



This weekend, the Church presents to us the Acts of the Apostles (9: 26ff) which introduces us to Saul. If there were ever a person who could have been considered 'notorious' to the Christian community, Saul would have been it! In Chapter 8 of the Acts of the Apostles, it is mentioned, almost in the same breath that explains that the martyr Stephen was buried during a persecution, that Saul was going about trying to destroy the Church. In the first part of Chapter 9, the writer characterizes Saul's actions as "breathing murderous threats" against the disciples. Even Ananias, the follower charged by divine vision to lav hands on Saul and offer him baptism first hesitated, reasoning, "I have heard from many sources about this man ... what evil things he has done to your holy ones in Jerusalem." (Acts 9: 13) Ananias was a respected Christian leader in Damascus.

No doubt his flock would be nervous about the 'wolf' that had appeared among them. Saul had perhaps persecuted or martyred members out of that very community.

It seems that Saul took personal pride and satisfaction in carrying out what he thought was 'right' in taking wrath upon those who were perceived as corrupting the traditional Jewish faith and observance. Jesus was not the Messiah he, or many others, were looking for.

Having observed the Law from his youth, having obtained a first-rate rabbinical education, being a cultural citizen of the advanced and revered Hellenistic (Greek and thus Roman) world, Saul was 'connected' to high society and had a level of standing with the Temple authority in Jerusalem, one would surmise. But now, as Saul is left behind and St. Paul emerges, there is a radically new and different set of connections that are being established.

Life in Jesus Christ comes from being attached to him as a branch is to the vine. Detached from the source, we cannot be fruitful and we will whither and die. Saul had lived that life. After his conversion and baptism, he was now grafted onto the life of the Church. This was a difficult process, as we see in this week's readings from Acts (9: 26-31) in that all were afraid of him, and rightfully so. Was his conversion authentic? Was he a spy? But under the charge of Barnabas and the Apostles, he came to be integrated into the life of the Church, and his witness and ministry bear abundant fruit to this day.

There are two edges to consider in the mystery of the Conversion of St. Paul. First and foremost, Paul's conversion was a personal

encounter with the living Christ, calling out and calling forth the most unexpected person to be an instrument of his teaching and preaching. Saul could not have done this on his own, either by reputation or by personal virtue. He had to be transformed... turned into someone and something completely new. It was through this encounter with Christ that Saul could accept the divine invitation to turn away from the past and take up a new ministry.

A second edge that presents itself is the reception that Paul received as he made this transition from who he was to who he was to become. It is the Church, remember, who has the power to bind and loose. Indeed, this power was specifically invested into the apostolic ministry, but we can see in this scene, the power to forgive would not have been effective until and unless it spread through the entirety of the Church, in the case of St. Paul. Would you have been comfortable having Paul sitting next to you in Church on that first Sunday? Ananias had the courage to call a newly-converted Saul his "brother" (Acts 9: 17). This act of welcome and acceptance perhaps did not change the past, nor even give total assurance that the future was safe and would be easy, but it did let the scales fall from Saul's eyes so that he could be filled with the Holy Spirit. Divine Love leads mercy. Divine Love precedes healing. Divine Love enables conversion. On this day, Divine Love was the mission and ministry of the gathered Church in a way that would be inconceivable as one might 'keep score' in the world. Saul was now a "brother" and that opened the definitive path for St. Paul to emerge as a new creation in the Risen Lord.

### A Message from Mrs. Carol Frericks—Principal

April 18, 2024 Since this is the time when parents enroll their children for the upcoming school year, I need to take a moment to talk about the Family School Agreement (FSA). For the last ten years, this agreement has been part of your registration materials, expressing the partnership we have as a parish community and school families (both Catholic and non-Catholic) in forming our children as disciples of Jesus Christ. As you know, the pastors and leadership of our Quincy Catholic Schools have been in years-long process to renew and strengthen Catholic Education in our community. This is not firstly a concern over money or enrollment numbers or staff or even buildings and facilities, but it must first begin with a spiritual renewal of our parishes and families in the goals and purposes of Catholic Education. How do we do this? We build Christ-centered relationships within and among our families. We teach respect for the human person as created in the image and likeness of God and teach this through our curriculum, in harmony with the timeless witness of the faith. Finally, we understand our mission as one that supports parents in fulfilling the solemn promises made at their children's baptism to raise them in the faith. This philosophy is what makes Catholic Education unique, desirable, and so necessary in our day and age. This is what drives us to deliver the promise of Catholic Education every day in our schools. At this time, we are announcing information sessions to discuss our new implementation for the first article of the FSA, underscoring the essential importance of being an active witness to the faith in our "daily teaching and living, making discipleship a way of life." Discipleship begins with "the entire family's participation at Mass in the parish every Sunday." The FSA has not changed this expectation over the ten years that it has been in place. For many reasons however, this ideal has not been fully realized. We want all our families to feel welcome and needed in the worshipping community of the Body of Christ. This is a first priority for our Quincy Catholic Schools renewal effort. Please plan to attend one of the scheduled meetings with me, as it is essential for at least one parent from each family to participate. Child care will be provided, if needed. The sessions will take place on: Tuesday, April 30 at 6:30 p.m. in St. Dominic School Gym, Wednesday, May 1 at 6:30 p.m. in St. Dominic School Gym, and Thursday, May 2 at 3:15 p.m. in St. Dominic School Gym. During these sessions, I will explain the expectations we will have for both active parishioners and non-Catholics regarding the implementation of the FSA. Additionally, I recognize that certain families may have unique circumstances that require individual attention. If after this presentation you find yourself in such a situation, you will have the opportunity to request an additional meeting with me. I am committed to supporting every family in our school community and addressing any concerns you may have. We want this effort to be successful and life-giving. I am here to provide guidance and answer your questions. I am grateful for your cooperation and look forward to productive discussions during the sessions. Yours in Christ. Rev. 
