Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

JANUARY 28, 2024

Deuteronomy 18:15-20; 1 Corinthians 7:32-35; Mark 1:21-28

There are several ways of understanding today's first reading from Deuteronomy. Recall that the Deuteronomic tradition came long after Moses. Deuteronomy is a series of sermons and moral admonitions which are placed on the lips of Moses. Very likely they are part of the prophetic tradition.

The prophet held a distinct place in Israel. Peasants and kings feared the prophet, for his word came from God. The prophet was independent of priest and monarch. His voice was the conscience of Israel.

Today's reading may be the justification of the prophetic mission: Moses promises that prophets will arise from among the people, and they must be listened to, for they will speak with the authority of God.

But tradition found another meaning in this passage. Israel looked forward to the time when the Prophet par excellence would come. He would be like Moses; he would surpass Moses; he would be the Messiah.

The Gospel is the fulfillment of this expectation: Jesus speaks with authority, and not like the Scribes of the Pharisees. They split hairs and talked of cases; Jesus speaks with the authority of God himself. He heals in the power of the Spirit.

The second reading, the continuous reading, is St. Paul's admonition to celibacy and virginity because "the time is short." He means that the Second Coming of Christ is near. But it really was *not* near. Nevertheless, the celibate state and the state of virginity for the sake of the Lord are holy. The Church cherishes these in order that men and women may more freely serve the Lord and his Church.

A theme of today's Mass might be: To whom do we listen? Are we willing to hear the voice of God, even when he calls us to change? Will we listen to his authentic representatives in the Church, or do we seek those who tickle our fancy and suit our own whims?

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, January 28, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

In our gospel for this Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, we find Jesus entering the synagogue on a Sabbath, to teach. After all, He was a Rabbi and the role of a Rabbi was to teach the people. And so Jesus did. But what we find in that same gospel is that Jesus "taught with authority." The Scribes were scholars and geniuses. But like scholars it was often hard to get a straight answer from them. They would quote authorities and give many anecdotes but no real answers to questions that the people had. We've all had teachers like that, brilliant in knowledge but unable to communicate it to people they were teaching. People wanted answers. They wanted to know God's will. And Jesus was straightforward, giving very practical advice. And what He gave to people He said came from God. Jesus was that rabbi who taught with authority. He didn't need to quote from other rabbi's but taught with an authority that came from God.

This week we celebrate Catholic School's week in our community, diocese, and nation. "Catholic schools, in collaboration with parents and guardians as the primary educators, seek to educate the whole child by providing an excellent education rooted in Gospel values. Since the founding of the fist Catholic school, the United States Catholic Bishops speaking in conference have supported Catholic schools as foundational to the mission of the Church. (Address of Pope Benedict to Catholic educators). The Bishops of the United States, particularly in the seminal document, 'To Teach as Jesus Did' (1971), continuously underscore the three-fold mission of our Catholic Schools—to proclaim the Gospel, to build community, and to serve our brothers and sisters." In other words, our Catholic schools are not schools where religion is taught but rather are a vital part of the teaching mission of the Church. It is a place where our young people encounter the Living God, form their lives around the gospel message, and transform hearts and lives as we serve each other.

Last week's bulletin, I was reminiscing about my Catholic school days in Springfield. We had Ursuline Sisters and they played an important role in my life and in my vocation through my formative years. As I look back, I'm not sure how they did what they did without parental help, or teacher aides. This was before air conditioning both in Church and in our schools. I think we had only one or two lay teachers as the good sisters dominated our lives. They taught, they disciplined, and they were respected. If there was something that happened at school, there was a subtle agreement that it was not to be carried home. Unless of course you might be a sibling who was looking for something to hold over a brother or sister's head for future use. And of course I never did that. We also got to know the sisters quite well. In fact, my mother had Mother Catherine in her high school years and then all my siblings had her once again in 7th and 8th grade classes. We also knew that she needed her afternoon nap and so no one in the class would disturb her during this time for her renewal. In spite of ourselves, we learned from our educational experiences and grew to appreciate all those sisters and lay teachers who challenged us to remain life long learners. As you look back, I challenge you to remember those who helped you learn and thank God for them in your life. May God bless all of our teachers!






