Second Sunday of Easter

APRIL 7, 2024

Acts 4:32-35; 1 John 5:1-6; John 20:19-31

In ancient times, those newly-baptized in the Easter Vigil received a white robe which they wore during the entire week after Easter. The robe was a symbol of their resurrection to grace and of their pledge to live always as a child of God.

On this Sunday, the Sunday after Easter, they laid aside these robes as a sign that now they were fullfledged Catholic Christians, ready to assume their responsibilities in the Church.

This Sunday then was called "The Sunday for the Laying Aside of the White Garments" (Dominica in Albis Deponendis), and later shortened to "White Sunday."

During Easter week, the neophytes had intensive formation in the sacramental life; it was called the "Mystagogic Catechesis" or the teaching on the mysteries. Nowadays, our new Catholics receive this deepened appreciation throughout the Easter Season.

The Sundays of the Easter Season reflect this emphasis on what it means to be a Christian. Our first reading today teaches that we must be of one mind and one heart; we must care for each other.

The second reading reminds us that we have been born as children of God, and we must act like it by our love of each other.

The Gospel not only gives us a vivid "proof" of Jesus' resurrection. It also gives us hope if we should ever backslide into sin: Jesus gave the power to forgive sin to his Church; he still shows us his mercy. Let us live according to our dignity, but if we fail, turn back immediately to the Lord for forgiveness.

Dear Parishioners,


The Sunday after Easter has been designated by the Church as Divine Mercy Sunday. According to the Ordo that guides our liturgies, it states "that throughout the world, the Second Sunday of Easter will receive the name Divine Mercy Sunday, a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that humankind will experience in the years to come."

On this second Sunday of Easter, our first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, seem to describe our Church as an idyllic community of believers. It is a community united in the risen Lord. No one wants for anything. Everyone shares. Everyone looks to the needs of others. There is no selfishness, no squabbling, no subtle infighting. The apostles are the leaders of the community, and they are held in great reverence by everyone. Everyone gives everything he/she has for the good of the community of faith. If this picture of the Church is too good to be true, it probably is. The picture of the Church presented is what the Church should always strive to be. If it were true, then people would be beating down our doors to join us. But instead, we remain imperfect, often reflecting the many flaws of our human nature, flaws which seemingly are contrary to this ideal picture presented. And that perhaps is why this Sunday is Divine Mercy Sunday because of all the virtues we need from our God is His mercy and forgiveness for not being the community that is presented.

Our Gospel for our Mass is the story of St. Thomas. Of all the apostles, I think Thomas often reflects most of us. Even though we have the gift of faith, there are experiences that happen that cause us to doubt. We would love to have proof for what we believe, for that would make it easier to accept. But that's not the case as it was also with Thomas. He heard Jesus had risen but he wasn't going to commit to believe until he could have the ultimate proof, meaning a sense of touch of the risen Lord. Jesus did appear and Thomas was given what he desired. And his response were the words, "my Lord and my God." None of us will ever have that privilege. Instead, we need to listen to the words of Jesus who said to Thomas and to all of us who have doubts, "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." That's you and me. Let's praise the risen Lord for the faith and hope in the resurrection of Jesus.

I was reading Bishop Barron's reflection on the Easter Vigil. He states: "if Jesus was not raised from death, Christianity is a fraud and a joke. But if He did rise from death, then Christianity is the fullness of God's revelation, and Jesus must be the absolute center of our lives. There is no third option." Jesus appeared to Thomas and alleviated his doubts. Hoping this Easter does the same for us.

I want to congratulate our third graders who went to Springfield this Saturday to celebrate their First Communion and Confirmation. I thank the parents and their teachers for helping them prepare for this day and being examples of people of faith. On their return to us, we will be celebrating their second communions here with us at the 11:00 a.m. Mass this Sunday. Please keep them in your prayers that they remain ever close to Jesus in the sacraments.






