Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King

NOVEMBER 26, 2023

Ezekiel 34:11-12,15-17;

1 Corinthians 15:20-26,28; Matthew 25:31-46

What difference does Jesus Christ make in your life? When you are at work or at play, does your faith in him make you any different from others? When you are relaxing with friends, or when you are enjoying recreation, are you any different because you know Christ Jesus?

Jesus Christ should be the meaning of every dimension of our lives. If we truly live for Christ, we don't need to parade it or to always talk "God-speak." People will know we are Christians by the way we live. They will see in our lives the reflection of Jesus Christ. Our deeds will speak louder than our words.

The Feast of Christ the King was instituted in 1925 (in the "Roaring Twenties") when civic and social life was divorced entirely from religion. It was the time of the rise of Totalitarian dictatorships. Among religious people, it was a time of sentimentality without substance.

We claim Christ as our King: All laws of nations must be subject to his moral reign. We claim Christ as our King: We cannot be content with mere sentimentality in our private religion; we are called to profess our faith publicly and boldly.

Our first reading is from Ezekiel. The metaphor of "shepherd" was used for the leaders of Israel, both secular and religious. Unfortunately, during Ezekiel's time, those leaders were corrupt. The Lord says that he himself will become our shepherd, our leader. He will rescue the scattered and lost sheep; he will protect all the sheep of his flock.

The fifteenth chapter of First Corinthians is a great sermon on the resurrection. Death is the great enemy, the great fear, of all people. But not for the Christian! Christ has risen from the dead. He is the "first fruits" or the cause of our own resurrection. Because he has risen, we, too, shall rise; death cannot hold us.

What, then do we ever have to fear? At the end of the world, all peoples will appear before the Lord. He will judge them on the basis of what they have done – or failed to do – to others. We shall be very surprised to hear that whatever we did – or failed to do – to our neighbor in need, we did (or failed to do) to Christ himself. Let us strive to see the image of Christ in every person. In this way we shall truly proclaim that he is king over our lives.

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. First check out the mural of Christ the King and High Priest in our main entryway above the door. Look up! It's a great rendition. 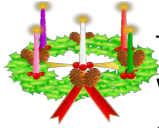

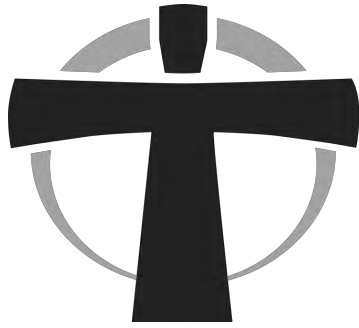
