Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46; 1 Corinthians 10:31–11:1; Mark 1:40-45

Biblical leprosy was not usually Hansen's Disease. The term leprosy was applied to any highly contagious and awful looking skin disease, such as ringworm, scabies, impetigo, and so on. From experience, people knew that these diseases were contagious. Therefore they isolated a person until he was cured.

The isolation may seem very cruel to us, but we must remember that they did not know how to cure these diseases, and they didn't want anyone to be infected. There was a very elaborate ritual for declaring a "leper" cleansed; this may be found in Leviticus 14.

The Gospel tells of Jesus' cure of a leper. He stretched out his hand and touched him! This was forbidden by the Torah for obvious reasons. But Jesus has such compassion that he not only uses words to cure; he touches the afflicted man.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus does not want people to get the wrong idea of his messiahship; therefore he tells those he has cured to "keep it quiet." Unfortunately the cleansed leper shouts it to the roof tops. People press and crowd Jesus; he can scarcely move about freely.

The Church sees "sin" as the spiritual leprosy. Only Jesus can cure us. And he can cure us only if we want to be cleansed. Nowadays, too many people deny their leprosy. They act as if there is no sin; they deny that the Church has a right to teach on what is sin. If we would be cured, we must first admit our problem; then humbly approach the Lord.

The second reading urges us to offer everything for the greater honor and glory of God. We can give God glory at work, at play, at prayer, and in whatever we do. Let us always offer everything we are, have, say, and do for God's glory.

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, February 11, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

Remember several years ago when we were under the Covid restrictions, people who were affected by this illness were isolated from the community in order to avoid being contagious. It got so bad that we cancelled school and we even were asked to cancel our celebration of the Eucharist. Any type of gathering of people was being prohibited and the wearing of masks was mandated. Covid created quite a hysteria in our community as it filled our hospitals and even became a life and death situation for some. I bring this to your attention because it fits in with our first reading and gospel for this weekend. What Covid did to us several years ago, leprosy did the same for the people of Israel. In fact, we find in the book of Leviticus regulations governing those who even appeared to have skin disease. These people were "to keep garments rent and head bare, muffle one's beard, dwell apart from the community, and cry out 'Unclean, Unclean.'" If one failed to live by these regulations, one was liable to be punished even with death. The protection of the community from contagious diseases like leprosy was paramount. One can understand then how leprosy became linked to sin. Leprosy was contagious to the physical community as sin was contagious to the spiritual community. And yet in the readings for this same weekend, we find Jesus in our gospel doing the impossible, touching a person with leprosy and healing him of not only the illness but also of the isolation which came as a result of the leprosy. We find Jesus, "moved with pity, stretching out His hand, touching him, and saying to him, 'Be made clean.'" And he was made clean. This is the same Jesus who does the same for us in His forgiveness of our sins. As we begin Lent in another week, let's use this time to also "be made clean" through the forgiveness of our sins.

This Wednesday, February 14, is Ash Wednesday and the beginning of our season of Lent. Our Mass schedule is as follows: 8:30 a.m., 10:00 a.m. Mass at QND (gym), 12:10 Mass, and 6:30 p.m. Mass. Then throughout the season of Lent, we will also be adding an evening Mass at 6:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday. The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be celebrated from 5:45-6:15 p.m. on Monday, Wednesdays, and Fridays during Lent. Also, please consult the bulletin for the Lenten regulations regarding fast and abstinence.

I also want to remind you of the parish mission during this season of Lent. Our speaker this year is once again a person I enjoy and know that you will also enjoy, Fr. Denis Robinson. Fr. Denis is a Benedictine priest and the rector of St. Meinrad Seminary, in Indiana. He will offer a series of presentations on the Eucharist and how this relates to the Lenten season. He will be speaking at all of our Masses next weekend, February 24-25. Then Sunday and Monday night, at 6:30 p.m. Fr. Denis will be presenting a conference each evening. I encourage you to attend and enjoy Fr. Denis and his presentations.

As we begin this season of Lent, I want to encourage you to make use of this time to grow in prayer, to celebrate the Eucharist with us, and to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. I also am giving our parishioners a Lenten devotional to use entitled, "Our Daily Visitor, Lent 2024." This devotion is to be used each day with readings and prayers. Please take one per family.



Each of our parishioners and school families are responsible for and are invited to support this campaign. The obligation rests with the entire parish community to ensure this effort is a success. That means generosity and sacrifice - and not just monetarily. We need gifts of time, talent and prayer too.

It's an exciting time for our parish and we want you to be a part of something that will mean so much to the future of St. Peter Catholic Church and School!

LENTEN REGULATIONS

ABSTINENCE - Everyone 14 years of age and over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

- FAST Everyone <u>18</u> years of age and under <u>59</u> is required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- 2. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is permitted. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to each person's needs, but together these two should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids (including milk and fruit juices) are allowed.
- 3. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Throughout his pontificate, our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has often spoken of the need for Christians to evangelize others through accompaniment. Through listening patiently, building trust, and being mindful of others' dignity, we can help one another encounter Christ's merciful love, especially those who suffer from emotional wounds, loneliness, and doubt. For Central and Eastern Europeans living in countries that experienced 70 years of communist oppression, the Church especially needs to accompany people to an encounter with Christ that is patient, understanding, and filled with hope instead of fear, anger, and anxiety.

In Slovakia, the Alexis Counseling Center has accompanied nearly 2,500 women and their loved ones with devotion. Since 2010, the center has provided counseling to women experiencing the anxieties of an unplanned pregnancy or the grief of pregnancy loss, as well as to their partners, family members, and friends. In addition to promoting psychological healing, the center also helps vulnerable women who have experienced miscarriages and abortions to find housing, material and financial assistance, and support groups.

In Albania, lay people are preparing for lay ministries as catechists and extraordinary ministers of Communion through a three-year study program that provides in-depth knowledge of the Gospel, the Church, and sacraments, liturgy, and spirituality. This formation program equips participants to be active, faith-filled agents of evangelization and accompaniment to those who desire to know Christ and the Church.

Ministries of accompaniment such as these are made possible with grant monies raised through the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. When you participate in the collection, you help the Church in Slovakia, Albania, and more than 25 other countries accompany people who still experience the hardships and wounds caused by communism. Your support for and promotion of the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe is crucial to the success of ministries that affirm the dignity of children, youth, and other vulnerable people and show them the love and mercy of Jesus.






