As school gets back into session for St. Dominic's and for all of the other schools our children attend, we also get our Religious Education programs up and running for the season as well. Traditionally, we have reckoned our Religious Education offerings for our young people in two 'tracks'... one belonging to our Catholic School, where religious education is part of the daily curriculum, and then the other belonging to "CCD" or "PSR", and more recently "Families of not enrolled in our Catholic grade school attend a standalone

Faith", where young people who are not enrolled in our Catholic grade school attend a standalone religious education program offered by the church.

In recent years, not only in Quincy, but all over the country, church leaders are finding the delivery of religious education more and more difficult, especially in the context of providing a quality program for those not involved in our Catholics Schools. For sure, there has always been issues finding sufficient, properly trained volunteers, setting dates and seasons that work for most families, for dealing with the, ahem, "energy" of students in their classrooms, where perhaps discipline is not as strict as it is in school, or where the motivation of earning grades is lacking, inspiring lapses in attention and performance. We will always have these problems, but there is something more that we are now dealing with.

In recent years we have also found that families and young people, holding to the (perenniallywrong) attitude that "after Confirmation, religious education is finished", perceive themselves as being "graduated" from the obligation of attending religious education programming because the "obligation" of receiving the sacraments is completed after third grade Confirmation and First Communion. All too often this attutide snowballs into casual attitudes about the obligation to participate in Sunday worship due to all of the other activities that are part of school and family life. The effort to bless our children with sacramental graces earlier in their lives with the intention of inspiring ongoing religious development (not as mere students obligated to years in the classroom, but as Christians embracing the life-long horizon of growth as stewards of the great gifts they have received) is being short-circuited by this premature departure from religious education.

And besides leaving formal religious training, it is also alarming that—both from our Catholic School families, as well as our public school families—that probably only around 20% of our families regularly attend Mass on Sunday. Sunday Mass attendance is, of course, a serious obligation. To be blunt, it is a sin to miss Mass on Sunday. But even more than just being a sin, there is an even more alarming evil that slides into our attitude about the faith when our families miss Mass frequently. In short, our teachers, our catechists, our clergy instruct our children that "Mass is important", and then when they look to their parents they see another example and another path. Thus many young people experience competing opinions: "this is important" and "this is not important". If a family does not follow up with a good example for the children, taking not only the religious education of their children seriously, but even more so the essential, minimal obligation that we have as Christians to worship and to form our lives around the Eucharist, then we are lost as a people of faith, our efforts at religious education risk being in vain, and our children will need to be completely re-evangelized if they are to take their rightful place among God's people.

We have a big problem. Perhaps I have not been assertive enough in talking about this, and so we are going to start here and now: In this year of Eucharistic Revival we are being reminded and challenged to form our lives of the truth that the Eucharist and its work of Divine Worship is the very source and summit of all that we do... either we are a Eucharistic people, or we are nothing. In order to worship "in Spirit and Truth", we must know the faith. If we do not know the faith, then we can expect people to say "I don't get anything out of Mass... why should I be here?"

I urge all of our families to make a renewed effort in this school year to focus ourselves back on what is essential in our lives as Catholics. Families... commit yourselves to coming to Mass each and every weekend without fail, and help your children to learn to prioritize their faith over sports leagues, weekend trips, or the temptation to simply surrender to being "tired". Parents, grow your faith that you may teach and be a good example to your children... the best way to start is by reviewing your experience at Sunday Mass with a discussion of the readings you hear and how they apply in your lives as a family. Learn to spot and identify and give thanks for the "Holy Moments" that take place every day of our lives. Hearts lacking in gratitude, days that pass by in confusion and indifference leaving bodies and spirits exhausted... none of this is what being a "Eucharistic People" is about. The Lord wants better for us.

The Church is hardly perfect, and faithfulness in the discipline of worship and formation can be hard, but as we work together to create a family of families, the Church is better to welcome the stranger and embrace the sinner, to heal the brokenhearted and rejoice with the victorious— to be a sign of God's love, here in this world and in everlasting life.

## St. Dominic School Buddy Program



Our school utilizes the buddy system to build a sense of security and belonging through relationships and encouragement. For this purpose, these buddy groups work on various projects together, as well as play games and read with each other. The student buddy program is comprised of the following classes that have been paired together: Preschool and 4th Grade, Kindergarten and 8th Grade, 1st Grade and 6th Grade, 2nd Grade and 5th Grade, and 3rd Grade and 7th Grade. Eighth-grade students at St. Dominic School have many opportunities to practice selfless acts of service and participate in faith-based activities. Each day at Morning Meeting, our eighth-grade students sit next to kindergarten students to model how to participate and encourage their participation. We notice the way these younger students look up to the older ones as holy moments of kindness. When students begin to see ordinary moments as an opportunity to collaborate with God, Holy Moments happen every day at St. Dominic School.
