# From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Thirteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time. Our readings today remind us that sin, sickness and darkness have entered the world but are overcome by the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Lord hears the cry of those in need, healing the sick and raising the dead to life. Indeed, Jesus made Himself poor so that we might become rich! Let us sit with that for a while in our prayer and in the quiet. Let us really ponder and sit in awe of what God has done for us and continues to do for us.

#### -LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, July 1 – In the United States, optional memorial of St. Junipero Serra, Priest. Junipero Serra was a Franciscan Missionary who established nine of the California missions and baptized over 6,000 Native peoples. He is recognized as a builder of California and "an exemplary model of the selfless evangelizer." He died in 1784. St. Junipero Serra, Pray for us!

-Wednesday, July 3 - Feast of St. Thomas the Apostle (celebrated as a Solemnity in the Church of St. Thomas the Apostle; see below for more information on that). Thomas, one of the Twelve, is perhaps best known as "doubting Thomas." But we have to remember that his doubt gave way to faith when he saw the Risen Lord. We too can sometimes doubt, and we pray that any doubt that may come upon us may give way to faith in the Risen Christ. Thomas is associated with founding the Church in south India. He is mentioned in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I). He was martyred in the First Century and is patron of builders, India, and Pakistan. St. Thomas the Apostle, Pray for us!

-Friday, July 5 – Optional memorial of St. Anthony Zaccaria, Priest and, in the United States of America, St. Elizabeth of Portugal.

Anthony Zaccaria lived in the sixteenth century and was a doctor turned priest. He was a popular preacher who, in 1530 in Milan, founded the Clerics Regular of St. Paul for the reform of society which today numbers about 375 members. He was known to seek collaboration between the clergy and the laity and to promote frequent Communion. He died in 1539 at Cremona at the age of thirty-six. St. Anthony Zaccaria, Pray for us!

Elizabeth of Portugal was named after her great aunt, St. Elizabeth of Hungary. She was a queen and mother, lover of the poor, and peacemaker in the royal family. She died in 1336 and is the patroness of Catholic charities. The optional memorial of St. Elizabeth of Portugal is perpetually transferred from July 4 to July 5 in the United States of America. St. Elizabeth of Portugal, Pray for us!

-Saturday, July 6 – Optional memorial of St. Maria Goretti, Virgin and Martyr. Born near Ancona, Maria Goretti was stabbed to death in 1902 at the age of twelve, preferring to die than to be raped. Canonized in 1950, her mother was present for her canonization. It was the largest crowd ever assembled in Rome for a canonization. St. Maria Goretti is the patroness of teenage girls. St. Maria Goretti, pray for us!

-THE PRECIOUS BLOOD - "The month of July is dedicated to the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ. The feast of the Precious Blood of our Lord was instituted in 1849 by Pius IX, but the devotion is as old as Christianity. The early Fathers say that the Church was born from the pierced side of Christ, and that the sacraments were brought forth through His Blood.

'The Precious Blood which we worship is the Blood which the Savior shed for us on Calvary and reassumed at His glorious Resurrection; it is the Blood which courses through the veins of His risen, glorified, living body at the right hand of God the Father in heaven; it is the Blood made present on our altars by the words of Consecration; it is the Blood which merited sanctifying grace for us and through it washes and beautifies our soul and inaugurates the beginning of eternal life in it.' (Catholicculture.org)

"Devotion to the Precious Blood is not a spiritual option, it is a spiritual obligation, and that not only for priests, but for every follower of Christ. I really believe that one of the symptoms of modern society (and I would even include, sadly, modern Catholic society) one of the symptoms of a growing, gnawing secularism is the lessening and the weakening of devotion to the Precious Blood. Devotion, as we know, is a composite of three elements: It is first-veneration, it is secondly-invocation, and it is thirdly-imitation. In other words, devotion to the Precious Blood of Christ, the Lamb of God who was slain, is first of all to be veneration on our part, which is a composite of knowledge, love and adoration. We are to study to come to a deeper understanding of what those two casual words, Precious Blood, really mean.

I found this passage in the oldest document, outside of sacred scripture, from the first century of the Christian era – to be exact, from Pope St. Clement I, dated about 96 A.D. Says Pope Clement: 'Let us fix our gaze on the Blood of Christ and realize how truly precious It is, seeing that it was poured out for our salvation and brought the grace of conversion to the whole world.'

To understand the meaning of the Precious Blood we must get some comprehension of the gravity of sin, of the awfulness of offending God, because it required the Blood of the Son of God to forgive that sin. We are living in an age in which to sin has become fashionable.

This veneration of the Precious Blood, which is the first element in our devotion to the Precious Blood means that we have a deep sensitivity to the awfulness of sin. Sin must be terrible. It must be awful. It must be the most dreadful thing in the universe. Why? Because it cost the living God in human form the shedding of His Blood.

Lord Jesus, You became Man in order by your Passion and Death and the draining of your Blood on the Cross might prove to us how much You, our God, love us. Protect us, dear Jesus, from ever running away from the sight of blood. Strengthen our weak human wills so that we will not only not run away from the cross, but welcome every opportunity to shed our blood in spirit in union with your Precious Blood, so that, dying to ourselves in time we might live with You in Eternity. Amen."

