Second Sunday of Advent

DECEMBER 10, 2023

Isaiah 40:1-5,9-11; 2 Peter 3:8-14; Mark 1:1-8

Jewish tradition expected that everything would be instantly perfect when the Messiah came. There would be justice, peace, an end to all suffering and death, plenty of food and of the good things of earth for every faithful person. It didn't happen that way.

The primitive Church saw the problem: Jesus IS the Messiah; why then aren't things perfect? The Church proclaimed that all would be perfect when Jesus the Messiah returned in his glory. And that would be very soon. But it didn't happen.

Our second reading is a sort of rationalization at the delay in the glorious Coming of Christ (the Parousia.) It tells us that a day is as a thousand years, and vice versa, in God's eyes. According to his time frame, it has only been a couple of days since Jesus ascended to heaven. What happens when our expectations are not fulfilled? Do we lose hope? Are we embittered?

Our first reading is from the second part of Isaiah; it was written toward the end of the Babylonian Captivity. The Jews in exile expected liberation; they expected that the Messiah would come immediately and that all would be perfect.

The reading begins the section of Isaiah called "The Book of Consolation." The captivity (service) of the Jews is at an end, but they must make ready for the Coming of the Lord.

Jewish tradition taught that the Messiah would come instantly *IF* everyone repented at exactly the same time! It's not bad theology! If we all repented and prepared, surely the Lord would come in glory.

The Gospel is the beginning of Mark's Gospel: John the Baptist calls on us to "turn our lives around," to make straight a way for the Lord. If all of us do, then surely we would see the glory of the Lord.

2ND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

This weekend's readings we hear about the comfort of the Lord and how he comes to save us. And for us to know that our salvation is near he sends us a messenger. We need to follow the example of John the Baptist in our own life of faith. We need to echo his words, "He must increase; I must decrease."

You get to sing your favorite Christmas carols and hear wonderful music to prepare for the coming of Christmas, as well as preparing your heart with the scriptures. Thank you also to Dr. McGee, our Parishioner and president of the university. It is a great relationship we have with now Quincy University, and I am very grateful for it.

This week we were able to finish the audio-visual work in the hall, and we were able to fix the clock tower and bells. We are moving along in our projects. I also finished the work I have been doing on a master's degree to become a better administrator. The degree is from the University of St. Thomas Houston as a Masters in Ecclesial Administration and Management. It is a Master of Science in administration and management to be exact. 
