OCTOBER 1, 2023

Ezekiel 18:25-28; Philippians 2:1-11; Matthew 21:28-32

In the context of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus has taught a very high code of morality for his followers in the sermon on the church. He then taught (Matthew 19:16-26) that we will not be judged merely on the commandments; rather we shall be judged on how well we used our talents and abilities for the glory of God.

This infuriated many of the leaders of the Jewish people. They thought that they had a specially privileged position since they were God's first choice. After Jesus enters Jerusalem in the last week of his life, he reminds them that *doing* is more important than *talking*.

He tells the parable of the two sons. The Old Testament reading parallels the Gospel: Those who turn away from evil and do good will be saved; those who belong to the "inner circle" will not be saved unless their deeds are righteous.

But the most important lesson of today's Mass is the second reading. The last part of the second reading was an ancient Christian hymn before Paul used it in his Letter to the Philippians in 55 A.D.

We are called to have the same attitude of Christ. He was divine; but he didn't cling to his glory as God. Rather he made himself as nothing. He became man. And he humbled himself even to the death of the cross.

Why? Because he wanted to show that God is not grasping but giving! Because of his emptying, he is exalted above all in the resurrection. We must strive for this attitude of Christ: We must give of ourselves completely if we are to be filled with the glory of Christ. This is the "paschal mystery."

Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, October 1, 2023

Dear Parishioners,

As we begin the new month of October, we find an interesting gospel that reflects our human condition. How many of us remember telling our mothers that, upon her request, we would clean our rooms. And then distractions occur, other interests were piqued, and we never did as promised. Or how many of us upon the request of a parent would boldly state, "no," and then reflect upon our statement, have regrets, and end up doing as we were asked. Such is our human condition! According to the Catholic Catechism, "God created human beings as rational beings, conferring on them the dignity of a person who can initiate and control his/her own actions." We have, in other words, a "free will" to decide what choices we will do. In this gospel, we hear two sons who were asked by their father to work in the vineyard. The first son, exercising his free will, said, "no, I will not" but later changed his mind and went. The second son, exercising his free will, said "yes" he would go, but never did as he promised. The point of this parable is that God gives us a free will, an ability to make choices to follow His Will, or follow our own will. The sinners with whom Jesus associated were like the first son, who, when invited, said No but because of grace and the presence of the Son of Man, they changed their minds. The other group were the good people of Israel, the Pharisees and other leaders who said "yes" to following God's Will but when this God becomes man, they in turn changed their minds and did what they wanted. This simple parable has much meaning for all of us. It also carries out a hope, a hope that in spite of our saying "no" to what God asks, that there is forgiveness and mercy and grace that helps to change our minds.

As we begin this new month of October, you will notice that our ushers will be counting our attendance at our Masses. This is to assist the diocese in its planning process and has been coined our October count. So during this month, I ask you to sit up so no one will be missed. Beginning this weekend, and lasting for the next three weeks, the ushers will be counting heads. I am hoping that our people have returned from pre-Covid days and have made the Eucharist on the weekend once again a priority.

Many of you who responded to the feasibility study concerning our capital campaign recently received a letter from me with the results. In that letter we listed the next steps as we await diocesan approval for us to enlist the Steier Group to head our campaign, as well as the priority of projects for this campaign. As of this writing, I have not heard from the Bishop authorizing his approval for what we hope to accomplish. Needless to say, I could have easily coasted without any burdens of a capital campaign, but I just see a need for us here at St. Peter to secure our school, continue our funeral dinners without interrupting school, and adding much needed classroom space. With such a project, then we open up the area below the Church for what I hope would be a parish center for our people. But to make that space available, we have to make room to move over to the school area our library and pre-school program. But we can't do that until we have more available space. I'm hoping and praying that our parish will continue to get behind us in their support as St. Peter School is an important part of our evangelization as a parish.



Dear Friends in the Lord,

I am aware that many worthy charities outside our diocese contact you annually for financial support. In the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois, along with parish and diocesan giving, I am reminding parishes and schools of our policy on Fundraising for Missions (\$9000 Fundraising for Missions) and ask for support of the Pontifical Mission Societies (TPMS), which includes: the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, Missionary Childhood Association (MCA), Society of St. Peter the Apostle, and the Missionary Union of Priests and Religious.

In addition to our diocesan policy, Church documents direct that the Pontifical Mission Societies should be given "first place" [Ad Gentes no.38] and "the leading role" [Redemptoris Missiono no.84] in the Church's work of missionary formation through their material support, benefiting the poorest in the world. Each of us need to support that work as best we can.

Parishes, schools, and religious education programs may elect to support other worthy charities, but this should be in addition to their works of prayer and sacrifice through the Pontifical Mission Societies. I also ask that you carefully research any additional groups you choose to support to ensure that their work follows Catholic teaching. The Pontifical Mission Societies, given their standing in the Church internationally, are in the position to vet credentials of other Catholic mission relief groups. If you require assistance, contact our diocesan Office for the Missions at (217) 698-8500.

Following these guidelines should help better support the universal evangelization efforts of the Church through the Pontifical Mission Societies.

I extend my thanks to those parishes, schools and religious education programs that already actively participate in the works of these societies. I am ever grateful for your efforts in forming those you serve in the Catholic Faith.