-POPE'S INTENTION – The Holy Father's intention for July is for the pastoral care of the sick. We pray that the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick confer to those who receive it and their loved ones the power of the Lord and become ever more a visible sign of compassion and hope for all.

-BIRTHDAY – Monday, July 1 is my birthday. As I've mentioned before, many of us don't necessarily like to make a big deal of it, including myself, but our birthdays are important and we recognize the great gift of life that God has given to us and the many gifts that He fills our life with.

-JULY 3 – As noted above, at St. Thomas, we celebrate St. Thomas the Apostle as a Solemnity on Wednesday, July 3. I will be offering Mass at St. Thomas at 5:30 p.m. that day. Please plan to join us.

-INDEPENDENCE DAY – Thursday, July 4 marks Independence Day for our Country. While this is a secular celebration and not a Liturgical Celebration, we recognize the importance of our Independence as a country. We recognize the freedoms that we are afforded, hopefully with a correct understanding of freedom. We recognize too those who have worked to protect that independence. Above all, we give praise and thanks to God, the Creator of all that is good!

Masses that day will be celebrated at our regular times at both parishes...7:00 a.m. at Holy Family and 5:30 p.m. at St. Thomas. As you celebrate Independence Day, I encourage you to start join us for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. I cannot think of a better way to celebrate.

-ICE CREAM – Just a reminder, St. Thomas is continuing to prepare for the upcoming ice cream and dessert in the park in Camp Point on Independence Day and their annual ice cream social in August. Sign-up sheets to help and to bring desserts for July 4 are in the back of St. Thomas Church. If you have not already done so, please sign up.

Although no one has said anything to me, I'm sure there is also a need for gallon containers with lids. If you have some, please bring them to Church and leave them neatly in the back of church. If you bring them to Holy Family, I will make sure they get to St. Thomas.

-FIRST FRIDAY - Friday, July 5 is First Friday and so we will be having our First Friday Devotions at St. Thomas. Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament will be at Noon with Adoration continuing until 5:45 p.m. Benediction will be at 5:45 p.m. followed by Mass at 6:00 p.m. Confession will be available from 5:00 p.m. – 5:45 p.m.. As always, I encourage everyone to spend some time in prayer in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

-NOCTURNAL ADORATION – Saturday, July 6 is First Saturday and so we will have Nocturnal Adoration at Holy Family beginning at 10:00 p.m. on Saturday night and going through the night until 7:45 a.m. Sunday morning. Benediction is at 7:45 a.m. on Sunday morning followed by our regularly scheduled 8:00 a.m. Mass.

-CELEBRATION OF CANDIDACY – As I mentioned at Masses last weekend and noted in last week's bulletin, to celebrate Matt Heldt's Candidacy to the Permanent Diaconate locally here in the parishes, we are planning a celebration on Sunday, July 7 at Holy Family. Please make plans now to be there. We will have Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament at 4:00 p.m. with Benediction around 4:45 p.m. followed by Mass at 5:00 p.m. and then a reception/dinner in the school cafeteria.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament will be offered to pray especially for good and holy Vocations. Mass will be the Sunday Mass and will fulfill one's Sunday obligation. The meal will be a nice dinner for us all to enjoy and to visit with one another. I do hope you can join us.

As I said in last week's bulletin, this celebration is not so much about Matt but about what God has done and continues to do and giving praise and glory to God and God alone. It should come to help us recognize that all the more in our own lives and in the world and draw us to an even deeper cooperation with God's grace. It is, indeed, a celebration of the Universal Church which calls for great humility and an absence of any pride or vainglory.

Candidacy needs to be properly understood and is something that should be celebrated. It is important. The Church in Her discernment with the men have admitted these men into Candidacy. While one should never seek human affirmation for anything, we do want to and need to affirm the good work that God has begun in others.

-FULLNESS OF TRUTH – The Fullness of Truth is found ONLY in the Roman Catholic

Church. We should, with great love, unapologetically be proclaiming that everywhere and to everyone...by our words, deeds, and thoughts. This comes about first and foremost in our own recognition of that and then making that the very way we live our lives. We never "beat someone over the head," so to speak about the faith, we never condemn (that's left for the Lord alone) but it is necessary for us to recognize the Fullness of Faith being found ONLY in the Catholic Church and to teach that to others. It is the Lord Himself that established the Church and gave us the Sacraments out of love for us, yes, but also for our salvation.

We each have a responsibility in this. Don't take it lightly. Please, please don't take it lightly! Parents, especially...your children NEED to know this, NEED to be taught this, NEED to see this. That NEED is to be fulfilled by YOU!

The attractions of this world are passing. Our desires and passions are powerful but never lead us to lasting joy. Those things that make us feel good may not be bad in and of themselves (unless they keep us from the Lord and His Church, the Catholic Church) but it is only through the Lord that we find true happiness, true joy, and can hope for Eternal Life with Him...something so great that we can't even imagine what the Lord has in store for those who follow Him.

Pray for your own faith and for the faith of others. Pray for those who have abandoned Christ by leaving the Church that they may return to the fullness of His Love and the Fullness of Truth. It is only in the Catholic Church that we can receive within our very selves the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ and forgiveness of sins. WOW! There is nothing greater! What a great gift the Lord has given us. Can we really do anything but give Him praise and thanks?!
