is the Good Shepherd, who knows each one of His sheep, who gives His life for them and snatches them from the jaws of the marauding wolf. He is the true shepherd who fulfills Ezechiel's prophecy foretelling for Israel a shepherd from the end of time who was to deliver his people.

Christ's sheepfold is the Church. In the Church He bestows on us His life in the Sacraments, His Word in the teaching that She gives us, all the riches of His grace to light up our way and uphold our steps as we go forward to our heavenly home; through Her, He acts as the one Shepherd of our souls. Appointed to lead the flock, Peter gave his life for those entrusted to his care, and ever since then the priestly ministry has assured the continuous presence in the Church of Him who remains the true Shepherd of our souls.

We surely are fortunate to belong to the sheepfold of Christ—His Church. We surely are blessed to have the Son of God as our Shepherd, who came among us in order to lead us to heaven. Do we fully appreciate our privileged position? Do we always live up to our heavenly vocation? We know His voice, we know what He asks of us, but do we always listen to that voice, do we always do what He asks of us?

There are many among us today who foolishly think they need no shepherd. They think they know all the facts of life while they are in total ignorance of the most basic fact of all, namely, the very purpose of life. Not that the thought of it does not arise disturbingly before their minds time and time again. But they try to smother that thought and ease their consciences by immersing themselves deeper and deeper in the affairs and the passing pleasures of this temporary life. Alas for them, a day of reckoning lies ahead, a day that is much nearer than they would like to believe. What will be their fate when they meet Christ the Judge, whom they had refused to follow and acknowledge during their days on earth?

This is a misfortune that could happen to any one of us, unless we think often of our purpose and our end in life. We have a few short years, but short though they be, we can earn for ourselves an eternity of happiness during this life. Let the straying sheep boast of their false freedom and of the passing joys they may get in this life—this freedom and these joys are mixed with much sorrow, and will end very soon. We know that if we follow the Shepherd of our souls, we are on the way to the true life, the perfect life, the unending life which will have no admixture of sorrow, regret, or pain. Where Christ is, there perfect happiness is, and there with God's grace we hope and trust to be.”

-MAY - The month of May has traditionally been known as the month of Mary. As such, I will be asking the music folks at both parishes once again to include Marian hymns for each Mass. These hymns are a rich treasure that we have in the Church.

We will also be having May Crownings at both parishes.

May Altars are also very much a tradition, especially in individual homes. I would encourage you to “build” your own May Altar at home for the month of May. A stature of the Blessed Virgin Mary along with flowers and perhaps a Rosary and whatever else to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary. Be sure to pray together as a family as well, perhaps the Holy Rosary each evening, and to talk about Mary’s great role in salvation history and how she is a both a perfect example for us in living our Christian lives and a great intercessor.

In addition to your May Altars in your homes, I will be setting up a May Altar in each parish church during May as well. Mary, our Mother, pray for us!

-FIRST FRIDAY DEVOTION - Friday, May 5 at St. Thomas. Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament beginning at noon. Confessions from 5:00 p.m. - 5:45 p.m. Benediction at 5:45 p.m. and Mass at 6:00 p.m. As always, I encourage you to spend some time with the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament and to join us for Mass and also to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation regularly.

-GRANDPARENTS’ DAY - Friday, May 5 we will be having Grandparents/ Special person Day at St. Mary School. It is always good to see so many join us for this day. I am grateful for the support of St. Mary School and for those who work so diligently to make this an extra special day.

-NOCTURNAL ADORATION - Beginning at 10:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 6 at Holy Family and going through the night. Benediction is at 7:45 a.m. followed by our regularly scheduled 8:00 a.m. Mass.

I am grateful to see a number of new folks joining us for Nocturnal Adoration. If you are interested or would like more information, contact Mary Koch who is serving as President of our Nocturnal Adoration this year. You, of course, are also welcome to join us any time throughout the night...if you would then like to commit to one rotating hour each month, Mary will get you set up in a group.

-JUBILEE CELEBRATION - On Wednesday, May 3, the priests of the Diocese will gather in Springfield for the annual Priest Jubilee Celebration. It begins in the afternoon with a Spiritual talk for the priests followed by Solemn Evening Prayer and then dinner with recognition of the priests celebrating significant Jubilees.
