

In contemporary culture, religion has a reputation of being repressive and sometimes coercive... religion is perceived as nothing more than a set of arbitrary rules to limit free thought or sexual expression, or to inspire guilt and unworthiness within a social power structure. At its worst, religion has the potential of being co-opted as a tool of oppression as it abandons its ideals about God and moral order. For instance, to this very day, the word "inquisition" dredges up dreadful images of medieval torture chambers and the oppression of minority persons as 'heretics'. In more recent times, Nazi authors of the Holocaust based their reign of terror on declaring people of the Jewish faith as enemies of the state. Today, the unrest of the Middle East is often interpreted as a conflict between the Christian West and the Islamic East.

And so, why be 'religious' when religion can so easily become a tool of evil? Why not simply be 'spiritual' on one's own, without the excesses of 'religion'? In our better moments as a human family, we really can come to know a peace that the world cannot give through our faith. Missionaries were sent to share faith, preachers are inspired to teach faith, people of goodwill make all kinds of sacrifices, even to the point of giving their lives in martyrdom, in witness to faith.

Contemporary Christianity finds itself challenged and sometimes vilified when it steps into the public square. Many believe that faith has no place in civil discourse, as faith is supremely or exclusively a personal affair. Most regrettably, through the criminal acts of some, as exemplified by the ongoing sexual abuse scandal, religious people, and Catholics in particular, can be seen as hypocritical, at best, and not worthy of serious consideration by modern 'enlightened' people.

Because one cannot 'prove' the tenants of religious faith, the reasoning goes, faith should not be used to influence politics or how one interacts with others in public. Others believe that all religions are equal, for 'we all believe in the same God anyway". As Catholics we do not subscribe to either of these extremes. In fact, faith perfects human reason-for even the most rational scientist embraces an implicit faith when confronted with the truths of quantum mechanics. Even the most indifferent atheist cannot avoid embracing one or another set of presumptions about the transcendent truths of nature and the human person. And so as Catholics, well-formed Christian faith is not something unusual or unnatural to embrace, and it is not something to be embarrassed about-faith is valuable in articulating a coherent teaching about human dignity within the pursuit of common good in civil law. People of faith therefore should consider themselves 'on' for living their faith with integrity at the ballot box, in legislatures, through the courts and on juries, at universities, in the military, in corporate board-rooms, on the picket lines, in the soup kitchens and grocery stores, and everywhere else-including and perhaps especially their private lives-because Christian faith has something good and holy and wholesome to share with the rest of the world. But how might we as Catholics live in a pluralistic society where many share different ideas about faith and many disagree (even violently) with Christian revelation?

Jesus gives us a clue. St. John tells us that some of the people thought Jesus' Bread of Life teachings were 'difficult', and that some people were so scandalized that they parted company with Jesus. What did Jesus do? Did he change his teaching to be more acceptable to his audience? Did he compromise? Did he strike down unbelievers? No. He let them go. Jesus reminds us that no one can come to him unless it is granted of the Father. All faith is a gift of the Holy Spirit. We find ourselves serving as instruments of the Good News, but God alone is the source of faith within that Good News. Resistance doesn't mean that we should abandon or change the faith in order to gain believers through our own efforts. All the more, resistance calls us to live faith with a humble integrity so that unbelievers may be converted, not by us, but by God's invitation to be nourished by the Bread that he alone can give.


The Catholic Church believes and teaches that it holds the very words of Spirit and Life. The Church also reverences individual religious liberty—the right and duty of each individual conscience to seek, find, and freely respond to God's revealed truth. God does not come to us as an *idea*, but as a *person*. We have no right, even if we have been blessed with religious truth, to coercively impose the faith on others—it diminishes the dignity of our neighbor's conscience, and perhaps even short-circuits the grace of God working to bring a person to fully human, relational faith. Only in true freedom can a person come to true faith. Our job as Catholics is to make sure that the invitation remains visible, present, and *reasonable* in the public square... to *propose*, rather than *impose*, faith. That is what Jesus did after giving his great "Bread of Life" teaching, and that's what we do as a Church today as we invite all into unity with the Body of Christ.

Safe Environment Audit: Each year in May the Diocese of Springfield audits each parish making sure they are compliant with the safe environment guidelines. All volunteers are to have completed safe environment training and a background check. The safe environment

training previously was an in person training titled Protecting God's Children. This is now called Empowering God's Children and is completed online. The background check is also done online and only needs to be completed once unless a person's address changes. Now that we have completed the paper work for the audit we have found many parishioners who are involved in our ministries have background checks that have expired and need to be renewed or they have not completed any of the training. If you are one of these people you may be receiving an email in the next few weeks from the parish office with the information attached to complete the background check if your previous background check was expired or complete Empowering God's Children if you had not had Protecting God's Children.
