

#### From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the **16th Sunday in Ordinary Time**. The 1st Reading from the Book of Wisdom. Despite our Lord's great power, He wishes to communicate His great mercy, "Though you are master of might, you judge with clemency, and with much lenience you govern us." Our Lord's' patience towards us is directed to affording us time for repentance, "You gave your children good ground for hope that you would permit repentance for their sins."

The Gospel today is from the 3rd major section in Matthew's Gospel called "The Mystery Sermon." In this section there are 7 parables speaking about the Kingdom of Heaven as a "Mystery". We hear 3 of these parables in today's Gospel: (1) Wheat and the Weeds, (2) The Mustard Seed, and (3) The Yeast.

In the Parable of the Wheat and the Weeds, a man sowed good wheat seeds, but at night an enemy sowed weeds among them. The sower's servants wish to pull out the weeds. However, the weeds and wheat appear so

similar that there is a danger in attempting to pull out the weeds that some of the wheat might be uprooted as well. The sower asks that they all grow together until harvest, when the weeds will be collected and burned. Jesus uses this parable to describe the Kingdom of God here on earth. There is always good and evil living together among us, and often they are indistinguishable. At the same time, there is always conversion and reversion consistently in motion. Weeds are converting to wheat, and wheat is reverting Jesus urges patience since we do not to weeds. always discern well the value of every human heart. And the Lord wants to give every opportunity for repentance. We want to see at harvest time barns filled with wheat converted from weeds!

The **Traveling Monstrance** has arrived here at Blessed Sacrament from the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois. This monstrance is traveling to parishes throughout the Diocese during the current year to mark this special year of the Eucharist. This monstrance dates back to 1857 as a gift to newly installed Bishop Henry Juncker from the German Catholics of Quincy. The traveling monstrance will be here from now through August 5. Therefore we will have special times of Eucharistic Adoration each day to celebrate our parish's love of the Eucharist right here at Blessed Sacrament. Please see the times below and please consider joining us in prayer during one of these times.

On July 9 in honor of the Venerable Fr. Augustus Tolton, the first African American Priest ordained in the U.S., more than 200 people made pilgrimage from St. Peter Church to Fr. Tolton's grave in St. Peter Cemetery over a mile away. Our own Fr. Tom Meyer spoke of unfinished works in a fitting metaphor for Fr. Tolton's life. On this date in 1897, Fr. Tolton died at age 43. He is currently on the path to sainthood. It was announced that next year the procession will be joined by pilgrims walking the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage en route to Indianapolis.

### Keep Food 'Cool for the Summer'

#### "Cool" Tip #1: Bring on the Cold (Sources)

When you're serving food outside, extra cold sources are a must to keep everything cool. Pack coolers with bags of ice, gel packs or even frozen water bottles so that your food will stay cold and safe for as long as possible.

#### "Cool" Tip #2: Pack It Tight

Full coolers will keep your perishable foods cold and safe for much longer than half full ones. Stock up your coolers before you go outside so that you can keep everything at a safe temperature all day long. If you don't fill your cooler with food, fill the rest with extra ice. You can also pack foods when they are frozen to maintain a nice, cold temperature for your snacks, even when it's hot outside.

#### "Cool" Tip #3: Open and Close It Quick

Because beverage coolers tend to be opened more frequently, keep your drinks in a separate cooler from your perishable foods. For snacks, only take out what you need at a time, and keep the rest chilling for later. And never leave your cooler open for long!

#### "Cool" Tip #4: When in Doubt, Throw It Out

The last thing you want to bring inside from the outdoors is a case of foodborne illness. If your food has been out for a while, it may not be safe to repack and eat later. Don't hesitate to throw away any food that has been left out in the sun for too long. Keep coolers in the shade so they can stay cool and keep your food cool, too.

#### "Cool" Tip #5: Remember Groceries and Food Deliveries, Too

Don't forget to keep your groceries and food deliveries cool when the weather is warm. If you go to the store, bring a cooler or cold storage bag with cold sources to keep your food safe until you get home. Check that the temperature of your perishable foods is at 40°F or below with a thermometer, then put them in the refrigerator or freezer as soon as possible.


